Executive Summary - The SWOC Analysis of the Institution

Guru Nanak National College was established in July 1974 in the small town of Doraha with a primary objective of opening the doors of higher education to the youth of this town and the rural interior. Doraha is situated almost midway between Khanna and Ludhiana. At that time there was no facility for higher education in the town. The youth had to travel to Ludhiana. Transport facilities being limited, the need for establishing an institution, offering higher education was felt. Late Dr. Ishwar Singh, the founder President, S. Jagjit Singh Mangat, the founder Secretary and other prominent personalities of the area like Pandit Kidar Nath Sharma, S. Beant Singh, the former Chief Minister of Punjab, S. Gurbaksh Singh Katani, Sh. Kewal Krishan Tandon, Sh. Krishan Chand Thapar, Sh. Om Prakash Bector, S. Jagdish Singh Gill and others took the initiative and managed to get 17 acres of Government land on lease for 99 years for this purpose. The managing board was registered with the Registrar Societies in the year 1971. The state government implemented the 95% deficit grant in aid scheme for privately managed colleges in the year1978. All the programmes introduced after 1978 are in the self-financing mode. After a lot of efforts and struggle the institution has come up with an excellent infrastructure.

With the deep-founded vision and missionary efforts initiated by the team of the founders led by Late Dr. Ishwar Singh, the college has grown to be a multi-faculty, postgraduate institution with a separate wing for girls within the campus. By the year 2005, the institution had stabilized and established itself among few good institutions of the area. It was the right time to take up new and challenging initiatives to enter into the league of the best of the institutions. As quest for excellence grew sterner and perceptions underwent a change, the pace of growth became all the more vigorous in the last decade. It is reflected in each and every sphere of the institution.

Curricular Aspects:

Affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh, to begin with the institution was purely an arts degree college. But in response to the changing aspirations and needs of the people of the area, aimed at the economic, social and cultural growth of the nation, Commerce, Computer Science and Science streams were added in the years 1985, 2001 and 2010 respectively. Presently the college runs courses like B.A., B.Sc. (Non-Medical), B.Com., B.C.A., B.B.A., M.A. (Punjabi), M.A. (Political Science), M.A. (Sociology), M.Com., M.Sc. (IT) and P.G.D.C.A. A variety of elective options including skill based subjects are offered at the undergraduate level to the arts students. The subject of Honours in Political Science is offered to students of B.A. programme. The college has options for slow and advanced learners. For value addition and enhancement of employability the college offers Add-on-courses in Computer Based Accounting, Fashion Designing, Nursery Teachers Training and Animation and Graphics. This provides sufficient academic flexibility and caters to the academic needs of the youth of the area

so as to enable skill development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improve potential for employability that could be provided under the affiliating system of Panjab University, Chandigarh and the resources of the institution. It has a significant component of ICT. Some of the crosscutting issues are integrated in the formal curriculum while others are provided non-formally through various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities carried out by the institution.

The formal courses are supplemented by offering degree enrichment programmes in the non-formal mode. For value addition the institution offers certificate courses in typing and shorthand both in English and Punjabi. Special courses are provided in spoken English, computer literacy, TALLY, etc. to students and non-students. It is also involved in running short term courses regarding Computer Literacy, Fashion Technology, Embroidery, Stitching, Electrician etc. from time to time in collaboration with Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College, Ludhiana and the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh.

Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are meticulously planned to enhance the effectiveness of formal curriculum, impart additional skills, inculcate moral and civic values, and sensitize the youth towards social and environmental issues.

A number of members of the faculty represent on academic and administrative bodies like Boards of Studies, Faculties, Academic Council, Syndicate and Senate of the affiliating university. They richly contribute in the designing of the curriculum and convey the feedback received by them from different stakeholders through these bodies.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The college ensures publicity and transparency in its admission process. It follows the guidelines issued from time to time by the state government and the affiliating university for selection of students for admissions. Reservation policy of the state government is followed. We firmly believe that the mission and vision of the founders cannot be fulfilled without inclusiveness. Vigorous efforts are made to bring the youth of disadvantaged sections to the folds of higher education to uplift and empower them. Special efforts are made to attract meritorious students, sports persons and the youth, good at performing arts.

As the students seeking admission to the institution are predominantly rural and belong to socio-economically and educationally disadvantaged sections of the society, the cut-off percentage at the time of admissions is quite low as compared to most of the other institutions affiliated to the university especially those of bigger towns and cities and government colleges. This is compensated by putting in extra efforts in the form of additional lectures in some subjects like English, Mathematics, Financial Accounting and remedial classes in most of the subjects. Some of our students are hardworking and capable of high achievements and taking

challenging tasks. Such students are especially nurtured to excel. As a result, the overall pass percentage and promotion rate of our students is quite satisfactory. A significantly high number of our students passing their degrees secure first divisions. A total of 34 students have bagged university positions since 2004-05. This trend has picked up during the last four-five sessions. The number of students passing with distinction (above 75% marks) is also on the rise. The students significantly improve their performance as they progress from one year to another especially in the three year degree programmes.

Academic schedule is well planned and co-curricular and extracurricular activities have been meticulously integrated into it. Conscious efforts are made to make teaching-learning student centered. The studentmethods like assignments, seminars, group presentations, practicals, debates, quizzes, wall posters, audio-visual aids, question answer sessions, class tests, snap tests, writing of project reports, case studies, field work, net surfing, workshops, surveys, mock elections, real life events etc. form a part of our teaching learning process. Some of these components form a significant part of the evaluation process in most of the courses. Stress is laid on inculcating critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among its students. Summer/Industrial training is an integral part of the curriculum in some courses.

Due stress is laid on staff development programmes to keep pace with changing times. Faculty is encouraged to participate in such programmes organized by different universities and institutions of the region. A total of thirty eight teachers have attended two hundred and fifty seven seminars /conferences/ workshops/ training programmes during the last four years. The institution has organized forty seven extension lectures by eminent scholars and five seminars/conferences during this period. About forty five eminent personalities and scholars were invited for these. In addition to our faculty and students, 335 delegates from other institutions participated in these and 135 of them presented papers. Special training programmes are also planned and organized for effective implementation of the policies of the institution for instance regular training programmes for the faculty has been organized to promote the use of ICT and CAL. New technologies in the form of gadgets are regularly added.

Lot of efforts are put in to maintain regularity of the students in their attendance. The norms laid down by the regulatory bodies are strictly followed. The performance of the students is regularly monitored and corrective measures taken. A software to maintain a complete record of the students has been procured. Bridge courses are organized in English and Computers during summer vacations before admissions to the new session. Basics are taught to bridge the knowledge gap during the first few weeks of each session. Extra classes and remedial classes are planned on the basis of the analysis of the performance of the students in the class tests, house exams and that of the previous batches.

Internal assessment forms a significant proportion of the evaluation process. It is based on the attendance at lectures, performance of the students in the house exams and class tests. Seminars, presentations and projects are given due weightage in some programmes. The criteria of internal assessment are well defined and ensures rigor to the extent that the students can calculate most of the marks themselves. Complete transparency is followed in awarding internal assessment. The marks awarded in it are displayed on the notice board for at least three days before forwarding to the affiliating university.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

The main focus of the institution during the initial three decades of its establishment has been to accord mass education, promote art and culture and provide extension services. It was during the last decade that Post-Graduate courses were also introduced. At present the institution offers Post-Graduate courses in five subjects. It has six faculty members with Ph.D. degrees. Lately the institution has initiated the promotion of research. Teachers are encouraged to apply for research projects to the funding agencies; financial provision for research has been made in the budget; extension lectures, seminars/conferences and training programmes to promote research have been organized; teachers are supported and encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/training programmes in other institutions; and equipment has been purchased to support research activity.

A number of teachers have published research papers, presented papers and published books. The faculty has eight International and fourteen National research publications to their credit. They have contributed fifty three publications in proceedings of seminars/conferences and thirty two books. Seven of them have also contributed 151 articles in reputed dailies. The Ph.D. thesis of Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu, Principal has reference in research publications by reputed organizations of the country and in an International Publication. Dr. Gurjeet Virk Sidhu was invited to present a research paper in an International Conference in Canada.

The faculty of the institution provides consultancy to other educational institutions and organizations. Some of the teachers are invited by educational institutions as subject experts for the selection of teachers and for judgment at the time of competitions in cultural and literary items. Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu, Principal and Dr. Kuldeep Singh, Associate Professor in Political Science have represented on the academic and decision making bodies of the affiliating university like Senate, Syndicate, College Development Council etc. Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu has also served as a member of the Panjab University Sports Committee in different capacities. He has served on some committees of the Punjab School Education Board as Academic Council, UMC Committee, Inspection Committees and Selection Committees. A few of our teachers are members of the Managements and Boards of Studies of schools and colleges. The teachers receive remuneration/honourarium for some of these services.

Recognizing its social responsibility to inculcate the spirit of nationalism and universal brotherhood and values of humanism among its students, the institution plans and organizes a number of extension activities. These are also aimed to sensitize them towards social and environmental issues. The institution also collaborates with Panjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana, Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College, Ludhiana and Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh, NGO's and organizations like clubs, hospitals to carry out such programmes.

Outreach programmes like awareness drives, tree plantation, traffic awareness, first aid training, moral education, cleanliness drives, blood donation camps etc. are organized from time to time. During these campaigns, programmes like cleanliness and beautification of schools, slum areas, community centers, health centers etc.; eye and general medical checkup camps; awareness campaigns through door to door counselling, rallies, processions, skits, plays etc. on issues like female foeticide, dowry, drug addiction, eve teasing, national integration and communal harmony; lectures and training sessions regarding health and hygiene, abstinence from drugs, road safety, first aid, new techniques in agriculture and related fields like dairy farming, bee keeping, floriculture, agro forestry etc. are carried out in the recent past. Blood donation camps are a regular feature.

The institution also organized cultural programmes like plays, concerts (where renowned artists are invited to perform) and functions in the memory of national heroes etc. People of the area are invited and sometimes involved in the organization as well.

The college organized seminars on social issues like Violation of Human Rights of Farmers and Migratory Labour and Domestic Violence and Sexual Harassment of Women and Children. Eminent researchers, students and teachers from other institutions, stakeholders/ beneficiaries like representatives of farmers organizations, NGO's, political activists, government officials dealing with the migratory labour, representatives of Labour Unions and beneficiary sections of society and public were also invited.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a magnificent campus located in a pollution free healthy atmosphere. It has an impressive building and spacious lawns and play grounds. The building houses an Administrative Block; Arts Block; Commerce Block; Post-Graduate Block; Girls Wing; library; separate library facility in the girls wing; well-equipped Physics labs, a Chemistry lab, Computer labs, a language lab and a lab for Office Management and Secretarial Practice; separate canteens for boys and girls; seminar hall with audio visual facility; facility for open air theatre; girls hostel; residence for Principal, non-teaching staff and single room sets for women teachers; and a gym equipped with modern machines etc. The college has a Multipurpose Hall/Indoor Stadium with a seating capacity of about 1800. Most the

departments have been provided separate rooms. The college has a branch of a nationalized bank on its campus.

The play grounds include a hockey stadium; a basketball court, indoor and outdoor badminton courts, football ground; facility for Kho-Kho, Kabbadi, Hand ball, Table Tennis, Athletics, Gymnastics, Body Building, Weight Lifting, Hand ball, Net ball etc.

The institution has a master plan that has provision for future needs like construction of a new spacious library, conference hall, computer labs science labs, class rooms, swimming pool, shooting range etc. as well. The building has a ramp landing on the first floor to make it disabled friendly. The infrastructure is augmented regularly. An amount of Rs. 1,09,90,560/has been spent to construct new buildings and Rs. 1,18,43,983/- has been spent on equipment of various types during the last four years. Similarly, one or the other building/facility is upgraded/renovated every year and an amount of Rs. 32,40,801 has been spent on renovation/up-gradation/maintenance of buildings and equipment during the last four years.

The college has a well-stocked fully computerized main library and a library facility in the Girl's Wing. It is stocked with about 32,800 books and subscribes to 117 Periodicals/ Journals. Some e-resources in the form of CD's have also been added. It is regularly updated and enriched. More than 5,000 books have been added to the library during the last five years. An amount of Rs. 18,59,601/- has been spent on the purchase of books, Journals/Periodicals, e-resources and News Papers during this period. The institution has subscribed to e-resources like INFLIBNET. Computer terminals with internet have been provided. Reprographic facility is available in the libraries.

The institution has 115 computers and 5 laptops with leased line and broadband internet connectivity. It has four computer labs. Central computer facility has been provided for the use of students and teachers. Most of the departments have been provided computers with internet facility. The computers and related hardware is regularly up-graded and well-maintained. An amount of Rs. 26,95,730/- has been spent on this during the last four years.

The institution has well-equipped Labs for Physics and Chemistry. In addition to these a Language Lab, Lab for Office Management and Secretarial Practices, Music Lab and Fashion Designing Lab are also available.

The college has three generators of 125 kva, 82 kva and 32 kva to ensure power back up to ensure uninterrupted power supply. Servos and voltage stabilizers are installed to protect damage to sensitive instruments.

The institution has a number of gadgets as interactive projectors, boards, monitors etc. to facilitate ICT and CAL. A seminar room with audiovisual facility is available as a common facility. Such facility has also been provided in some class rooms and labs.

Adequate facilities like drinking water, canteens and toilets have been provided for boys and girls separately.

The college maintains a green and attractive campus. The grounds and lawns have been re-laid with grass. A large stretch of land has been turned from a dumping place of the town to lush green grounds. About 900 trees and shrubs have been planted. These include medicinal plants, fruit trees, ornamentals, timber trees and specimen trees having educational value.

The infrastructure is put to optimum use. The college functions for seven hours daily. Some facilities are shared with the school run by the same management. People of the town use the grounds for morning and evening walks and playing games. The gym is also used by some of them. A number of cultural activities, Youth Festivals and live shows are organized for productive use of its excellent infrastructure. Short term courses in spoken English and Computers are offered to students and non-students even during vacations. Some short term courses have also been offered regarding Computer Literacy, Fashion Technology, Embroidery, Stitching, Electrician etc. from time to time in collaboration with Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College, Ludhiana and the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh.

Student Support and Progression

The institution follows a completely transparent system in its functioning. It publishes a prospectus every year which provides complete information about the institution, its aims and objectives, academic calendar, faculty, administrative and academic committees, admission process, dates and admission rules, courses offered and eligibility conditions for each course, options/subjects available, fee structure, basis for internal assessment, requirement of attendance at lectures and minimum marks in qualifying examination, student support facilities like fee concession and scholarships, awards/prizes, library, sports, clubs/societies, committees for prevention of ragging and sexual harassment etc. A copy of the prospectus is uploaded on the college website as well.

Financial aid and scholarships are provided to the needy and meritorious students. The students are helped and guided to avail the benefits of schemes of the government meant for different sections of the society. The students receive such aid from under various schemes of the Central Government, State Government and Panjab University. The college provides aid from Student Aid Fund and Guru Nanak Club of the college to the economically weaker students. It also provides scholarships to meritorious students. Students good in sports and performing arts are also provided financial aid. It has some endowment funds instituted by the members of the management and public donors for scholarships to be given on the basis of means cum merit. Some financial support is also availed from philanthropists, social organizations and alumni. More than 50% of the

students received financial support, in one form or the other, during the session 2013-14.

The college has a grievance redressal cell. The students directly approach its members for redressal of their grievances or the same are forwarded to it. Suggestion boxes have also been placed in the campus. This cell addresses the grievances to the satisfaction of the aggrieved. Special committees are formed for specific purposes. The students freely report their grievances which are promptly redressed.

The institution provides support and guidance to its students for preparing for competitive exams. About 6% of our students from the last four batches have cleared such exams. It is worth mentioning that during the session 2013-14 three of the students of M.Com. cleared NET exam even as they had appeared for the 3rd semester exams of the PG programme.

As majority of the students of the college belong to socioeconomically and educationally disadvantaged sections, the institution makes consistent efforts to minimize failure and drop out. Their performance is regularly monitored and analyzed and extra lectures/remedial classes are planned accordingly.

The students are provided Career Guidance and Counselling and the Placement Cell has facilitated the placement of 4.82% of the passing out students of the last four batches. The progression of our students to higher education is quite high. During the last four years about 67.44% of the graduates have enrolled for higher education and 17.78% of the UG/PG students have pursued B.Ed. or other similar courses. A total of about 24% of our students of the last four batches have been absorbed in gainful employment, 5.5% are self-employed and 3% are settled abroad.

The institution organizes and ensures participation of the students in sports and games, youth festivals, seminars, conferences, debates, plays, skits, poster making competitions, writing competitions, movie shows, music concerts, dance shows etc. The students are encouraged to attend camps organized by NCC, NSS, Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Ludhiana and Youth Welfare Departments of Panjab University and Punjab Government.

A very active tradition of multifarious co-curricular and extracurricular activities has been the forte of Guru Nanak National College, Doraha. The institution has earned an enviable position amongst affiliated colleges of Panjab University in organizing, participating and winning prizes in Inter-college and interuniversity competitions. We have organized two Inter-Zonal and three Zonal Youth Festivals of Panjab University during the last eight years. Our students participate in a big way in the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festivals of Panjab University Chandigarh and bag outstanding positions reaching out for more brilliant positions at Inter-Zonal levels, Inter-Varsity level, National level or even Inter-national level. Many of these students are trained and groomed by the college. We often organize live shows and concerts by renowned artists.

Facilities for a wide range of sports and games provided to the students. Our students participate in intercollege competitions in Hockey, Football, Kabbadi, Cricket, Athletics, Shooting, Body Building, Power Lifting, Boxing, Netball, Kho-Kho, Hand Ball, Chess etc. The institution also organizes inter-class competitions and annual athletic meet to ensure mass participation of students. Facilities for badminton, table tennis, chess, carom board, gymnastics, handball, basketball, volleyball etc. have also been made available.

A number of sports persons of the college have won laurels at the national and international level in the past. The college hockey team has won Punjab University championship for 17 years consecutively in B Division and has also won Silver and Bronze Medals in A Division. The college is proud to own an outstanding sports person every now and then. Trained sports persons are not readily available. So we encourage student participation in those games/sports in which students can be groomed in the college.

The college brings out its annual magazine 'UDAR' and a monthly wall magazine 'The Dawn' regularly. The students contribute in good numbers for these magazines.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution follows the principle of collective decision-making. The staff is represented in the Executive of the Managing Committee with the Principal and three teachers as its members. The Executive Committee is elected every five years. Even the staff representatives are elected according to the procedure laid down by the affiliating university in its statutes. All policy decisions are taken by the Executive of the Management and reported to in the General Body Meetings. The principal coordinates between the management, local administration, government agencies and the university.

The college has a Statutory Advisory Committee comprising of senior faculty members. Most of the decisions of day to day administration and academic activities are taken by it. Its meetings are chaired by the Principal. The institution functions through various committees headed by Deans, Conveners and Coordinators. All the activities are well planned and monitored at each stage of implementation. The performance of all of its components are regularly discussed and analyzed and corrective measures are taken. Meetings of general body of the staff are often held. Feedback from different stakeholders is given due credence while planning and framing policies and strategies.

The institution has a number of welfare schemes for all of its members. It has an effective and fair grievance redressal mechanism for all of its sections. The students have representation of some of the committees. They freely air their grievances which are promptly redressed. The college has a cell to prevent sexual harassment of women at workplace. It has also a committee in place to prevent ragging.

The institution follows standard procedures and system for budgeting and auditing. A qualified Charted Accountant has been hired. He scrutinizes and prepares annual income/expenditure statements and balance sheets. The annual budget is presented in the Executive Committee and reported to the General Body of the Management. The accounts are also audited by the audit departments of the government. A senior teacher of the college has been appointed as the bursar. He authenticates all the financial transactions. All purchases are made through purchase committees.

The institution has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. Most of the policies and strategies are framed by the Advisory Committee. Approval of the managing committee is sought wherever necessary. The plans to implement decisions of the management are drawn by it. The teachers are accorded training in the use of computers and motivated to adopt learner centered procedures and activities. The quality assurance policy and decisions are conveyed to all of its sections and their effective implementation is ensured.

The general office, accounts branch and the library has been fully computerized. Every year one or the other operation is incorporated into the software to enhance its efficiency. The office staff has been trained to handle computers.

Innovations and Best Practices

The institution is fully aware of the role of educational institutions in generating awareness and sensitizing the society about the global environmental issues. It makes conscious efforts in this direction. The subject of Environment Education is taught as a compulsory subject to all the UG students. The institution not only preaches but also practices and takes steps in this direction. It has taken steps to conserve energy, conserve water, carbon neutrality, has undertaken massive tree plantation and a solar power plant of 3 KW capacity is being installed for generation or renewable energy.

The institution always introspects and introduces innovations to achieve the aims and objectives of the college and promote excellence. In this pursuit, the college has introduced innovations in the fields like faculty development, teaching learning, evaluation, extension, governance and management, student support and progression and inclusiveness etc. during the last four years. Some of these efforts are Faculty Improvement, monitoring the teaching-learning process and students performance and adopting innovative teaching practices.

SWOC Analysis

D. CRITERIA-WISE INPUTS

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Vision:

Inspired by the teachings of Sri Guru Nanak Dev ji and dedicated to the 5th birth centenary of the great Guru, the founders established Guru Nanak National College Managing Board, Doraha (Ludhiana). It was registered under the Societies Act in the year 1971.

Having imbibed the philosophy of Guru Nanak and the nationalistic spirit of its founders, the board was set up with a broad vision to open the doors of higher education to the common people living in this small town and the rural interior for the mental, physical, moral and healthy growth of the masses.

The *motto* of the college, 'Sarbat Da Bhala', i.e. wishing good for all, as inscribed in the insignia, denotes that the institution aims at the betterment of humanity at large.

Mission:

The primary mission of the Managing Board was to establish a college at Doraha for the teaching of Arts, Science and other subjects, to promote the study of Punjabi language and literature, to implement the vision of the founders through this institution and to undertake the specific activities/programmes to achieve, promote and sustain this vision.

Aims and Objectives:

Established with a missionary zeal, the college aims at empowering the educationally backward and disadvantaged population of the area by imparting liberal general education with a special stress on the values of humanism, secularism and nationalism. It strives for spreading the light of knowledge; preparing the youth for the global job market by imparting the necessary skills and virtues; guiding them to be better human beings by imparting high moral and civic values through various activities; providing equal opportunities to all irrespective of caste, colour or creed; uplifting the downtrodden; empowering women; inculcating the spirit of nationalism and universal brotherhood; inculcating scientific attitude; promoting and achieving excellence in education through quality and inclusiveness and inculcating this spirit among youth.

The vision and mission of the institution is communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stake holders through the prospectus, the college magazine and the annual report presented by the head of the institution, at the time of the Convocation and Annual Prize Distribution Function. It is incorporated in the constitution of the Managing Board. It is conveyed to the stake holders by the management, principal and staff through their deliberations and interaction at various occasions like staff meetings, academic and cultural gatherings and functions organized from time to time.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Following steps are taken to develop and deploy action plans for the effective implementation of the curriculum:

- i. The session is planned by the advisory committee comprising of the senior faculty members along with the head of the institution. The heads of various departments are also involved in it.
- ii. Subject wise teaching work-load is discussed with the heads of the departments and additional faculty recruited, if needed, well in advance.
- iii. The whole session is divided into three terms as per the academic calendar provided by the affiliating university.
- iv. Each department plans and divides the syllabus term wise, which is printed and made available to the students and teachers. This also helps to keep uniform pace wherever the class is divided into more than one section. It is co-ordinated at the departmental level under the guidance of the heads of the respective department/subjects. Mid-term corrections are made, if needed.
- v. Departmental meetings are held for allocation of classes to teachers.
- vi. The Deans, Conveners and Heads of the Departments hold meetings of their respective committees/departments to chalk out a plan of the activities to be carried out throughout the session.

In addition to the above, teaching work is extended to a few more days before the commencement of annual exams. Depending upon the requirement, teachers continue classes, even during preparatory days. Extra classes are encouraged, wherever required. Additional lectures per week are provided in some subjects like Mathematics, Computer Science, English, Accountancy etc.

When a teacher is on leave, his/her lectures are adjusted at the department level especially in the subjects/departments where there are a sufficient number of teachers available as Commerce, Computer Science, English etc.

Semester system has been introduced in PG classes and teaching classes are carried out even when annual exams of other classes are being conducted.

To enhance the effectiveness of formal curriculum, impart additional skills, inculcate moral and civic values, and sensitize the youth towards social and environmental issues, co-curricular and extracurricular activities are meticulously planned and spread throughout the session.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

University provides support to teachers for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices in the following ways:

- By organizing faculty improvement programmes like Refresher/ Orientation courses and Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops
- By giving representation to the college teachers in its decision making bodies like Senate, Syndicate, Academic Council, Faculties, Boards of Study and decision making committees, formed for specific purposes
- By suggesting/providing books and other study material and giving advice for the setting up of labs through its faculty and delivering extension lectures etc.
- By providing its library and research facilities

The support provided by the institution for the stated purpose is as follows:

- Library resources are regularly updated by adding books, subscribing journals and e-resources like INFLIBNET etc.
- Computer facility with internet has been provided to the teachers.
- Teachers are encouraged to attend seminars, conferences, workshops, refresher courses, orientation courses etc. in other institutions.
- College has provided infrastructure for computer aided teaching like LCD/interactive projectors, visualizer, laptops, computers, interactive boards and other gadgets.
- Training programs in the use of computers and equipment like projectors, visualizer and interactive gadgets in teaching and preparation of computer aided presentations, are organized, from time to time.
- Teaching Aids Cell has been set up to train and help the teachers in the preparation and use of presentations and computer aided teaching material.

- Seminars/workshops/conferences are organized for the betterment of faculty and students.
- Resource persons from universities and other institutions are invited for extension lectures for the benefit of both the teachers and the students.
- Teachers are encouraged to participate in university bodies like Senate, Academic Council, Boards of Study etc.
- Teachers are exhorted to adopt learner centered teaching methods like seminars, quizzes, lab work, group discussions, surveys, projects, debates, presentations etc.
- Labs are upgraded regularly.
- Research facilities are provided as and when requisitioned.
- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The institution has taken up the following initiatives for effective curriculum delivery and its transaction:

- The faculty is motivated to adopt computer aided teaching methods and learner centered teaching. Training sessions are also organized to facilitate teachers to adopt such methods.
- Efforts are made to keep the faculty updated by exhorting them to attend seminars/ conferences/ workshops/ orientation courses/ refresher courses etc.
- Library and other learning resources are regularly updated. Library has been computerized and internet facility, for the use of teachers and students, has been provided.
- The college invites experts to deliver extension lectures for the benefit of both the faculty and the students.
- Staff meetings are held to sensitize the teachers towards their responsibilities, adopt innovative teaching methods and orient the newly appointed teachers, especially at the commencement of each session.
- The departments plan and organize extension lectures, seminars, conferences, assign projects, arrange training, industrial visits and tours.
- Remedial classes and extra classes are arranged wherever necessary.
- Advanced learners are encouraged by giving prizes and scholarships. They are provided extra study material and assigned challenging tasks.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

Industry:

The institution interacts with the industry for training, placements and providing facilities to carry out various projects by the students.

Research Bodies:

The institution interacts with research bodies in the following ways:

- For research work being carried out by the faculty
- For joint research projects
- For faculty improvement programmes
- For arranging experts as resource persons for extension lectures and seminars/conferences
- For use of their library and laboratory facilities
- For obtaining guidance in setting up of labs and purchase of equipment

University:

The institution avails following support from the affiliating university:

- Invites experts for recruitment of faculty.
- The faculty of the university provides guidance regarding purchase of books and journals and setting up of labs.
- Invite resource persons for extension lectures/ seminars/ conferences from the university.
- The faculty participates in faculty improvement programmes organized by the university.
- The institution gets funds for organizing seminars/ conferences.
- The institution gets travel grants for the faculty.
- The students receive scholarships from the university.

Being members of academic, administrative and decision making bodies of the university the faculty of the institution often interacts with the affiliating university. They contribute towards the functioning of the university as members of Senate, Syndicate, Faculties, Academic Council, Boards of Study, College Development Council, Sports Council, Selection Committees and Inspection Committees. They are also members of some committees formed for specific purposes like Committees for the Introduction of Semester System, Inquiry Committees, Purchase Committees, Fee Committees, to name a few. Members of our management and even students have been members of the fee committee formed by the university.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

The curricula are designed by the UG/PG Boards of Studies and approved by the Faculties, Academic Council, Syndicate and Senate of Panjab University i.e. the affiliating university.

The college has been richly contributing in the deliberations and decisions of these bodies through its Principal and faculty for the university system as a whole, as the decisions of these bodies are applicable to the university as well as all the affiliated institutions.

Some of the faculty members have been or are members of Board of Studies, Faculties, Academic Council and other academic bodies of the affiliating university. They have made significant contributions in the development of the curriculum.

Few of them have been members of committees specially formed to discuss issues related to evaluation system like internal assessment, introduction of Semester System etc.

- 1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Need Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

The college has itself designed the curriculum for the non-formal courses like Computer Basics (one month), Certificate Course in Computer Hardware and Networking (one month), Diploma in Computer Programming (one year), Computer Based Accounting and Spoken English.

1.1.8 How does the institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution holds regular meetings of the staff, heads of the departments, advisory committee and the departments to analyze and ensure that the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation. The analysis is based on:

- The evaluation of the performance of the students both in the house exams and in the class.
- Comparison and analysis of result of annual exams.
- Feedback from external examiners who conduct practical exams/ viva-voce and evaluate projects.
- Feedback from heads of departments, teachers and students.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

To equip the youth with employable skills, in addition to the traditional programmes, the institution provides a number of certificate/ diploma/ skill development courses. These courses are as follows:

- Career oriented add-on-courses in Fashion Designing, Nursery Teachers Training, Animation and Graphics and Computer Based Accounting in the form of certificate/diploma/advanced diploma.
- A certificate course in Introduction to Computer Science in Modular form, is offered to all the undergraduate students as an additional optional subject.
- Programmes like BCA, PGDCA, M.Sc. (IT), BBA, B.Com., M.Com., B.Sc. (Non-Medical) have a significant skill component.
- Elective subjects as Office Management and Secretarial Practices, Computer Science, Music (Vocal) and Physical Education, being offered to the students of B.A., impart skills and enhance employability.
- For optimum utilization of its infrastructure and as an extension activity, the college made its faculty and infrastructure available to Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College, Ludhiana to run short term skill based courses like Electrician, Computers, Stitching and Embroidery for the benefit of non-students.
- The college has also offered courses like Computer Basics and Fashion Technology in collaboration with Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh to students and non-students.
- Short Term Courses in computers and spoken English are also being held in the non-formal mode.

The main objective of offering these courses is to enrich the degrees and enable the students to get gainful employment or start their own ventures.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning /dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

No, rules of the affiliating University do not permit twinning programmes or dual degrees at present. However, some courses are offered as add-on courses and certificate courses which can be pursued by the students along with the regular degrees. Certificate,

Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses are offered in Fashion Designing, Computer Based Accounting, Animation and Graphics and Nursery Teachers Training as add-on-courses. An additional optional subject of Introduction to Computer Science in modular form is offered to all the students of UG classes.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability

The college offers courses as B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. (Non-Medical), B.C.A., B.B.A., M.A. (Punjabi), M.A. (Political Science), M.A. (Sociology), M.Com., M.Sc. (IT) and P.G.D.C.A.

A variety of elective options including skill based subjects are offered at the undergraduate level to the students of humanities.

Honours in Political Science is offered to the students of B.A. programme.

The college also offers Add-on-courses in Computer Based Accounting, Fashion Designing, Nursery Teachers Training and Animation and Graphics.

Introduction to Computer Science in modular form is offered to all under-graduate students as an additional optional subject.

Some courses are offered in the non-formal mode as well.

The above mentioned courses and a large number of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities carried out in the institution, provide academic flexibility and cater to the academic needs of the area so as to enable skill development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improve potential for employability.

Details of various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility are given below:

a) Range of core/elective options offered:

The subjects/papers offered by the college in programmes like B.Com., B.B.A., B.C.A., P.G.D.C.A., M.A. (Punjabi), M.A. (Political Science), M.A. (Sociology), M.Com. and M.Sc. (IT) are compulsory and form the core options. Besides the programme specific subjects like English, Punjabi/History and Culture of Punjab and Environment Education and Road Safety are compulsory and form the core options in all undergraduate classes i.e. B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., B.B.A. and B.C.A.

The College offers a good range of elective options in B.A. programme. The subjects of Elective English, Hindi, Punjabi, History, Political Science, Economics, Mathematics, Physical Education, Office Management and Secretarial Practice,

Computer Science, Sociology and Music (Vocal) are offered in 134 different elective combinations. For list of elective combinations refer Annexure - II

In B.Sc. (Non-Medical) the students have the option of studying Chemistry or Computer Science as an elective subject besides Physics and Mathematics.

In addition to these, Honours in the subject of Political Science is being offered to the students of B.A.

b) Choice Based Credit System:

It is the affiliating university that designs and recommends the curriculum for all the courses/subjects. At present there is no provision of Choice Based Credit System.

c) Courses offered in modular form:

To impart computer literacy, Certificate Course in Introduction to Computer Science is being offered to students of under graduate classes, in modular form, as an additional optional subject.

d) Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses:

University rules do not allow lateral mobility in any of the course being offered in affiliated colleges.

For vertical movement of students from one level of education to the next higher level the institution offers the following courses:

- Diploma and Advanced Diploma Courses as add-on-courses for movement from certificate courses.
- PGDCA for movement from any of the under-graduate courses.
- Post Graduate courses in humanities, commerce and computer science streams for movement from B.A., B.Com./ BBA and BCA respectively.

e) Enrichment courses

To strengthen and enrich the degrees and enhance employability of the students, the college offers the following Career-oriented courses as Add-on-courses in the form of certificate, diploma and advanced diploma courses in Fashion Designing, Computer Based Accounting, Nursery Teachers Training and Animation and Graphics to the students of undergraduate classes.

The college also offers Introduction to Computer Science as an additional optional subject in modular form and Environment and Road Safety Education as a compulsory subject to all the Under Graduate students.

Enrichment programmes in Spoken English, TALLY, use of Computers and Internet etc. are offered in non-formal mode.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

All the programmes / courses/ subjects introduced since 1981, are in the self-financing mode or are being subsidized by the institution from its own resources.

^{*}The fee structure is decided by the affiliating university which is not financially self-supporting in the case of some of these courses. The institution meets the additional expenditure from its own resources.

The financial resources generated by the self-financed courses have helped in improving the infrastructure and learning resources of the institution.

Besides difference in fee structure, the self-financing courses are mainly skill based, possessing global significance and high employability of the students.

The faculty for these courses is appointed as per UGC/P.U. norms. Where ever eligible teachers are not available, faculty is appointed on contract basis, which is retained session after session and paid higher salary than the similarly placed teachers, appointed for other courses.

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes, the college provides additional skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets. Such programmes have been discussed in 1.2.1 and 1.2.3 (e).

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

No, the affiliating university does not provide a combination of faceto face and distance mode of education for students of affiliated colleges. However, the students can move from distance mode, being run by the university, to the colleges and vice-versa. The college encourages such students to seek admission in their subsequent years of study in three year degree courses like B.A., B.Com. and M.Com.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The courses being offered by the institution are in accordance with its goals and objectives. Conscious efforts are made to supplement the university's curriculum through various modes to ensure that these programmes and the institution's goals and objectives are further integrated. Some of these methods are as follows:

Students are given assignments and projects to imbibe creative and research aptitude, provide practical / industrial training, etc.

Extension lectures and seminars on varied topics and subjects are organized.

The institution offers some courses in the non-formal mode like spoken English, TALLY, use of computers and internet etc.

Efforts are made to generate interest of the students to acquire skills in performing arts like theatre, music, dances and fine arts including traditional ones.

The co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are planned so as to enhance employable skills like personality development, leadership qualities, communicative skills etc.

The institution organizes and ensures participation of the students in youth festivals, seminars, conferences, debates, plays, skits, poster making competitions, writing competitions, movie shows, music concerts, dance shows etc.

Co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities are also organized to create awareness towards social, environmental, legal, health related issues and inculcate a value system among students.

Campaigns/training sessions like awareness drives, tree plantation, traffic awareness, first aid training, moral education, cleanliness drives, blood donation camps etc. are also organized from time to time.

Guru Nanak Dev Jayanti (*Gupurav*) is celebrated every year. Renowned personalities are invited to address the students and share with them the philosophy of Guru Nanak, especially his teachings regarding equality, social reforms, status of women, moral values etc. On this occasion the students prepare community lunch (*Langar*) with voluntary contributions. The guests, management, teaching and non-teaching staff and students par-take it together.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with needs of the dynamic employment market?

The institution follows the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university which by and large follows the national curriculum for each course. The university has representation of teaching faculty on its Boards of Study, Faculties and the Academic Council. It also has representation of academia and other stake holders as Fellows of the Senate and Members of the Syndicate, the decision making bodies of the university. These bodies take care of all the subject specific requirements while framing the curriculum.

A number of faculty members of the institution are on these bodies of the university. They make rich contribution towards framing of the curriculum (for details refer 1.1.6).

The institution supplements the curriculum with enrichment programmes as discussed in 1.2.1, 1.2.3 (e) and 1.3.1.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The institution has integrated the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc. both in formal as well as non-formal ways.

Gender: The institution promotes gender equity and sensitizes the students through planned co-curricular and extra-curricular activities like seminars, conferences, debates, essay writing competitions, plays, skits, choreographies, guest lectures etc. organized from time to time. Students are sensitized regarding the legal rights of women, the evil of dowry, female foeticide and domestic and sexual violence. Awareness campaigns in this regard are also carried out. A seminar sponsored by College Development

Council, Panjab University, Chandigarh on 'Creating Awareness among Students against Domestic and Sexual Violence in Women and Children' was organized.

Climate Change and Environmental Education: The subject of Environmental Education is compulsory for undergraduate classes of all streams. It also includes the issue of Climate Change in the syllabus. In addition to this, awareness programmes are carried out by NSS and Youth Club etc. Environment Week and Science Day are celebrated in which tree plantation campaign is organized, lectures by experts are arranged and competitions like poster making, paper reading etc. are held.

Human Rights: Awareness about human rights is propagated by organizing seminars, extension lectures, cultural activities like plays, skits, choreographies etc. UGC and ICSSR sponsored seminars have been organized to highlight the issue of Human Rights of migratory labour and farmers' suicides in Punjab.

The topic of Human Rights also forms a part of syllabi of some subjects / courses like Political Science and Sociology.

ICT: The institution runs ICT based courses like BCA, PGDCA, and M.Sc. (IT).

Computer Science as an elective subject is taught in B.A. and B.Sc.

ICT is taught as a compulsory subject in BBA and M.Com.

Animation and Graphics and Computer Based Accounting as Addon-courses are offered in undergraduate classes.

An additional optional subject of Introduction to Computer Science in modular form is offered to all the graduates who do not study it as an elective or compulsory subject. Efforts are made that all of the students of UG classes opt for it in the third year of study.

Road Safety: In addition to the above issues, Road Safety is being taught as a compulsory subject along with Environment Education to all the UG students. In collaboration with Punjab State Apex Body of NGO's and Punjab Police, road safety campaigns have been carried out.

Health and Physical Fitness: The students are also sensitized to the importance of Health, Physical Fitness and the menace of Drug Addiction through various non-formal ways. These issues are propagated through numerous activities carried out by its various units like clubs, societies, NCC, NSS, Youth Club, Red Ribbon Club etc. Extension lectures are also organized for the benefit of the students on such issues. The students are motivated to participate in physical activities in one way or the other.

Others: An awareness campaign under SVEEP was organized in collaboration with Nehru Yuva Kendra, Ludhiana to motivate the students and representatives of rural clubs to participate in the electoral process by casting their votes and staying away from drugs.

- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 - moral and ethical values
 - employable and life skills
 - better career options
 - community orientation

To ensure holistic development of the students, the institution offers value-added / enrichment programmes, in both formal as well as non-formal ways.

Moral and Ethical Values:

Believing in the concept that moral and ethical values can be imbibed only through practice and not by mere preaching, we teach these to our students by practicing these in each and every area of our activity.

Values like honesty, dignity of labour, fairness, equal respect for all human beings irrespective of caste, creed or sex, discipline, patriotism, love of fellow human beings, community service, work ethics etc. are focused through various activities like seminars, debates, writing competitions, youth festivals, dramas, skits, choreographies, movie shows, extension lectures, celebrating religious functions etc. Such activities are also imparted through NSS Camps, activities of NCC and Youth Clubs.

Programmes on personality development and inculcation of moral values among students are conducted through Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Ludhiana. An examination on moral values is also conducted annually by it. Lectures are also arranged for this purpose.

Employable and Life skills:

In addition to the skill oriented courses mentioned in 1.2.1 and 1.2.3 we organize activities to develop employable and life skills as given below:

To improve communication skills, especially in English, we have set up a Language Lab and organize activities such as debates, declamations, group discussions etc.

We arrange short term courses in TALLY, use of computers and internet, typing and shorthand, spoken English especially during summer vacations in the non-formal mode.

We promote performing arts like music, theatre, dances etc. through various cultural activities for which even the services of professionals are sought to train the students.

The students are engaged in surveys, tours, presentations, projects, seminars, real life events etc. to enhance their life skills. They are also involved in organizing functions and academic, cultural and sports events under the overall supervision of the teachers.

The students are encouraged to attend camps organized by NCC, Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Ludhiana and Youth Welfare Departments of Panjab University and Punjab Government.

Lectures on personality development are also organized by the college.

Better Career Options:

In addition to the courses and activities mentioned under the heading Employable and Life Skills, the institution provides career counselling through its career guidance and counselling cell and during the assemblies and functions. While addressing the students, especially during farewell parties to outgoing classes, the head of the institution and members of the management give useful advice and tips regarding career options.

The college organizes extension lectures, coaching for entry to service and entrance exams, guidance for UGC NET exam, and arranges summer/industrial training for its students pursuing the programmes of M.Sc. (IT), BBA, M.Com. and offers the subject of Office Management and Secretarial Practices etc.

Community Orientation:

The college makes concerted efforts to orient the students and faculty to the needs and requirements of the community.

For this the students are involved by ensuring their active participation in awareness campaigns related to community service, environmental issues, sanitation and cleanliness on the campus and surroundings, traffic rules, human-rights, female foeticide, dowry, drug addiction, prevention of AIDS, tree plantation, blood donation etc. through NCC, NSS, clubs, societies etc. Extension lectures and seminars are often organized for this purpose. *Langar* (community lunch) is organized every year. The students are involved in collection of voluntary contributions, cooking and distribution of food which is partaken in *pangats* (rows) in which students of all castes and religions work together.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The need to introduce new courses and enrichment of the curriculum is assessed by the institution and the teachers on the basis of feedback received from the stake holders like students, parents, management, academic peers, people of the area, alumni etc. The head of the institution and the teachers often interact with other members of the academic fraternity and acquaint themselves with the developments in the field of higher education, thus making their contribution. Some of the examples regarding use of feedback from stakeholders in introducing new courses/subjects are as follows:

- The add-on courses like Computer Based Accounting, Fashion Designing, Animation and Graphics and Nursery Teachers Training in the formal mode and short term courses in computers and spoken English in the non-formal mode have been introduced after receiving feedback from the employers.
 - A good number of our commerce graduates are placed in industry around Doraha. Based on feedback from their employers, Computer Based Accounting was introduced as an add-on course.
 - Similarly, Ludhiana is a big center for garments and an Apparel Park is coming up at Doraha. This led to the introduction of Fashion Designing as an add-on-course.
- ii. M.A. (Sociology) has been started from the session 2010-11. The course was hitherto being offered by a single Women College of the district. Being an important subject of humanities, there was a demand from the students to introduce this course.
- iii. Keeping in view the consistent demand and peer advice and need for the promotion of Science, B.Sc. (Non-Medical) too has been started from the session 2010-11.
- iv. The subject of Music (Vocal) was introduced as there was no such facility for boys in the entire district of Ludhiana. Moreover, Namdhari, a religious sect based at Bhaini Sahib, a close by village, promotes Indian classical Music in a big way. There was a demand to start this subject at under-graduate level.

This feedback is also used for enriching the curriculum of various courses/ subjects through its faculty who are members of various academic bodies of the affiliating university like Boards of Study, Faculties, Academic Council, Senate and Syndicate.

For list of faculty members who have been contributing in such bodies refer 1.1.6.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The quality of the enrichment programmes is monitored through the feedback received from the students, people of the area, the employers and from the observation and evaluation of the students during the course of their academic progression in the college.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Formal and non-formal feedback on curriculum is received from all quarters. The students provide feedback through feedback proforma and interaction with the faculty and the head of the institution.

Parents, Alumni and Community give feedback in non-formal way through the faculty, principal and the management.

They in turn interact with academic peers and faculty of other institutions at different forums and often discuss curricular aspects to share the feedback.

This feedback is conveyed to the university through its faculty members who are part of various academic and administrative bodies of the university as mentioned in 1.1.6.

For further details refer 1.3.5.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

During the last four years the programmes/courses like B.Sc. (Non-Medical) and M.A. (Sociology) have been introduced. In addition to these, Diplomas in Fashion Designing, Nursery Teachers Training and Animation & Graphics and Advanced Diplomas in Nursery Teachers Training and Animation & Graphics have been started.

The need to introduce new courses is assessed by the institution by getting feedback from the stake holders as the students, faculty, management, parents etc. The national and global needs and trends are also kept in view. The primary focus however, remains on providing sufficient number of programme/subject options to the youth of the area, increasing their employability by providing skill based courses and contributing to increase the gross enrolment rate (GER) of the nation in higher education. The course preference of the youth of the area is also duly kept in mind so as to assure that a sufficient number of students are available to run the course. Financial viability is also assessed before the start of the course.

For example the trend to study computer courses had though picked up, but there is dearth of quality teachers in this field. Moreover, it was felt that a P.G. course in IT would enhance the employability of computer graduates, not only as teachers but also in the IT industry. This led to the introduction of M.Sc. (IT) in the session 2009-10.

M.A. (Sociology) was introduced in the session 2010-11 as there was a demand from the students as mentioned in 1.3.5.

Similarly B.Sc. (Non-Medical) too was introduced from the session 2010-11 due to consistent demand and peer advice. Data regarding the number of students opting Non-medical stream in 10+2 (the feeding class) and their preference for further studies was collected from the surrounding schools while taking the decision.

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the college would like to include.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Students Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college ensures publicity and transparency in the admission process in the following ways:

a. Prospectus:

The college prospectus provides complete information about the institution like the aims and objectives, faculty, admission process, dates of admission, academic schedule, courses offered, eligibility conditions for each course, options/subjects available, evaluation system, criteria for internal assessment, fee/funds, scholarships, financial aid, activities, facilities provided etc.

b. Institutional Website:

The institutional website has been hosted, which is regularly updated. It provides complete information about the institution. The copy of the prospectus as well as the admission form is available on the website.

On-line submission of admission forms has been introduced from the session 2014-15.

c. Advertisement in Regional/National Newspapers:

The dates of admission, courses offered and the admission process are advertised in the regional newspapers.

d. Any other (specify):

Apart from this, the college issues posters, pamphlets and banners for publicizing the dates of admission and courses offered by it. It also advertises through the cable TV network in the surrounding towns and villages.

The faculty of the college visits schools of the area for the publicity of the courses offered and facilities provided. The faculty of the institution visits the homes of the prospective admission seekers and/or contacts them telephonically, especially the girls. The parents and admission seekers are informed about the courses offered, the facilities, student welfare schemes and the admission process. They also provide guidance and

counselling regarding the options available not only in the college but also elsewhere. The parents are convinced to educate their daughters wherever found reluctant due to social or financial constraints. They are made aware of the financial aid available to different categories of students like S.C./S.T.'s, minorities, economically weaker sections, meritorious students, sports persons or other talented youngsters.

Admission process of the institution is wholly transparent. Complete information regarding courses offered, admission process and admission dates is provided through the above mentioned methods. Applications are invited in advance and merit list displayed in the case of programmes having a high demand ratio. Interviews for admission are held on preannounced dates.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

Guidelines of the state government and affiliating university, issued from time to time, are followed for the selection of the students for admission to these courses.

Admission is purely on merit and as per the the criteria provided by the affiliating university.

Reservation policy of the state government is followed.

Applications for courses like B.Sc., B.C.A., B.B.A., B.Com., M.Com., M.Sc. (IT) etc. are invited in advance. The merit list is displayed on the notice board on pre-announced dates and candidates are called for interview. The principle of first come first served is followed in the case of classes where sufficient number of seats is available.

Elective subjects are allowed to the students on the basis of interview and marks obtained in the lower class.

Elective subjects as Physical Education and Music (Vocal) in B.A. are provided to the students on the basis of tests/trials.

Brilliant students are advised to opt subjects like English (Elective), Economics, Computer Science, Sociology, Mathematics etc. in B.A. They are also encouraged to opt for add-on-courses or honours.

2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

Minimum percentage of marks for admission to colleges located in cities and big towns like Chandigarh, Ludhiana, Khanna, Ferozepur, Moga, Abohar, Hoshiarpur etc. affiliated to Panjab University Chandigarh is much higher than at this college. For instance during the session 2014-15, the lowest cut-off percentage for admissions to B.Com. I in a college of Chandigarh is 84.4% including the weightage for commerce subjects studied in the qualifying exam. The same in this college however, is 63%. Same is the case in other courses as well.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission process and the student profile are reviewed annually. Meetings of the heads of the departments and the advisory committee are held before the admissions and at the culmination of each session to draw various strategies. Faculty requirement, based on the estimated student strength of admissions, is worked out well in advance and appointments made accordingly.

Based on these reviews and the past experience, the college has procured software with private participation that has been designed as per our institutional needs. This software facilitates us to monitor the admission process on day to day basis. Submission of on-line admission forms has been introduced. Information regarding number of students admitted, student profile on the basis of gender, caste,

religion, economic status, rural/urban background, religion, academic performance in the lower exam passed etc. is retrieved and analyzed. It also helps us to monitor allocation of elective subjects and number of seats available in each course/subject category wise. Corrective measures are taken on day to day basis.

To ensure equity, we chalk out a plan much before the commencement of the session. Teams of teachers visit schools and villages of the area to interact with the students for guidance and counselling. They convince the reluctant parents to send their daughters for higher education. Financial help is ensured to the needy and meritorious students. We believe that no student should be deprived of the facility of higher education for want of financial resources.

Admission committees are formed for admissions.

The yearly review of the admission process has helped us to streamline it. The development of the software is a result of such an exercise.

This procedure has also helped us to reach out to the disadvantaged sections like the female students, economically weaker sections, students from SC and OBC categories, meritorious students and students belonging to rural areas. It has improved the enrollment rate. This has also resulted in attracting academically good students to the institution.

2.1.5 Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion.

The main objective of the institution is to provide quality education to all the sections of the society, especially the deprived ones. Strategies are adopted to increase/improve access to different sections as given below:

i. Students from S.C/S.T. and O.B.C. Categories:

Students from the disadvantaged communities like S.C./ S.T. and O.B.C. categories are encouraged to pursue higher education. They are informed about the financial aid available to them and are helped to receive it. During the session 2013-14, 343 students belonging to S.C. category were given fee concession to the tune of Rs. 53,91,902/- and applied for scholarships amounting Rs. 12,54,484/-. Similarly 74 students belonging to OBC categories applied for scholarships. Reservation policy of the state government is followed. During the session 2013-14, the number of S.C. and B.C. students

admitted were 446 (25.87%) and 192 (11.11%) respectively. Remedial coaching is provided to these students. Coaching for entry to service with UGC support has also been taken up. Scholarships and financial aid from the government is available for them. Minimum marks for eligibility for admission to all courses is relaxed by 5% for students from S.C./ S.T. categories.

ii. Women:

Access to higher education to women is given top priority. Keeping in mind the social inhibition of women education in co-educational institutions, a separate wing for girls with class rooms, labs, canteen, common room, girls hostel, women staff room, library facility, sports facilities etc. has been established within the campus. A senior lady teacher is the in-charge of this wing. There is a separate main entry gate for the girls. Some classes of girl students are taken in this wing. The girls from the co-education sections move to the girl's wing during their free periods. Majority of our faculty members are also ladies.

Most of the girls commute from villages and nearby towns. To avoid travel hazards, female students are ferried in vans from their doorstep. For this, transport facility with private participation, has been arranged for them. Keeping in view the financial position of the students, the institution keeps a check on the van charges. Fee concession/financial support is also provided to the female students.

Teams of staff members visit the families of girls and provide guidance and counselling to them before the admissions of the new session as mentioned in 2.1.1.

Separate sports and cultural activities are organized for girls and they are encouraged to participate in them.

As a result, the number of female students in the institution is higher than that of the male students. During the session 2013-14 the number of female students was 999 (57.81%).

There is a provision of two additional seats for single girl child or one of the two sisters.

iii. Differently-abled:

Differently abled students occasionally seek admission to the institution. Before admissions our faculty provides counselling and guidance to such students and makes them aware of the courses and facilities available in the college and tries to convince them to pursue higher education. Ramps in the

corridors and toilet facility in the campus have been provided for physically challenged students. Almost all the major activities are carried out on the ground floor.

iv. Economically-weaker sections:

Liberal financial support is arranged/ provided to the students of all sections so much so that not even a single student is turned back for economic reasons. In some cases if a student is otherwise aspiring but due to utter penury fails to pay off his or her fees, almost the entire financial burden is borne by the institution and in some cases even by the faculty.

v. Minority Community:

A large number of students from the minority community too are on the rolls of the institution. Remedial coaching and coaching for entry to service was also organized with UGC support. The students are made aware of the schemes of the government. These students are helped to apply for scholarships and financial aid is provided by the government. The number of such students during the session 2013-14 was 1335 (77.44%).

vi. Sports persons:

Special efforts are made to attract sports persons for pursuing higher education. They are given financial aid, sports kits, diet money, coaching facilities etc. They are counseled to devote time to studies along with sports for a better future. A well-equipped gym has been set up and gym instructor appointed. Outstanding sports persons are given scholarships/financial aid, awards and honours.

vii. Persons good at performing arts:

The institution has a healthy tradition of promoting art, culture and cultural heritage. The subject of Music (Vocal) has been introduced for this purpose. A number of students, good at music, theatre and dances, are attracted to the institution due to its glorious achievements in these fields. Cultural activities are promoted and youth festivals organized quite often. Outstanding students of this category are also given fee concessions, financial aid and academic guidance. Outstanding performers are given scholarships/financial aid, awards and honours.

viii. Wards of Migratory Labour:

In this category, the support rendered to the wards of migratory labour from UP, Bihar, Uttar Khand, Rajasthan etc. need a

special mention. Ludhiana is an industrial town. Most of the migratory labour working in the industry are economically weak or belong to the lower middle class. It is difficult for them to afford higher education for their wards. Many such students pursue their studies in the college. The institution liberally provides fee concessions and financial aid to this category of students also. The fee is also charged in easy installments. Keeping their convenience in mind, the date for deposition of fee is often extended.

ix. Students from Rural Areas:

Majority of the students of the college, even from the above mentioned categories, are from rural areas. They come from about 250 villages. During the session 2013-14, 1232 (71.46%) students belonged to this category. These students are deprived of quality school education. Door to door counselling and guidance by the faculty of the college is offered to these students before admissions. Such students are suggested to choose programmes and elective options keeping in mind their educational background and performance in qualifying exams. Remedial and bridge courses for these students are also organized so as to make up their deficiencies. College timings are adjusted so that they reach the college in time for their classes.

Books are provided from the book bank for the whole session to the needy and meritorious students.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution is sensitive to the needs of differently-abled students. Efforts are made to adhere to government policies. The campus has been made friendly for the use of such students. Catering to their requirements, ramps and toilets have been constructed.

The reservation policy of the state government, for this category of students, is followed. However, only a few students are available for admissions.

Differently-abled students are also provided financial aid and helped to apply for scholarships to Panjab University and government agencies.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The needs of the students in terms of knowledge and skills are assessed before the commencement of the programmes.

Based on the performance of previous batches, it has been identified that students of most under-graduate courses are generally weak in English and those pursuing B.Com. are weak in Accountancy and BCA and BBA in Mathematics.

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.

The college has identified that most of the students are weak at English and have little or no knowledge of computers. To bridge the knowledge gap the institution organizes basic course in Computers and English including spoken, for the students seeking admission to the under-graduate courses, during summer vacations. These courses are open to both students as well as non-students. Those who seek admission to the college are not charged for these courses.

As only a few students avail this facility, the institution also makes efforts to bridge the knowledge gap after admissions of the students to enable them to cope up with the programme of their choice.

For the first few days basics of the subject are taught to them.

In addition to this, subjects where most of the students are weak or need separate coaching, extra lectures per week are provided as follows:

i. In the case of English in B.A. I, II and III, extra classes are

arranged for all students. These are given in the form of tutorials in small groups.

- ii. In B.C.A. I and III, extra periods are provided in Mathematics to all students.
- iii. In B.Com. I, extra periods are provided in Accountancy.

As a general practice, the teachers take extra classes where ever the syllabus lags behind.

Remedial coaching to the slow learners is arranged in other subjects/courses as well. Whenever such students have requested for special coaching in any discipline, a teacher is arranged for the purpose. While the teachers engaged for extra work are paid as per rules, the college never charges any extra fee from the students. During the last three years, remedial coaching has been provided in the subjects of English, Commerce, Computer Science, Political Science, History and Mathematics.

Study material is translated and provided in vernacular language wherever it is not available especially for the students of M.A. Sociology and Political Science.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

To sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. the institution organizes activities like seminars, extension lectures, plays, debates, extension activities, poster competitions, writing competitions, awareness campaigns, outreach programmes etc.

Also refer 1.3.3 for additional information.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Special attention is paid to encourage the advanced learners to excel and achieve higher goals. At the time of admissions, brilliant students are guided to opt for more challenging courses/subjects. They are encouraged to go for career oriented add on courses, ICT based courses and opt for challenging subjects in B.A. Brilliant students, with Political Science as an elective option, are advised to study Honours programme in B.A. II and III.

Advanced learners are assigned special study tasks and projects. They are nominated on the Students' Welfare Council. Some creative advanced learners are nominated as editors of different sections of magazine. Such students are also nominated as office bearers of clubs and societies. Efforts are made to enhance their capabilities and polish their personalities by giving them opportunities to organize various activities and participate in quizzes, debates,

creative writing and paper reading contests, prepare projects, present seminars and are given assignments etc. They are provided special library facilities like additional books and study material, awarded incentive stipends, scholarships, prizes, merit certificates etc. They are also encouraged to attend leadership training camps and personality development programmes.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The process of identification of slow learners begins at the time of admissions itself. The students with comparatively lower scores in qualifying exams are appraised of the need to work hard if they want to opt for a challenging course. During the first few weeks after admissions, the progress of the student is closely watched on the basis of the response in the classroom, home task, class tests etc. Students found deficient in any course/subject are guided to improve. Sometimes the parents are also invited to discuss the progress of the student and they are counseled to prepare the ward to go for a suitable change of subject/course/faculty. For instance - During the session 2012-13, 14 students changed their faculty and 123 of them changed one or more subjects in B.A. Similarly, during the session 2013-14, 18 students changed their faculty and 134 changed the subjects.

If the students wish to change the subject due to adjustment of time table, financial constraints or initial problems in coping up, they are counseled and guided and their problems solved accordingly through adjustment of time table, providing fee concession/financial support, change of section or by providing special attention by the teacher.

In addition to this, in subjects where students are weak or need extra coaching, extra classes or remedial classes are provided.

For further details refer 2.2.3.

A close watch on the attendance of the students in the class is kept by the teachers. Corrective measures are taken if needed.

Parent teacher meetings are held where required. The information regarding attendance at lectures and marks obtained in house exams is sent to the parents through post.

SMS package has been procured to keep the parents informed about the progress of their wards. Teachers, sometimes, call the parents telephonically also.

Guidance and counselling is provided to less motivated students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic calendar of the institution is meticulously planned before the beginning of the session keeping in view the vacation and examination schedule provided by the affiliating university. The session is divided into three terms. House examinations are held at the end of the first term i.e. in September/October and second term i.e. in December for UG classes. In courses following semester system of examination, class tests and mid semester tests are planned.

In order to make their teaching more effective the teachers are encouraged to make teaching-plans and prepare strategies to handle the different aspects of syllabus. The syllabus for each subject is unitized term wise and a printed copy of the same is distributed among the students. The departmental meetings are held frequently to ensure that the schedule of work is implemented. Mid-course corrections, if needed, are decided in the meetings. The question papers for house examinations, based on pre-determined course content/syllabus, are got set well in advance.

The evaluation blue print for all courses is given in the prospectus. In addition, the internal assessment and its criteria are conveyed to the students through notices, assemblies and announcements made by the teachers in their respective classes. The performance of the learners, on the basis of seminars, group discussions, snap tests, assignments, projects, practicals and day to day performance, also forms the basis of evaluation. The departments plan and the teachers monitor these aspects. These are discussed in staff and department meetings. The house examinations and the attendance at lectures form a part of the internal assessment and the basis of eligibility for appearing in annual/semester exams.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

Though we have an IQAC in place it has yet to be institutionalized. Most of the quality assurance is done through the statutory advisory committee comprising of the principal and senior faculty members. The process of quality assurance has contributed significantly to improve the teaching learning process in the following ways:

- Planning new courses
- Planning academic schedule and admission process
- Up-gradation of library and learning resources

- Improving computer infrastructure
- Planning organization of seminars/conferences
- Planning remedial classes and extra classes on the basis of feedback from teachers and performance of students
- Incentives to advanced learners
- Procuring gadgets and their use for interactive learning
- Purchase/development of software
- Planning and improving the admission process
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The institution puts in conscious, consistent and coordinated efforts to make the teaching-learning process effective. For this the institution has evolved a high work ethic among the staff as well as students. Frequent meetings, formal as well as informal, are held to plan strategies to supplement/replace the lecture method with other learner-centered activities.

The student-centric methods like assignments, seminars, group discussions, presentations, practicals, debates, quizzes, wall posters, audio-visual aids, question answer sessions, class tests, snap tests, writing of project reports, case studies, field work, net surfing, workshops, surveys, mock elections, real life events etc. form a part of our teaching learning process. Some of these components form a significant part of the evaluation process in most of the courses like M.Com., M.Sc. (IT), M.A. (Political Science), M.A. (Punjabi), M.A. (Sociology), B.B.A., B.C.A., B.Sc. (Non-Medical), B.Com., PGDCA etc. Even in B.A. the subjects of Music (Vocal), Physical Education, Computer Science, Office Management and Secretarial Practice, has a significant component of projects, practicals and assignments.

The approach followed in the teaching of add-on-courses of Computer Based Accounting, Fashion Designing, Animation and Graphics and Nursery Teachers Training is predominantly student centric.

Some courses like spoken English are also offered in the non-formal mode which involves interactive learning.

College Magazine and Wall Magazine too give the students an opportunity to promote creativity.

The following support structures and systems are available for teachers to develop such skills:

- Training is provided to the teachers to enable them to use gadgets for computer aided teaching.
- Equipment like projectors, laptops, visualizer, interactive boards, scanners etc. have been provided.
- Library and e-resources are regularly updated.
- Computer facility with internet is provided to the teachers.
- Faculty is motivated to attend seminars/workshops/training programmes.
- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

These aspects are dealt with in the curriculum of most of the courses/subjects. In addition to the provisions in the curriculum, the institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among students in the following ways:

- The students prepare assignments/projects/presentations.
- The practical component, in many of the classes, is aimed at critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper.
- Industrial training/summer training are a part of evaluation process in some programmes.
- The students are involved in group discussions, surveys, mock parliaments, mock elections, case studies etc.
- Extension lectures/ seminar/ conferences are organized in which students also participate.
- The college holds poster competitions, quiz competitions, declamation contests, debates etc.
- The college brings out a college magazine 'UDAR'. The students contribute articles for it. Students are appointed as sub-editors.
- The press club brings out a monthly wall magazine and displays the 'Thought of the Day'.
- The college organizes youth festivals, live shows by renowned artists, plays, movie shows etc. and promotes participation of students in cultural activities like music, theatre, dances and fine arts.
- Science day and environment week are celebrated.
- Experts are invited to train students in creative arts like fashion designing, pottery, paper work etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g.: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The institution is aware of the importance of modern teaching methods. It supports and promotes the use of modern teaching aids and tools like computers, audio-visuals aids, multi-media, ICT, CAL, Internet etc. It regularly adds and upgrades such facilities. It holds regular training programmes for the benefit of its faculty to train them and make them aware of the changing trends in teaching technology so as to make the teaching learning experience effective and fruitful for the students.

The technologies and facilities such as Computers, LCD projectors, Laptops, LCD TV's Over Head Projectors, Visualizer, Language Lab, Audio-Visual /Seminar Room, Smart Class Rooms/Labs, Interactive Gadgets as boards, monitors, projectors etc. are available to ensure effective teaching.

The college has leased line internet connectivity. E-resources in the form of CD's have been added to the library. E-resources have also been subscribed from National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST) of INFLIBNET. Teachers are encouraged to use ICT and CAL.

An audio-visual cell has been set up for this purpose to help the teachers prepare the study material and handle these aids and train them in their use.

A language lab has also been set up.

Apart from teachers, the students are also encouraged to use computer aided teaching aids.

Students are shown movies based on novels and plays being taught in the class as well as those that provide some information and carry social or moral message.

A module for online testing has been added to the college software.

The Department of Music has the facility for recording and editing.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The faculty is exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through the following:

i. Through the library that is regularly updated with new study material

- ii. Through faculty development programmes like seminars, workshops, conferences, refresher courses, orientation courses etc.
- iii. By attending to extension lectures delivered by experts.
- iv. Interaction with faculty of the institution, universities of the region and other institutions.
- v. By improving their qualifications.
- vi. Through internet and E-resources
- vii. Through newspapers, journals and periodicals

In addition to class room teaching, the students are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills through the following ways:

- i. Through the library which is regularly updated with new study material
- ii. Newspapers, journals and periodicals
- iii. Internet and E-resources
- iv. Seminars/group discussions/quizzes/presentations
- v. Extension lectures
- vi. Surveys
- vii. Mock activities
- viii. Visits to industry, educational institutions, historical places, places of social significance, villages, Parliament, Vidhan Sabha etc.
- ix. Industrial training, summer training and projects.
- x. Through participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities
- xi. Attending camps organized by Youth Welfare Department, Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle and NCC.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students /benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

The institution provides academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services.

Guidance and counselling is provided to the students, both at the academic and personal level by the faculty. The process begins much before the commencement of the new session as the faculty members move from door to door and try to convince the eligible candidates and their parents regarding the importance of higher education and the benefits there of. Motivated thus, the students seek admission. They are then further guided for the right choice of the

programmes/courses/elective subjects, opting of one or the other add on course etc.

Special emphasis is laid on personal interaction between the students and teachers outside the classroom. Most of the senior teachers have been allotted individual/departmental rooms to meet the students for personal and academic counselling.

Guidance and motivation continues throughout the year as the students are exhorted to participate in sports, cultural and co-curricular activities in order to enhance their personality. Students of this institution confide in their teachers and openly discuss their personal as well as family problems which are resolved by the faculty at the level of the student or sometimes with the involvement of their parents and the guardians as well.

For change of faculty/ subject, the teachers as well as the head of the institution provide proper counselling to the students. The choice of the student and his/her performance in the lower exam passed as well as in the present class are given due consideration while allowing the change. At times, parents are also called for the benefit of the students.

For number of students who have changed their subjects or faculty/programme refer 2.2.6.

Guidance is also provided to advanced learners as well. They are identified on the basis of marks obtained in the lower exam passed, performance in the class, class tests. Such students are motivated to participate in co-curricular activities. They are suggested to consult extra study material.

Many students have benefited from the personal and psycho-social support and guidance. Such students are in many cases identified by the teachers or are reported by their classmates/friends. The teachers have even reached out to their parents to understand the problem and find an appropriate solution. Many students, who were reluctant to continue studies due to psycho-social or economic reasons or family problem, have been convinced to continue studies. Some of them have achieved good scores in academics. For list of such students refer Annexure - III.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

During the last four years, the teachers have adopted the following innovative approaches/methods:

- The music department has procured hardware and software for recording. It has also recorded ragas for the benefit of students.

- Students trained in music, guide other students as the ones having expertise in tabla, classical music (instrumental and vocal), sufi singing, geet / gazal singing, folk singing, folk instruments etc., share their knowledge and demonstrate it through performances.
- Election surveys and mock elections of the Presidents of USA and India are organized.
- Students are shown movies based on course related novels and plays and the ones carrying some social or moral message.
- Surveys in villages and old age homes are carried out by the Sociology Department.
- Students bring out a wall magazine every month.
- Quiz competitions, debates, writing and poster competitions etc. are regularly conducted.
- Projects, seminars, presentations etc. by students are a regular feature.
- Students are trained to prepare presentations.
- Models are used in science subjects to demonstrate 3-D structures

The institution supports and promotes such activities. It regularly adds and upgrades facilities for modern teaching aids and tools like audio-visual aids, equipment for multi-media, ICT, CAL, Internet and other information /materials.

It holds regular training programmes for the benefit of its faculty so as to make them aware of the changing trends in teaching technology and make the teaching learning experience for the students effective and fruitful.

New teaching aids are procured regularly. For details refer 2.3.5.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a well-stocked computerized library with 32800 books that include 235 Encyclopedias.

Internet and reprographic facility is provided in the library.

The campus being a compact one, departmental libraries have not been set up. But a separate library facility has been provided in the girls' wing which has 2575 books, 9 news-papers and 9 periodicals. This library is fully computerized and linked with the main library through networking.

PG students are motivated to visit the library regularly. Sometimes the teachers too take the students to the library.

Faculty and students are informed about newly added books.

Additional books are provided to advanced learners.

Needy students are issued books for the whole year from the book bank or from the library stock, in case multiple copies are available.

To promote readership, best reader among boys and girls is awarded certificate and prize at the end of the year and is also nominated on the Student's Welfare Council.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The institution sometimes faces challenges in completing the curriculum within the time frame and calendar, especially when any teacher proceeds on long leave or at the time of hosting youth festivals etc. Such a challenge is also faced by the students who participate in various sports and cultural activities or attend camps etc.

The institution has in place practices that ensure that the curriculum is completed within the planned framework and calendar. Different approaches have been planned to overcome these situations.

- i. The institution unitizes the syllabus course/subject wise and the booklets are distributed to the faculty and the students. The teachers by and large stick to the schedule and cover the curriculum accordingly.
- ii. The question papers are set well in advance for the house exams and the teachers ensure that the curriculum is covered well in time.
- iii. Meetings of the teachers are held at the departmental level to review the coverage of the curriculum. Corrective measures are taken if needed.
- iv. In subjects with more than one section, the senior teachers, under the guidance of the heads of the departments, coordinate and ensure that the coverage of the curriculum is at an even pace.
- v. Extra classes too are provided in some courses. If needed, the teachers take classes even during preparatory days.

- vi. In case of long leave by a teacher, the work load of other teachers of the department is adjusted/ shared. This is mostly done at the departmental level with the information to the head of the institution.
- vii. Individual students, especially those who participate in various sports and cultural activities or attend camps etc., are readily attended to by the teachers.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The quality of teaching learning is regularly assessed and monitored both from the aspect of the teacher and the taught, collectively as well as individually.

Class room participation/response, regularity at attendance and the results of the class tests, house tests and annual exams, mainly form the basis of evaluation at the learners' end.

Feedback from the students, parents and senior teachers; results of different exams; adoption of modern and innovative teaching techniques; punctuality etc. form the basis of evaluation of the teachers' performance.

Staff meetings and department wise meetings are held to get feedback from the teachers in the coverage of the course content and challenges, if any. This feedback is used to take corrective measures.

In case of student related issues, appropriate steps are taken at the teacher, departmental or institutional level. Parent teacher meetings are called specially in the case of first year classes. Parents are also called in case of individual students if needed. Teachers often discuss student related issues with the head of the institution. Counselling is provided to the students individually or collectively by the senior teachers.

Newly appointed teachers are allotted classes/subjects according to their expertise or comfort level. Mid-session changes are also sometimes made on the basis of the feedback received from the students or the teachers. Head of the institution or the senior teachers provide counselling and guidance to teachers on the basis of this feedback.


Corrective measures regarding curriculum delivery are taken at the departmental level or in discussion with the head of the institution. Adjustment in the time table or work load of the teachers too is made as per requirement.

2.4 Teacher Quality

It is worth mentioning that three of the six teachers with Ph.D. degree have acquired the same while in service at the institution. Two teachers are registered for Ph.D. and are carrying out research work.

The teachers are appointed before the commencement of any new

course. The department wise teaching work-load is assessed in advance and posts of temporary/ad-hoc/contractual faculty advertised and interviews held accordingly.

Competent persons from among the temporary/contractual teachers are retained session after session. In cases of dissatisfactory performance, fresh appointments are made.

Competent teachers, especially in the IT sector, are continued even during vacations.

The teachers are satisfied with the working conditions of the institution to the extent that many contractual teachers are continuing for the last many years. Two of the teachers did not join Government Service even after being selected. One of them, dissatisfied with the work culture of a Government College came back after putting in 6 months of service.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

The institution is offering courses in IT. As very few NET qualified candidates are available to teach these courses, the posts for regular appointments are advertised almost every year. The requirement of teachers is also met by making appointments on contractual basis. Subject experts are invited from the university to conduct interviews even for the appointment of contractual/ad-hoc teachers in these subjects. These teachers are paid higher salaries as compared to other similarly placed ones. Good ones are retained year after year even without interview.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

The institution makes consistent efforts for professional development of the faculty. The college encourages the faculty to improve its qualifications and update its knowledge.

The teachers are encouraged to improve their qualifications. Three of the regular teachers of the college acquired Ph.D. degree and one M.Phil. degree during service. One of the senior commerce teachers has also done PGDCA. Some ad-hoc/temporary teachers have also improved their qualifications during the job in this college.

Teachers are given leave of various kinds and encouraged to carry out research and attend workshops, seminars, conferences,

orientation courses, refresher courses etc. The institution also organizes seminars for this purpose.

The institution too organizes training programmes for the teachers, especially in the use of IT and modern teaching aids, almost every year since 2006. Training programmes/extension lectures in research methodology are also organized.

The college invites experts from the universities of the region or other institutions to deliver extension lectures for the benefit of faculty and the students. During the last four years, 33 such lectures have been organized. During this period, the college has also organized five national level seminars/conferences and one local level seminar, during which 45 eminent scholars/experts and prominent personalities were invited. For list of experts refer 3.7.4.

The teachers interact with the faculty of the universities and colleges of the region as well to update their knowledge.

During the last four years, 15 teachers have attended international and 38 teachers have attended national conferences/seminars, workshops, training programmes etc. Together they have attended 257 such programmes during this time.

During the last four years, the college has organized training programmes for the faculty in the use of Computers, Internet, Audio Visual Aids, material development for CAL, multimedia etc. These programmes are being organized in the months of September and December, at the time of conduct of house examinations almost every year, since the session 2006-07. In addition to this, the college arranges training sessions/ lectures for the benefit of the faculty. Some such initiatives are as follows:

Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu, Principal of the institution gave a multimedia presentation, to demonstrate the use of different tools for the preparation of presentations, even animated ones.

Workshop for training in the use of SPSS was conducted by Ms. Kamalpreet Kaur, Assistant Professor in Commerce.

Extension lectures by experts from other institutions are arranged for the benefit of faculty and students. During the last four years, 47 such lectures were arranged.

During the last four years, six seminars/conferences also have been organized.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (e.g.: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications, teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes, industrial engagement etc.)

To recharge the teachers, the institution has adopted the following policies/systems:

- i. Provides study material by upgrading library and accessibility to e-resources.
- ii. Grants study leave to teachers to pursue Ph.D. e.g. Dr. S. S. Virk and Dr. Amandeep Kullar were sanctioned such leave.
- iii. Grants leave to visit research organizations for perusal of

literature or use of laboratories and interaction with research guides.

- iv. Helps in receiving grant from UGC for research projects.
- v. Helps in receiving travel grant to attend seminars/ conferences in foreign countries.
- vi. Grants duty leave to attend seminars/conferences/workshops and present papers. Ex-India leave was granted to Dr. Gurjeet Virk Sidhu.
- vii. Organizes training programmes for the benefit of teachers.
- viii. Has budgetary provision for research related activities
- ix. Provides computer facility with internet.
- 2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

The State Government gives no such award to college teachers for teaching. However, one of the teachers, Mr. Gursharanjit Singh, has received recognition. He has been honoured with "Best Citizens of India Award 2011" by the International Publishing House, New Delhi and was chosen as the "Best Teacher in their Student Life" which was based on the feedback received from students by PCTE Group of Institutes Ludhiana on Teacher's Day, in 2011.

- 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?
 - i. The institution has introduced feedback pro-formas to be filled in by students for the evaluation of the teachers. The observations made by the students are shared with the teachers, which apart from being a source of encouragement; act as a corrective measure too. These are also discussed in general with the faculty. In some cases the heads of the departments/ senior faculty members are involved to help the teachers to improve.
 - ii. Besides feedback pro-formas, the students freely convey their opinion to the head of the institution. The teachers are advised corrective measures if needed. In addition to the head of the institution, the heads of the departments and the senior faculty members also keep a close watch on the performance of the newly appointed teachers. If the performance of a contractual teacher is not satisfactory, he/she is relieved and new appointment is made. Feedback of the students, observation of the senior members of the faculty and the head of the institution and overall performance of the teachers appointed on contract

basis, is also considered at the time of re-appointment. Good teachers are retained year after year even without formal interview. They are however, given tips to make further improvements at the time of reappointments.

- iii. The teachers fill self-appraisal pro-formas at the end of each session. The self-appraisal is discussed with teachers by the principal. The appraisal is given due weightage at the time of granting annual increments and promotions/placements under the career advancement scheme.
- iv. UGC has framed regulations recommending Academic Performance Indicator (API) based Performance Based Appraisal System (PBAS) for appointments, promotions and Career Advancement of teachers. The state government and the affiliating university have adopted the same. These regulations are being followed by the institution.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The evaluation methods are communicated to the students and other members of the institution through the prospectus, unitized syllabus brochures, general notices, general assemblies, staff meetings etc. These are also discussed in the departmental meetings. The teachers also announce and discuss these with the students in the classes. Changes, if any, in the evaluation method are immediately notified and explained.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

A number of evaluation reforms have been initiated by the institution as well as the affiliating university. Some of these are listed below.

Reforms initiated by the affiliating university:

- i. Semester system is being followed in PG courses and is all set to be introduced in UG programmes from the session 2014-15.
- ii. Examination forms for PG classes are being filled on-line.
- iii. Student returns and the submission of internal assessment and practical awards have been computerized.
- iv. OMR answer sheets have been introduced.
- v. Results are declared well in time.
- vi. Steps have been taken to minimize result late cases.

- vii. In B.C.A., B.B.A., B.Com. and all PG classes the seminars, snap tests, class performance etc. also form the basis of the internal assessment.
- viii. Presentations, seminars and industrial training, summer training and projects too form a part of evaluation in B.B.A. / M.Com. / M.Sc. (IT) and the subject of Office Management and Secretarial Practices in B.A.
- ix. Viva-voce is a part of evaluation in B.Sc. (N.M.), BBA, BCA, B.Com., M.Com., M.Sc. IT, PGDCA and some subjects in B.A.
- x. Roll Number slips are issued online.
- xi. The students can apply for re-evaluation of any paper and also see his/her answer books.

Reforms initiated by the institution:

- i. The record keeping of examinations and the process of calculation of internal assessment have been computerized.
- ii. The syllabus is unitized term wise and distributed in advance. The question papers for house examinations are set accordingly.
- iii. The marks obtained in house exams and attendance at lectures form the basis of awarding internal assessment. These are also conveyed to the parents after each term.
- iv. Regular snap tests, assignments, students' participation in class discussion, Mid Semester Tests, performance in term tests and attendance form the basis of internal assessment in PG classes.
- v. For transparency, the marks obtained in the internal assessment by each student are displayed on the notice boards, before submitting the same to the university.
- vi. The answer sheets of house examinations are shown to the students and discussed by the teachers.
- vii. For students involved in sports or other activities, special house tests are conducted.
- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution has taken the following steps to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those of its own:

i. Training has been imparted to the non-teaching staff to handle software provided by the University for registration of students, filling of on-line forms, entering data regarding internal assessment and practical marks etc.

- ii. The office has been computerized with networking and provided leased line / broadband internet connectivity.
- iii. The office work, related to evaluation, has been automated. In order to integrate all operations, a software has been purchased which is designed according to needs.
- iv. To acclimatize the students, OMR answer sheets are used to conduct house exams.
- v. Changes/reforms made by the university are conveyed to the teachers and students through notice boards/prospectus and explained, if needed.
- vi. The Principal, Registrar Exams, and the Heads of the Departments ensure that the guidelines issued by the university are followed for internal assessment.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

For continuous evaluation, the affiliating university has introduced a component of internal assessment, the proportion of which varies from course to course. This forms the formative evaluation approach. This is mainly based on house tests to be conducted at the end of each term, attendance at lectures, snap tests, participation in discussions in class, written assignments, seminars, presentations, class performance, Mid Semester Tests etc.

The criterion for internal assessment has been laid by the affiliating university. The applicability has been given due consideration while deciding it. It varies from course to course and also within the course for different subjects.

Component and basis of Internal Assessment in some of the courses is as follows:

B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com.: Total weightage of internal assessment in theory papers is 10% which is based on September House test (30% of the assessment), December House Test (50% of the assessment) and attendance at lectures (20%).

<u>B.B.A.</u>: The internal assessment has 20% weightage and is based on House Examination (10 marks) Written Assignments (05 marks) and Class Participation (05 marks).

<u>M.A.</u>:

Mode of Continuous Internal Assessment as per the syllabus and guidelines of the affiliating university are as follows:

- i. Terminal Evaluation 80%
- ii. Continuous Assessment 20%
- iii. Continuous Assessment includes Written Test, Snap Test,

Participation in Discussions in the class, Term Paper, Attendance etc.;

iv. In order to incorporate an element of Continuous Internal Assessment of students, the Colleges conducts tests as quantified below:

(a) Written Test (one per semester) : 25 (reduced to 5)
(b) Snap Test : 25 (reduced to 5)
(c) Term Paper/s : 25 (reduced to 5)
(d) Participation in Class Discussions: 15 (reduced to 3)
(e) Attendance : 10 (reduced to 2)*

Total : 100 reduced to 20

*Weightage of 2 marks for Attendance component out of 20 marks for Continuous Assessment shall be available only to those students who attend 75% and more of classroom lectures/seminars/workshops. The break-up of marks for attendance component for theory papers shall be as under:

(a) 75% and above up to 85% : 1 (b) Above 85% : 2

M.Com./M.Sc. (IT):

Internal assessment is 20% of the total marks in each paper. The criteria for awarding Internal Assessment are as given below:

i Mid Semester Test (MST) : 10 marks
 ii Assignment/Presentation : 06 marks
 iii Attendance : 04 marks
 Total : 20 marks

The adoption of formative and summative evaluation approach by the affiliating university, to measure student achievement, has impacted the system significantly. The introduction of Internal Assessment for continuous/formative evaluation has brought about a change in the perception of students. This has resulted in increase in attendance at lectures, regularity and seriousness in studies, active participation of students in the learning process, increase in the frequency of visits to the library and improvement in the overall personality.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.).

The criteria of internal assessment as mentioned in 2.5.4 above, ensures rigor to the extent that the students can calculate most of the

marks themselves.

To maintain transparency, the answer sheets of house exams are shown to the students and the attendance at lectures and marks obtained in house exams are conveyed through letters to the parents after each term. The lists, showing marks obtained by all the students, are displayed on the notice board before forwarding the same to the university. Sometimes the lists showing the attendance at lectures are shown to the students and even got signed from them.

For weightages assigned to various components refer question no. 2.5.4.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The institution has specified graduate attributes for its graduates. These are defined in the aims and objectives and the motto of the institution.

The graduate attributes specified by the college are as follows:

- Employable and life skills
- Entrepreneurship
- Longing for excellence and achieving it through fair means
- Leadership qualities
- High moral and civic values
- Spirit of nationalism and universal brotherhood
- Awareness regarding art, culture and heritage and its adoration
- Sensitization regarding global, national and social issues
- Awareness about environmental, legal and health related issues
- Developing an aptitude for critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper.
- Inculcating global competency and quest for excellence.
- Promoting the use of technology.

These are conveyed to the students and the staff through the prospectus, college magazine, wall magazine, meetings and address of the principal and faculty during functions and gatherings.

To ensure attainment of these attributes the institution plans and executes its strategies for effective implementation, translation and delivery of the curriculum designed by the university and enriching it by formal and non-formal ways as explained in 1.1.2, 1.1.3, 1.1.4, 1.2.1 and 1.2.3.

In addition to the provisions in the curriculum, the institution nurtures critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper through various

methods given in 2.3.4.

To enhance the effectiveness of formal curriculum, impart additional skills, inculcate moral and civic values and sensitize the youth towards social and environmental issues etc., co-curricular and extracurricular activities are meticulously planned and spread throughout the session. For details refer 1.3.1, 1.3.3 and 1.3.4.

Such activities are carried out by the institution on its own and in collaboration with NGO's/organizations like SPICMACY, Youth Forum (Doraha), Panjab Agricultural University (Ludhiana), Department of Life Long Learning (Panjab University, Chandigarh), Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College (Ludhiana), Punjab State Apex Body of NGO's, Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle (Ludhiana), Human Rights Protection Mission (Women Wing) etc.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

The institution has a transparent system of evaluation. The answer sheets are shown to the students after each house examination. The question papers are discussed by the teachers. Grievances, if any, are immediately redressed. If case of any discrepancy, the students have the right to appeal to the principal.

The internal assessment is put up on the notice board for at least three days before finalizing and forwarding it to the university.

The affiliating university has a provision of re-evaluation in the annual exam. In case of any discrepancy, the candidates can view their answer sheets. The university has also devised an Examination Grievance Monitoring System. The students can send their details and the grievance regarding examination system through an e-mail to the university. The university ensures to respond to the queries of such students in the stipulated time.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

The course specific learning outcomes are adopted by the affiliating university from the model curriculum of the UGC. The curricula as recommended by the UGC, are mainly adopted with some area specific modifications. The learning outcomes are stated in the case of most of the programmes/subjects in the syllabus brochures available on the university website. The teachers go through the syllabus to be taught by them. It is also available in the college library. It is discussed in the respective departments amongst the faculty and conveyed to the students by the teachers at the beginning of the session.

Most of the faculty members, being members of various university

bodies that are involved in framing the curriculum for the university and affiliated colleges, discuss the learning outcomes with their colleagues.

The faculty also interacts with the faculty of the university and other institutions and keeps updating its knowledge.

The institution has defined learning outcomes in general for its graduates. These are based on the aims and objectives of the institution and mainly focus on providing knowledge, skills, values, nationalistic approach, universal brotherhood; awareness regarding art, culture and heritage; and sensitization regarding global, national and social issues etc. These are conveyed to the students and the staff through the prospectus, college magazine, meetings and address of the principal and faculty during functions and gatherings and during classroom interaction as well.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/ achievements (Programme/ course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The progress of the students is regularly monitored and conveyed to the students and the parents. The overall performance of the students is monitored through class/house tests, response in the class, and regularity in attendance and discipline.

The result of the house tests, held in September and December, and the attendance at lectures, are conveyed to the parents through post. In some cases, parents are personally called to discuss their wards' progress. The college has developed a software to facilitate the process of monitoring. The marks obtained and lectures attended in each subject are produced in the form of a letter by the software. The lists of marks obtained and the attendance at lectures in each subject are also displayed on the notice board. These are also shown to the students. In entry classes like B.C.A. and B.B.A., the parent teacher meetings are arranged. Parents are invited, whenever the need is felt, in other classes as well.

We are happy and proud to mention that the students, though predominantly rural and educationally disadvantaged, show highly satisfactory academic performance.

Majority of the students come from a comparatively poor education system. The cut off percentage at entry level in the college too is quite low as compared to the colleges of bigger towns and cities like Chandigarh, Ludhiana, Ferozepur, Hoshiarpur, Khanna, Moga, Muktsar, Abohar etc., affiliated to Panjab University. In spite of this,

they fare quite well as compared to other institutions, affiliated to the university, especially those of the surrounding areas.

Pass percentage and rate of promotion (to next higher class) of the students of the college is mostly above the university average.





Graph showing increasing number of students securing top positions, year after year, in annual/semester exams at university level.





During the last four years, there is a quantum increase in the number of students of the college passing with distinction i.e. scoring more than 75% marks in university exams.



The number of students passing with first division is significantly high. Graph showing the same for the past eight sessions is given below:



The students of the college improve their performance as they progress from the first year to the third year of study in UG programmes. The number of first divisions, secured in second and third years of study, is progressively and significantly higher than the first year. Thus, the students are academically much better when they pass out, than when they join the institution.



2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

To facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes, the institution has structured the following teaching, learning and assessment strategies:

- Regular efforts are made to enhance the teacher quality through faculty improvement programmes.
- Infrastructure, library, learning resources, e-resources and computer facilities are regularly updated.
- To achieve desired learning outcomes co-curricular and extracurricular activities are planned meticulously, as mentioned in 1.3.1, 1.3.3 and 1.3.4.
- Institution has been computerized and software procured to monitor and assess the level of achievement of learning outcomes.
- Performance and progress of the students is regularly monitored and strategies drawn for slow learners and advanced learners.
- Additional lectures are allotted for the subjects where the students are found to be slow.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

The institution takes the following measures/initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered:

Offers skill based courses to enhance employability and entrepreneurship (For details refer 1.2.1 and 1.2.3 (e)).

Provides industrial training/summer training/project work to students of M.Sc. (IT), BBA, M.Com., PGDCA, BCA etc.

Teaches the subject of entrepreneurship to the students of BBA, BCA and B.Com.

Enhances the social and economic relevance and inculcates research aptitude through seminars, conferences, workshops, extension lectures and activities such as mock elections, surveys, industrial training, projects, seminars by students, debates, wall magazine and college magazine. Visits to educational institutions and research labs, visits to NGO's, are organized

Interaction of students with authors of the novels prescribed in the curriculum, in the form of workshops, is organized.

Co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities are planned so as to inculcate value system, leadership qualities and a sense of social responsibility. These are also focused at providing exposure to performing arts like music, dances, theatre etc. (For details refer 1.3.1 and 2.3.3).

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The institution collects and analyzes the data on students learning outcomes and uses it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning through various ways. Some of these are as follows:

- i. Performance of students in class tests, house exams, mid semester tests and annual exams.
- ii. Presentations and seminars given by students.
- iii. Class participation.
- iv. Performance of students in project work and industrial training.
- v. Performance in practical classes.
- vi. Performance and participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- vii. Performance of students in viva-voce.

This information is used for planning and overcoming barriers during the forthcoming academic sessions. It is also used to take decision regarding providing extra classes, remedial classes and challenging assignments to advanced learners.

The performance of the students in extra-curricular activities helps us to identify and motivate the students to participate in various intercollege competitions.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The institution monitors the achievement of learning outcomes through the performance of the students in various ways as discussed in 2.6.4. We also get feedback from external examiners who come for viva-voce, conduct practical exams and assessment of projects.

The achievement of learning outcomes is ensured in the following ways:

- Providing remedial classes to slow learners
- Giving extra study material and challenging tasks to advanced learners and guiding them to go for additional subjects like addon course and honours etc.
- Arranging extra classes.
- Allocation of projects to students as per their aptitude and interest.
- Arranging parent teacher meetings.
- Revising the topics in which the students are found deficient.
- Planning extension lectures, seminars, conferences, faculty improvement programmes etc.
- Guiding and counselling the teachers.
- 2.6.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

The institution and the individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning.

Some of the steps taken are as follows:

- If the performance of the students, in a particular class test, is not up to the mark, the teachers revise or repeat that part of the syllabus.
- Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners.

- Additional study material and guidance is provided to advanced learners.
- Additional lectures are provided in some subjects like English, Mathematics and Accountancy in B.A., BCA and B.Com. respectively.
- Special coaching classes are arranged for students who are placed under compartment in the annual exams.
- Classes in spoken English are arranged to improve communication skills and English language.
- Parent-teacher meetings are held to discuss the performance of their wards in some classes.

Any other relevant information regarding Teaching-Learning and Evaluation which the college would like to include.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 Promotion of Research

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

No, the affiliating university is in the process of framing rules for the recognition of research centers in affiliated colleges.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes, the college has a Research Committee. It comprises of Faculty members having Ph.D. Degrees or research experience and research aptitude.

It plans the holding of seminars/conferences.

It discusses and recommends minor research projects to be forwarded to the funding agencies.

Some of the recommendations made by the research committee, to be implemented from the session 2014-15, are as follows:

- i. Seed money be provided by the college to five teachers on the basis of proposals. These proposals be evaluated by the research committee and should lead to submission of a research project or publication in a referred journal.
- ii. Seed money be provided to teachers teaching PG classes for surveys by students and the preparation of reports to be based on these.
- iii. One state level seminar/conference be organized by the college every year. The departments submit proposals for the same on similar guidelines as those of the College Development Council, Panjab University, Chandigarh. The research committee would then make the selections.
- iv. Travel grant be provided to some teachers/students for presentation of papers in National/International seminars/conferences.
- v. Students too may be provided financial support for surveys.
- 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?
 - * autonomy to the principal investigator
 - * timely availability or release of resources
 - * adequate infrastructure and human resources

- * time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers
- * support in terms of technology and information needs
- * facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities

The institution takes the following measures for the smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects:

- provides autonomy to the principal investigator;
- provides and releases the resources well in time; sometimes advances are also made if requested for;
- provides adequate infrastructure wherever needed;
- readily sanctions leave of the kind sought for this purpose;
- provides all support in terms of needs regarding technology i.e. equipment, computers etc.;
- fulfills the needs like purchase of books, internet facility, eresources etc. for the smooth progress and implementation of the research projects;
- auditing and submission of reports is done well in time;
- organizes extension lectures and training programmes from its own resources;
- organizes seminars/conferences with the support of UGC, Panjab University and from its own resources.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The institution makes consistent efforts to develop scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students. Some of the efforts made are as follows:

- i. Students are involved in surveys, mock elections, field work
- ii. Extension lectures in Research Methodology and Project Report preparation are organized.
- iii. Students participate in seminars / conferences, are encouraged to present their views and give presentations.
- iv. In cases where project work is a part of the study programmes, the students are helped in selecting of projects and preparing project reports.
- v. Research methodology is taught as a subject in PG programmes.
- vi. Industry/institutions are approached to extend help and cooperation to the students for projects and training.
- vii. Practical work in science subjects improves scientific temper and research aptitude.

- viii. Students' participation in quizzes, debates, declamations, paper reading contests, poster making competitions, educational tours, trips, plays, movie shows, choreographies etc. also helps to promote scientific temper and research culture and aptitude.
- ix. Articles in the college magazine, wall magazine and the 'thought for the day' help to develop scientific temper and research culture and aptitude. The students are also appointed as sub-editors for different sections of the college magazine.
- x. Address by the head of the institution and teachers to the gatherings of students, especially those of PG classes, are often aimed at developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude.
- 3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.

Some members of the faculty are involved in research activity which mainly includes guiding students for M.Phil., working on Minor Research Projects and involving in individual/collaborative research activity. The teachers also guide the students for project work in classes like M.Sc. (IT) and M.Com. The details are as follows:

- ii. Mr. Gursharanjit Singh has accomplished a Minor Research Project funded by UGC.
- iii. Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary has accomplished a Research Project funded by UGC.
- iv. Dr. S. S. Virk has been awarded Ph.D. degree.
- v. Dr. Amandeep Kullar has been awarded Ph.D. degree.
- vi. Dr. Gurjit Virk Sidhu carries out research work and has published/presented research papers. She presented a research paper in Canada.
- vii. Dr. Nirlep Kaur carries out research work and regularly publishes/presents research papers.
- viii. Mrs. Lovleen Bains is pursuing research for Ph.D. degree and regularly publishes/presents research papers.
- ix. Dr. Harwinder Kaur has been awarded Ph.D. degree.
- x. Dr. Sompal has been awarded Ph.D. degree.
- xi. Many other teachers are presenting papers in seminars/conferences and few of them are also publishing papers/articles or publishing books.

3.1.6 Give details of workshops/ training programmes/ sensitization programmes conducted/organized by the institution with focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students.

With its focus on capacity building in terms of research and imbibing research culture among the staff and students, the institution conducts/ organizes workshops/ training programmes/ sensitization programmes, from time to time.

For example an extension lecture by Dr. J.S. Chamak was organized on "Research Methodology and Statistical Quality Control" on 20th March, 2006.

An extension lecture was organized on "Style and format of writing a Research Report" by Dr. A. K. Vashisht, Professor, Panjab University, Chandigarh, on 18th January, 2009.

In December 2010 a 3-day workshop on research methodology was organized during which Ms. Kamalpreet Kaur, Assistant Professor in Commerce, demonstrated the use of SPSS software.

An extension lecture by Prof. Ravinder Kaur, Department of Geography, Panjab University, Chandigarh was organized on 'Research Methodology' on 22nd November, 2013.

During this period, the college also organized six seminars/conferences. For details refer 3.7.4.

In addition to this, members of the faculty are encouraged to participate in such programmes organized by other institutions. For details refer 2.4.3.

3.1.7 Provide details of prioritised research areas and the expertise available with the institution.

The prioritised research areas and the expertise thereof are available in the subjects of Sociology, Commerce, Chemistry, Political Science, Punjabi, Physical Education and English in the institution. Students of Commerce and Computer Science also take up projects.

List of faculty members along with the research areas and expertise is as follows:

- i. Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu has contributed in the field of insect biodiversity.
- ii. Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary carried out research on Nanotechnology. This area of research is expected to make revolutionary changes in science and technology.
- iii. Dr. Gurjeet Virk Sidhu has carried out research and published her work on social issues related to aged/old people.
- iv. Dr. Nirlep Kaur often presents papers and has publications in the field of sports science.

- v. The faculty of commerce is regularly presenting and publishing papers in the fields of Banking and Insurance, Economy, Emarketing, Corporate Governance, Service Sector, Globalization, Financial Institutions, Stock Markets, Indian Financial Sector, Entrepreneurship, FDI etc.
- vi. Dr. Kuldeep Singh is contributing in the field of human rights and electoral politics.
- vii. Mrs. Lovleen Bains regularly contributes articles highlighting various social issues in the leading daily "The Tribune". She contributes in research publications/presentations in the field of English language as well.
- viii. Faculty of the department of Punjabi has significant contribution to Punjabi literature.
- 3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

The institution often organizes seminars / conferences and extension lectures for the promotion of research and the benefit of faculty and students. Researchers of eminence, from different research institutes and universities of the region, are invited for this purpose. During the last four years, 45 eminent researchers/persons have been invited for seminars/conferences and 33 for extension lectures/workshops. Detailed list has been provided in 3.7.4.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

There is no provision of Sabbatical Leave under Punjab Government rules. However, many of the teachers have availed leave of various kinds for research activities. The list of some of these is as follows:

- i. Dr. Sukhwinder Singh Virk availed three years of leave under Faculty Improvement Programme of UGC to pursue research leading to Ph.D. degree.
- ii. Dr. Kuldip Singh availed leave from time to time to pursue research work leading to Ph.D. Degree.
- iii. Mr. Gursharanjit Singh availed leave from time to time to pursue research work leading to Ph.D. Degree and for minor research project.
- iv. Dr. Amandeep Kullar availed leave to pursue Ph.D. Degree.
- v. Dr. Gurjit Virk has availed Ex-India leave to attend a conference and present a paper in Canada.
- vi. Mrs. Lovleen Bains has availed leave to pursue Ph.D. degree.

vii. Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary has availed leave from time to time to pursue research work for minor research project.

In addition to these, many teachers have availed duty leave to attend seminars/conferences/workshops at other institutes.

The institution takes initiatives in creating awareness/ advocating/ transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community. Some of the measures taken are as follows:

- Organize seminars/conferences where, along with eminent researchers, students and teachers from other institutions, stakeholders/ beneficiaries like industrialists, farmers, farmers organizations, NGO's, political activists, representatives of beneficiary sections of society and public are also invited.
- Publishes the proceedings of seminars/conferences.
- Publicize the findings/conclusion/views through press releases.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college has budgetary provisions earmarked for research. The affiliating university has made a provision for a fee of Rs. 50/- per student per annum for research and development and Rs. 100/- per student per annum for seminars/clubs/societies. This amount is used to organize extension lectures and provide additional funds for seminars/conferences, if needed. The teachers are motivated to make more use of it. The research committee has recommended some measures to ensure that this amount is utilized optimally for research activities (For details refer 3.1.2).

Funds have been availed from UGC, ICSSR and Panjab University to organize seminars/ conferences.

Funds are also collected through registration fee from the delegates who participate in the seminars/conferences.

Research grants have been received from UGC for minor research projects and purchase of equipment.

Travel grants were received from UGC in the 11th plan. Dr. Gurjeet Virk Sidhu, Assistant Professor in Sociology has received travel

grant from Panjab University, Chandigarh to present a paper in a conference in Canada.

In addition to this funds are allocated for the subscription of Journals/Periodicals and internet connectivity from different heads.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The institution has made a provision of funds for research. There is provision of seed money within it. This amount has so far been utilized, to hold seminars and extension lectures. The faculty is being encouraged to utilize it for individual research. As most of this amount remained unutilized we have made a plan to optimize its utilization as explained in 3.1.2.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

There is no financial provision for research projects by students. The resources like library and computer facilities, are provided to the students for research work. However, provision for providing financial assistance to students for field work and surveys has been made from the next session.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The seminars / conferences organized are mostly interdisciplinary e.g. seminars on the topics "Violation of Human Rights in Punjab – A Case of Peasant Suicides" and "Violation of Human Rights of Migratory Labour in Punjab" were organized by the departments of Political Science, Sociology and Economics.

A UGC sponsored National Conference on "India an Emerging Service Economy: Issues and Challenges" was organized by the departments of Commerce and Business Management and Economics.

A Seminar on 'Creating Awareness among Students Regarding Domestic and Sexual Violence against Women and Children' sponsored by College Development Council, Panjab University, Chandigarh on too was interdisciplinary.

All the teachers of the college and postgraduate students participated in these. Other students are also involved in some of them.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

The institution uses its equipment and research facilities like lab equipment, computer infrastructure and library and learning resources for minor research projects, individual research by teachers and use by students for projects.

Lab equipment is also used to acquaint the students with its working and use, to motivate them to carry out research as they move for higher studies and become capable of handling it.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

The institution has received grants from UGC and Panjab University, Chandigarh to develop research facilities and hold seminars/conferences.

The institution encourages its teachers to submit proposals to the agencies like UGC for research grants for research projects. During the last four years 4 such projects have been submitted. One of these proposals was approved and another is under consideration.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The college has a well-stocked library which is regularly updated. The library subscribes 115 Journals/Periodicals. It has also subscribed e-resources like N-LIST.

The institution also has computer facility with leased line internet connectivity.

Reprographic facility is also available in the institution.

The list of equipment, available in Chemistry lab, to carry out research is provided in 3.3.3.

- 3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research?
 - The institution has a Research Committee for planning and promotion of research.
 - It has a provision of funds/seed money to carry out research work and organize seminars/conferences.
 - It motivates its faculty to seek grants under various schemes like Minor Research Projects, Faculty Improvement Programmes, Travel grants etc. from bodies like UGC and the affiliating University.
 - It has also availed grants from UGC for the purchase of equipment and other infrastructure, most of which is also used for research work.

- It has set up excellent computing facilities which are available to the researchers. These facilities are regularly upgraded.
- It regularly purchases books, journals and other study material. It has also subscribed some e-resources. Study material is also procured on demand.
- 3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments/ facilities created during the last four years?

The institution has received grants to upgrade infrastructure from UGC during the 11th Plan. A significant portion of this amount has been used for the purchase of equipment which is also useful for research. Some equipment has been purchased from the grant received from UGC for a minor research project carried out in the department of Chemistry.

The college does not offer research degrees to its students. However, its teachers use the facilities available in other institutions. Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary, Assistant Professor in Chemistry worked on a Minor Research Project in collaboration with Thapar University, Patiala. He also used research facilities available in the Panjab University, Chandigarh.

Project work is a part of the curriculum in courses like M.Sc. (IT), M.Com., BBA etc. Business enterprises and Industry provide facilities for training and carrying out project work in their organizations. About 60 organizations are providing facilities/training to the students. For list of organizations refer Annexure - V.

There is no exclusive facility for researchers in the library. However, reprographic facility, books, e-resources, computer and internet facility with printers, is available for researches. Study material is also procured whenever such demand is raised.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface?

The institution establishes interface with the industry through Placement Cell, Career Guidance and Counselling Cell and Departments.

The placement cell arranges interviews for placements. The Career Guidance and Counselling Cell invites experts from industry to interact with the students for career guidance. The department of Commerce and Computer Science and Applications establishes interface with industry for industrial training and project work of the students.

3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

As most of the expertise, available in the institution, is provided on non-remunerative basis, hence it is not much publicized. However, the expertise of the faculty in different fields is known in the academic circles.

3.5.3 How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

The institution grants duty leave to members of the faculty whenever their services are requested for by other organizations or deputes them when any request is received through the institution.

- iii. Head of the institution and some members of the faculty have been/are members of various academic/ administrative committees of Panjab University, Chandigarh like Senate, Syndicate, College Development Council, Fee Committee,

- Committee for preparation of handbook for affiliation of institutions etc.
- iv. The teachers act as subject experts in the Recruitment Committees of various schools and colleges.
- v. Mr. Jaswant Singh Gill, Director, is the General Secretary of the Federation of Managements of Private Colleges of Punjab. In this capacity, he often guides other managements on various issues related to the management of institutions.
- vi. Mr. Jaswant Singh Gill, Director and Mr. Tejveer Singh (Student) were members of the fee committee of Panjab University, representing private managements and students of affiliated colleges respectively.
- vii. Mrs. Lovleen Bains has been appointed the Faculty Editor of the Magazine 'Jawan Tarang' brought out by the Department of Youth Welfare, Panjab University, Chandigarh.
- viii. Many of the faculty members are invited for judgment of various competitions related to co-curricular and extracurricular activities.
- ix. Some of the members of the faculty are paper setters and evaluators of other universities and institutions of the region.
- x. Mr. Gursharanjit Singh, Associate Professor in Commerce and Dr. Nirlep Kaur, Assistant Professor in Physical Education are members of boards of studies of Mata Gujri College, Fatehgarh Sahib.
- xi. Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu, Principal, Mr. Gursharanjit Singh, Mrs. Ranjeet Kaur and Mr. M.S. Bhandari are members of management boards of some schools and colleges.
- xii. Some members of the faculty are a part of flying squads formed during the annual exams of Panjab University and Punjab School Education Board.
- xiii. Mr. Sompal Heera is associated with the promotion of Punjabi theatre and is helping numerous institutions in preparation of plays/skits for competitions.
- xiv. Mr. Rampal provides training and guidance to students of other educational institutions in music.
- xv. Some members of the faculty are invited as resource persons to various Seminars/Conferences and deliver extension lectures.
- xvi. Some staff members provide training to teachers of other institutions.

- xvii. Some of the teachers and members of the non-teaching staff often render services to the administration for election purpose and for providing training during census.
- xviii. The college organizes crash courses in Spoken English and Computers during summer vacations, for the benefit of the youth of the area.
- xix. The teachers extend support and consultancy to Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic, Ludhiana to run their programmes under Rural Development Scheme, being offered by the college.

Most of the services are non-remunerative. In some cases, the faculty has received remuneration / honorarium which are retained by them. Some of the instances where the faculty has received remuneration/honorarium are as follows:

- i. Dr. Narinder Singh Sidhu has received Rs. 24,000/- as honorarium from Punjab School Education Board for rendering his services as member of the UMC Committee.
- ii. Mr. Karan Kapila has received a remuneration of Rs. 45000/-from Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic, Ludhiana for providing his services to run six month courses in computer basics.
- iii. Mr. Gurmukh Singh received remuneration of Rs. 14000/- from the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh for running a three month computer course for general public.
- iv. Ms. Rajinder Kaur received remuneration of Rs. 12000/- from the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh for running a three month course in Fashion Technology for women of the area.

Mrs. Lovleen Bains organized classes in Spoken English for the benefit of teachers of Guru Nanak Model Senior Secondary School, Doraha and Ryan International Public School, Ludhiana. She also conducted classes in 'Spoken English Skills' for the students of Doraha Institute of Management and Technology, Doraha.

As explained above in 3.5.4, consultancy by the college is provided on non-remunerative basis only. Remunerative consultancy is provided at the individual level only. The consultation fee/remuneration /honorarium, thus received are retained by the teachers.

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

3.6.1 How does the institution promote institution-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

The institution promotes college-neighborhood-community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students through various activities carried out by NSS / NCC units and various clubs/societies like press club, youth club and departmental societies. A senior faculty member has been appointed as Dean Extension Activities to coordinate these activities.

Such activities are carried out by the institution on its own as well as in collaboration with Government Organizations and Administration, Municipal Committee Doraha, village Panchayats, Punjab Agricultural University Ludhiana, Department of Life Long Learning and Extension, Panjab University Chandigarh, social organizations, clubs, hospitals, Red Cross, Nehru Yuva Kendra, Red Ribbon Club, SPICMACY, Youth Forum Doraha, Punarjot Eye Bank Society, Greenland Hotel and Restaurant Khanna, Zenith Hotel Doraha, Bhai Ghanaiya Seva Society Doraha, Rampur Writers Association, Human Rights Munch, Punjab Police Apex body of NGO's like Punjab Police Apex Body of NGO's, Human Rights Protection Mission (Women Wing) etc.

3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

Most of these activities are carried out through NSS, NCC, Youth Club and other clubs / societies / departments of the college. The respective teachers-in-charge keep track of the students involved in various movements / activities which promote citizenship roles. They also monitor these activities. Dean of Extension Activities, Press Committee and teachers-in-charge maintain a record of these activities and participation of students.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

The institution solicits stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution through the students, parents, academic peers visiting the college from time to time, university inspection teams, industry/employers, alumni, socially active people of the area, local people associated with the print media, members of the managing board of the institution etc.

• Students: The perception of the students is solicited through feedback proformas, their interaction with the faculty, the head of

the institution and the management. It is also perceived through the student's welfare council, a representative body of the students. The head of the institution is freely approachable to the students.

- Parents: They express their views during their visit to the institution to meet the principal or the faculty or during parent teacher meetings.
- Academic Peers: They visit the college during extension lectures, seminars, inspections, youth festivals, convocations and other functions. They share their views with the management, principal and the faculty and give valuable suggestions.
- Inspection Teams: The inspection teams from the affiliating university often visit the college and give suggestions and views.
- Alumni Association: The members of the alumni association share their perception during alumni meet or whenever an old student visits the institution.
- Socially Active People: Socially active people of the area and people associated with the print media: This section of society gives valuable feedback through the management, principal and faculty. The members of the print media often visit the college and share their views.
- Management: The members of the management share their perception during meetings of the board or during their visits to the college.
- Others: The heads and teachers of schools of surrounding areas share their views during the visits of our teachers to their institutions.

The people of the area give their feedback when the teachers go for door to door counselling and guidance of admission seekers or whenever they visit the college.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students?

The college has a senior teacher designated as Dean, Extension Activities, who co-ordinates with the teachers in charge of NSS, NCC, Youth Club and other clubs and societies of the college that carry out these activities. Every year, one day and 7 day NSS camps are organized for this purpose. The activities of the youth club and red ribbon club, too, are mostly focused in this direction.

The expenditure incurred on the programmes/activities organized in collaboration with other organizations has not been mentioned in the above table.

The major extension and outreach programmes organized during the last four years are as follows:

- i. Blood Donation camp is organized every year
- ii. Medical /Eye checkup camps are often organized
- iii. Rallies and awareness campaigns are organized in the town and surrounding villages to highlight social issues like health and hygiene, cleanliness and sanitation, literacy, drug addiction, female foeticide, dowry menace, gender discrimination, women empowerment, traffic rules, environmental issues, national integration and communal harmony etc. Environment week was organized in which, apart from tree plantation, series of lectures by experts and a declamation contest for school children, was held.
- iv. Live shows by renowned artists are organized for the benefit of public and students. We have organized programmes of Satinder Sartaj, Jyoti Nooran and Sultana Nooran (renowned Singers), Pandit Tejendra Narayan Majumdar, (renowned Sarod player) accompanied by Ustad Akaram Khan (tabla player) and Karan Pangli (Dancer) in the college.
- v. Short term courses sponsored by the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, were organized in Computers and Fashion Technology.
- vi. We organize short term courses, in Computers basics, Hardware and Crash Course in English during summer vacations for the benefit of our students and non-students.

- vii. The institution has provided space, computer infrastructure as well as services of its faculty to Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic (Rural Development Center) to run courses like Computer Applications, Stitching, Electrician etc. for the youth of the area.
- viii. The college, along with Nehru Yuva Kendra, Ludhiana (Ministry Of Youth Affairs And Sports, Govt. of India) organized a convention in the college under the campaign 'Systematic Voters Education and Electoral Participation' (SVEEP) of Election Commission of India to create awareness among youth about the importance of voting and their voting rights. Members of Clubs of surrounding villages were invited and honored. The teachers also delivered lectures to create awareness against the evil of drug addiction.
- ix. The Post Graduate Department of Political Science, Sociology and Economics organized an UGC sponsored National Seminar on "Violation of Human Rights in Punjab A Case of Peasant Suicides" on 22-23 January, 2011. Justice R. S. Mongia, Prof. S.S. Johal, S. Bhupinder Singh Mann and Sh. Hardev Arshi participated in it.
- x. The Post Graduate Department of Political Science, Sociology and Economics organized a Seminar in collaboration with ICSSR North Western Region on "Violation of Human Rights of Migratory Labour in Punjab" on 12-13 March, 2011.
- xi. Organized Seminar on 'Creating Awareness among Students Regarding Domestic and Sexual Violence against Women and Children" sponsored by College Development Council, Panjab University, Chandigarh, on 5th March, 2014.
- xii. Inter School Diwali Hockey Tournament, in the memory of the founder president Dr. Ishwar Singh, is organized every year for schools of the area to promote the national game and inculcate sports culture.

For year wise details of the above activities refer Annexure - VIII.

Teachers are also invited by educational institutions, NGO's and Government organizations to deliver lectures on socially important issues. Some of these are: Mrs. Lovleen Bains, Dr. Kuldeep Singh and Dr. Amandeep Kullar.

Dr. S. S. Virk, Associate Professor in Punjabi, is involved in the preparations and organization of the Republic Day and Independence Day functions, organized by the administration at the Tehsil Level.

Mrs. Lovleen Bains, Assistant Professor in English, highlights social issues through print media.

Dr. Sompal Heera, Assistant Professor in Punjabi, presents plays, skits and choreographies through a club 'Sirjana Kala Manch', Raikot.

Mr. Tajinder Singh, Assistant Professor in Punjabi jas done Vani Certificate Course from Prasar Bharti and has been appointed as an Announcer by AIR on part time basis.

Mr. Jarnail Singh, Library Restorer, is involved in social and community service through a club in Village Lopon.

3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

The institution promotes participation of students and faculty in extension activities through NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Press Club, Red Ribbon Club etc. The students participate in good numbers in the activities carried out through these bodies. These activities are carried out independently as well as in collaboration with other organizations as mentioned in 3.6.1 and 3.6.4.

The students, who perform well in these activities, are nominated to the Students Welfare Council and given merit certificates. Some of them are also nominated to attend camps and training programmes organized by the Youth Welfare Departments of Panjab University, Punjab Government and Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Ludhiana. During the last four years, 49 students of the college have attended such camps.

The institution also organizes seminars and conferences on social issues. The students participate in them.

The students are motivated to participate in such activities by the teachers- in-charge who address them in their classes. As the number of volunteers is always high, the students have sometimes to be interviewed for selection for enrollment and camps.

A number of NCC cadets participate in Republic and Independence Day parades held at tehsil headquarters. They also participate in various camps organized by the units. A total of 161 of the students have attended various NCC Camps and 51 of them have passed 'C' certificate and 96 have passed 'B' certificate during the last four years.

The students are involved in the enactment of various plays, choreographies etc. organized by clubs and social organizations.

Dr. Sukhwinder Singh Virk, Mr. Tajinder Singh and Ms. Prabhdeep Kaur, teachers of the college, were deputed as camp commanders during camps organized by NCC and Youth Welfare Departments.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The college caries out surveys, research and extension work to ensure social justice. Social surveys and research are conducted through its departments of sociology, economics and political science.

The extension activities are mostly carried out through the activities of NSS, NCC, Youth Club, Press Club etc.

The college regularly monitors the student profile and draws strategies to empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of the society.

A large number of students come from the families engaged in agriculture. With dwindling land holdings and increasing cost of cultivation, the peasantry is trapped under debt. There were reports that the farmers were committing suicides. Showing concern towards the issue, we organized a national seminar on the violation of human rights of the farmers. In addition to renowned economists and social scientists, representatives of human rights organizations, farmer unions and farmers were also invited to contribute in this seminar.

Similarly, a good number of students are the wards of the migratory labour, working in the industry at Ludhiana and surrounding areas. The college organized national seminar on violation of Human Rights of migratory labour as well. Representatives of NGO's, Human Rights organizations, Labour Unions, migratory labour and government officials dealing with the migratory labour, were invited along with renowned researchers and experts from various universities and research institutes.

A seminar on the topic 'Creating Awareness among Students regarding Domestic and sexual Violence against Women and Children' was organized.

Visits of the students of the Department of Sociology, to places like old age homes are organized. They are also assigned the task of surveys of villages to acquaint themselves with Research Methodology.

The teachers visit schools of the area and interact with the students for guidance and counselling and collection of data of the passing out students. They also visit adjoining villages and towns before admissions for door to door interaction with the parents of the students, especially girls, who have completed their education upto 10+2 class. In case of economic hardships, they are informed about the financial support provided by the institution as well as by government agencies. Feedback received and data collected during

these visits is used to work out strategies to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of the society.

For further details refer 1.3.3, 1.3.4, 3.6.4 and 3.6.5.

3.6.7 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the institution, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

In addition to institution-neighborhood-community network and contribution to community development, the extension activities are organized with a motive to complement students' academic learning experience and inculcate values and skills.

Values like honesty, dignity of labour, fairness, equal respect for all irrespective of caste creed or sex, discipline, patriotism, love of fellow human beings, community service, work ethics etc. are focused through these activities.

These activities also help to develop organizational skills, communication skills, problem-solving skills, leadership qualities, research aptitude and scientific temper; sensitization and awareness about environmental issues, human rights, legal rights, road safety, social and civic responsibility, health and hygiene etc.

The college educates and exposes the students to the problems of community through awareness campaigns. This develops a sense of social and civic responsibility and enables them to understand the community in which they work. This motivates them to involve themselves in identifying the needs and problems of the community and mobilizing them towards community participation. The involvement of students in surveys, and exposure through seminars and extension lectures, enables them to find practical solutions to individual and community problems.

Camps and activities organized by NCC, NSS, Youth Club of the college, Youth Welfare Departments of the State government and University, develop in them the competence required for group living and sharing of responsibilities, apart from inculcating the qualities of leadership.

Community lunch (*langar*) is organized every year to celebrate the birthday Guru Nanak Dev. The students are involved in collection of voluntary contributions, cooking and distribution of food which is partaken in *pangats* (rows) in which students of all castes and religions work together. This inculcates the feeling of universal brotherhood and social harmony.

Blood donation camps are organized every year to promote social responsibility and fellow feeling.

3.6.8 How does the institution ensure the involvement of the community in its reach out activities and contribute to the community development? Detail on the initiatives of the institution that encourage community participation in its activities?

The institution has involved the community in its extension activities through its own programmes and through the NGO's, Village Panchayats, Municipal Committee, Youth Clubs, Social Organizations etc. For details refer 3.6.1.

For involvement of community, the institution organizes NSS camps in surrounding villages and programmes in the college where community is involved during which cleanliness and beautification of schools, slum areas, community centers, health centers etc.; eye and general medical checkup camps; awareness campaigns through door to door counselling, rallies, processions, skits, plays etc. on issues like female foeticide, dowry, menace of drug addiction, eve teasing, national integration, and communal harmony; arranging lectures and training sessions regarding health and hygiene, abstainence from drugs, road safety, first aid, new techniques in agriculture and related fields like dairy farming, bee keeping, floriculture, agro forestry etc. are carried out.

The institution also organizes cultural programmes like plays, concerts (where renowned artists are invited to perform) and functions in the memory of national heroes etc. People of the area are invited and sometimes involved in the organization as well.

Community involvement is also ensured by way of seminars and activities carried by various clubs and societies as mentioned in 3.6.1 and 3.6.4.

3.7 Collaboration

The institution interacts with research institutes for joint research projects for collaborative research. For instance- Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary carried out a research project in collaboration with Mr. Bonamali Pal, Thapar University, Patiala and utilized the laboratory facilities of this institution.

Funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR and Panjab University provides funds for research projects, faculty development programmes and seminars.

UGC also provides grants for the purchase of equipment.

The universities and other research institutions of the region provide training to the staff and their faculty is invited during seminars, workshops and to deliver extension lectures.

The staff uses the library and laboratory facilities of the universities and research institutes of the region.

The industry provides opportunities for summer training and projects. It usually interacts with the staff and students.

The students of the institution have been placed in industries like T.I.T. Infotech, Sportking Synthetics, A to Z Company, Yerik

International Ltd., HDFC Bank, LIC, G. S. Autos, Kashmir Apiaries, Saubhagya Ltd., Hero Cycles, Bhogal Cycles Ltd., Longowal Textiles and some schools of the area, through placements facilitated by the college.

Mr. Manoj Kumar Chaudhary, Assistant Professor in Chemistry completed a Minor Research Project that was funded by UGC. Dr. Bonamali Pal, Thapar University, Patiala was the co-investigator.

The contribution of institution's interaction with industry-institution-community is as follows:

- Interaction with industry provides training and placements as mentioned in 3.3.4 and 3.7.1.
- People from industry usually visit the institution to provide career guidance and counselling to the students.
- NGO's have collaborated with the institution in activities like organizing plays, live concerts by singers and dancers, awareness programmes etc.
- The institution has carried out some extension activities with the support of village panchayats, government agencies, social organizations, NGO's, clubs, hospitals etc.
- The institution, with the help of experts of Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana, has organized training programmes and extension lectures for the benefit of the students and community in the field of dairy farming, horticulture, modern agriculture, beekeeping, agro-forestry, floriculture etc.
- Guru Nanak Polytechnic College, Ludhiana provides vocational

training to the youth of the area in our college in which our infrastructure like computers and the services of our faculty are also utilized.

- The campus is used by the people for walks, games, yoga and the gym for exercise etc. The college charges Rs. 200/- per month from the morning walkers and Rs. 300/- per month from the gym users. During the last four years, Rs. 2,88,400/- have been generated through this source which has in turn been utilized to maintain the grounds. One of the walkers has voluntarily contributed Rs. 11000/- for plantation of trees on the campus.
- The Yog Sansthan, Doraha organized a 3 day 'shivir' in the college and donated Rs. 5100/- as gratitude.
- The institution has organized competitions for the students of schools of the area in collaboration with the Youth Forum, Doraha.
- Some members of the town and alumni give prizes and prize money to the students who excel in sports and academics.
- Some members of the management and prominent personalities of the area have contributed towards endowments to pay scholarships to meritorious students.
- Army units stationed at Doraha often use the play grounds. They also helped us in leveling of the ground by providing heavy machinery for the same.
- NGO's and business enterprises provide refreshment to the blood donors during blood donation camps.
- Hospitals/ Clubs/ social organizations collaborate with us in organizing medical check camps and eye camps for the students, staff and the people of the area, where even free medicines are disbursed.
- Doctors from renowned hospitals of the area deliver extension lectures for the benefit of the staff, students and the people of the area.
- The campus and infrastructure like Hall, Seminar Room and computers are often used by the administration for its training programmes, census related activities, public welfare activities and conduct of elections.
- The institution carried out a joint research project with Thapar University, Patiala.
- The institution organized seminars on social issues where stakeholders and people of the area were involved.

In order to make teaching and learning more effective, the institution regularly creates and enhances its infrastructure.

The Master plan of the institution has been prepared. It provides for future addition of infrastructure as well. Future projects have been prioritized. Building projects are accordingly taken up almost every year. Availability of finances is also a major deciding factor. Consistent efforts are made to gather funds for this purpose from external sources.

Equipment for labs is added as per requirement.

The college has a policy to modernize teaching technologies. For this, new equipment is added regularly, from its own resources as well as the funds received from UGC for this purpose.

New computers/hardware/software is being added/upgraded from time to time as per requirement.

Library and other learning resources are being made more user friendly and updated regularly.

As the institution has regularly grown, both in the variety of courses and the strength of students, the physical infrastructure too has been augmented accordingly to ensure that it is sufficient and in line with the requirements of the courses.

Optimal Utilization of Infrastructure:

It is ensured that the available infrastructure is effectively and optimally utilized. The college functions for about seven hours every day, six days a week.

During the lean period/hours, the computer labs are used to give training to the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. A number of courses in the non-formal mode are also offered to the students as well as non-students in IT, Typing, English etc. almost throughout the year, more so during the vacations.

The girls' hostel, though not occupied, is being put to use for most part of the session. The students, coming from far of villages, stay in the hostel, free of cost during rehearsals and practice sessions for cultural activities and sports. The institution quite often, organizes youth festivals and heritage festivals. A large number of students, from more than 180 institutions affiliated to the university, participate in these. The hostel is used to accommodate the participants.

The students are encouraged to participate in a number of games in inter-college competitions. The college also organizes inter class/group competitions in different games like kho-kho, kabbadi, tug-of-war, volley-ball etc. As a result, the playgrounds are optimally utilized and sports facilities adequately used throughout the session. A number of students and members of the staff make use of the indoor Gym, fitted with the latest exercise gadgets and training machines. It is also offered to the public on nominal charges. Most of these grounds are also used by the students of Guru Nanak Model Senior Secondary School, a sister institution. Sometimes common coaches are appointed to train the students of both the institutions.

The institution also organizes competitions for the students of the schools of the area. Diwali Hockey Tournament, for schools, is an annual feature. Sometimes declamation contests are also organized for them.

Punjab State Junior Boxing Championship was organized by the Boxing Federation of Punjab, in collaboration with Guru Nanak Model Senior Secondary, School, in the college Hall.

The institution organizes a number of extension activities and cultural shows. It invites renowned music, theatre and dance artists to perform.

The college shares some facilities like grounds, hall, gymnasium and staff quarters with Guru Nanak Model Senior Secondary School, Doraha, run by the same management.

Guru Nanak Dev Polytechnic College, Ludhiana, runs courses like Electrician, Stitching, Embroidery and Computers from the campus using our infrastructure under Rural Development Scheme.

The college, in collaboration with the Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh arranged three-month courses in Computers and Fashion Technology.

A large number of residents of the town use the grounds of the college for morning and evening walks and exercise. Witnessing huge inflow, the college began to charge Rs. 200/- per month from the users of the grounds. This keeps away non-serious elements and generates some funds for the upkeep and maintenance of the grounds. Some sports persons use the gym for exercise and hall for playing badminton.

The members of the *yog sansthan* use the campus for morning and evening *yog shivirs*. They also organized a three day state level yoga

camp in which about 250 participants from different corners of the state stayed in the college.

Some NGOs, art groups and clubs use the hall of the college for organizing plays, awareness campaigns and cultural programmes.

Government agencies use the college facilities for holding seminars, competitions, training of staff during elections, census and conduct of elections.

Panjab University uses our infrastructure for conducting exams where a good number of private candidates appear.

Our infrastructure has also been used by film makers for shooting.

The institution has sufficient infrastructure for the existing courses. New buildings are added as per requirement and master plan. It also depends on the availability of finances.

Facilities developed/augmented during last four years:

The master plan (Attached as Annexure - IX) has provision for expansion and modernization for instance adding more class rooms, laboratories, modern and spacious library, computer labs, sports infrastructure, seminar rooms, modern and spacious administrative block etc. Physical infrastructure is being added accordingly.

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

The library has a rich collection of about 32800 books and subscribes to 117 Periodicals/Journals. It is regularly updated and enriched. Books required for the introduction of new programmes/courses are purchased according to the list of suggested reading provided and suggested by the experts from the affiliating university.

New books, related to already running courses, are also added from time to time as per requirement and availability of resources.

The requisition of books, journals and magazines to be purchased, is demanded from the teachers and departments every year. Purchase committees, comprising faculty members, representing different departments/subjects, visit the leading book stores of the area as well as of Delhi and Chandigarh for the purchase of books. Books are also purchased from book fairs. Leading book stores of the region are also invited to hold book exhibitions in the college. Whenever a demand is received from the teachers or students, the books are ordered to the book stores.

Important journals and other periodicals are subscribed through the local news agencies, directly with the publishers or with the suppliers at Delhi or elsewhere.

4.3.2 Detail on the computer and internet facility made available to the faculty and students on the campus and off-campus?

The institution has 4 mbps leased line internet connectivity with 5 IPs and 7 Broadband Connections of 512 kbps each.

Four computers with internet facility have been provided for the use of teachers in the central computer facility and one each in the main and women staff rooms. In addition to this, computers with internet connectivity have been provided to Commerce and Business Administration, English, Punjabi, Political Science, Sociology, Physics and Chemistry departments.

Two computers each have been provided in the main library and in the girls section for the use of teachers and the students.

Internet facility in the computer labs is also available for use by the teachers and the students when the labs are not in use.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The institution had planned to computerize all the operations of the office and the library and to provide such facility in the teaching departments. It is also planned to add more computer based courses and infrastructure accordingly. Gadgets and laptops have been purchased for smart class rooms/labs to promote ICT/CAL in learning.

Working on these lines, strategies have been drawn to deploy and upgrade IT infrastructure.

The college does not make any formal budgetary provision. However, funds are provided for procurement, up-gradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories, as and when required.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?

The college has established a teaching aid cell. The members of the cell help the teachers for preparing computer-aided teaching/learning material.

Special training programmes in the use of computers for the teaching staff have been conducted from time to time. A lecture on the use of computer aided teaching/learning material was organized for the teaching staff.

The teachers are free to use internet and the central computer facility for this purpose.

The college has procured LCD projectors, laptops, overhead projectors, LCD TVs, cameras, interactive boards and has established a Language lab, etc. for the use of such facilities.

It has set up two smart class rooms, two smart labs and an audiovisual/seminar room.

Departments of Commerce and Business Administration, English, Punjabi, Political Science, Sociology, Physics, Chemistry, OMSP and Fashion Designing have been provided computers.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

The institution has deployed many learning activities and technologies to place the student at the center of teaching-learning process while the teacher renders the role of a facilitator. Some of these are an integral part of the evaluation system. The examples are as follows:

- Lab/practical work in the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Computer Science, Fashion Designing, Animation and Graphics, Computer Based Accounting, Office Management and Secretarial Practices, Music (Vocal), Physical Education, etc. in various programmes.
- The industrial training in M.Sc. (IT) and summer training in M.Com.
- Project work in BBA, BCA and PGDCA.
- Assignments in PG classes, BCA, BBA and B.Com. form a part of internal assessment for which the students make use of online line learning resources.
- Seminars/Presentations in PG classes, BCA, form a part of internal assessment where the students frequently use ICT.
- Language lab is used to hold classes for spoken English.
- A module for online tests has been added to the college software.

Besides these, the students also participate in quizzes, group discussions, surveys, mock elections and give presentations.

In most of the above mentioned activities, the students make use of equipment and technologies deployed in the institution or at the place of industries where they carry out their training.

The students are encouraged to use ICT enabled learning spaces/technologies for presentations, spoken English, learning music

and preparation of project reports, assignments etc. They also use these for assessing online information.

During the last eight years the lawns and playgrounds have been relaid with grass and are being well kept and about 900 trees and shrubs have been planted. These include medicinal plants, fruit trees, ornamentals, timber trees and specimen trees having educational value.

For its upkeep, the building is regularly repaired and painted. Electrical fittings are also replaced whenever needed.

It is ensured that the equipment is in good working order. For this repair/maintenance is done as and when required.

Maintenance of water purifiers, Xerox machines, computer software and hardware, software packages is done through AMC's.

The fire extinguishers are refilled in time.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

The college does not have any scientific instrument that needs regular calibration. However, the equipment like generators, servos, inverters/UPS, water purifiers, etc. are regularly serviced and maintained.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The college has three generator sets of 32 kva, 82 kva and 125 kva for uninterrupted power supply. In addition to this, inverters/UPS have also been installed.

To prevent damage to sensitive equipment, we have installed servos and stabilizers.

For constant supply of water for drinking, multiple connections are available from the water supply department of the town. Four submersible pumps to get underground water for drinking, use and irrigation of lawns and grounds, have also been installed.

Water coolers with purifiers have been installed for drinking purpose.

Any other relevant information regarding Infrastructure and Learning Resources which the college would like to include.

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

The institution publishes its updated prospectus annually. It also provides information through the college website.

The prospectus and the college websites provide complete information about the institution, its aims and objectives, academic calendar, faculty, administrative and academic committees, admission process, dates and admission rules, courses offered and eligibility conditions for each course, options/subjects available, fee structure, basis for internal assessment, requirement of attendance at lectures and minimum marks in qualifying examination, student support facilities like fee concession and scholarships, awards/prizes, library, sports, clubs/societies, committees for prevention of ragging and sexual harassment etc.

Information like admission dates, courses offered and facilities provided by the institution are also disseminated through the admission notices, pamphlets, posters, banners and advertisements through cable network.

The annual report is published in the news section of the college magazine every year. It carries complete information about the performance of students in exams, financial support and scholarships provided, sports and cultural activities; development of the college; information regarding seminars, extension activities, faculty improvement programmes, extension activities, tours etc. organized by the institution; list of publications by faculty and seminars/conferences/ refresher courses/ orientation courses/workshops attended by them during the session.

The institution has its website which is regularly updated. It provides complete information about the institution. Copy of the prospectus, disseminating all information, is also available on the website. The admission form is filled on-line.

The dates of admission, courses offered and the admission process are advertised in the regional newspapers.

The institution also distributes booklets containing unitized syllabus to the students.

The institution ensures its commitment and accountability by providing best possible teaching-learning facilities; qualified and committed faculty; appropriate infrastructure, conducive academic atmosphere and campus experience through various co-curricular and

extra-curricular activities spread through the session; and through its overall ambience.

The institution obtains regular feedback from its students, parents, academic peers, people of the area and industry. Corrective measures are taken wherever found deficient, provided the resources permit.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships / freeships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

The institution provides substantial financial aid to the students to the extent that no student is denied admission for economic reasons.

The college provides aid from Student Aid Fund and Guru Nanak Club of the college to the economically weaker students. It also provides scholarships to meritorious students. It has some endowment funds instituted by the members of the management and public donors for scholarships to be given on the basis of means cum merit.

- ✓ Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections
 - Reservation policy of the state government is followed.
 - Relaxation of 5% marks is given to students of SC category in the minimum marks required for admissions to all courses, wherever applicable.
 - Students from SC/ST/OBC/minority categories are guided to apply for scholarship schemes of the government which includes full fee concession to students from SC category.
 - Students from other economically weaker sections are provided financial aid by the college.

✓ Students with physical disabilities

- The college has constructed ramps for unhindered movement of such students.
- Financial aid is provided to such students by the college.
- Relaxation of 5% marks is given to students of this category in the minimum marks required for admissions to all courses wherever applicable.

✓ Students to participate in various competitions/National and International

The college encourages its students to participate in various inter-college/ inter-university/ state/national/ international competitions in sports and cultural activities.

It provides the following support services/ facilities:

- Coaching facilities are provided wherever the expertise is not available in the college.
- Refreshment/diet money is provided during practice and participation days.
- Equipment, Sports Kits and dresses are provided.
- Financial support for Medical/First aid facilities is provided to them during competitions.
- Arrangements for travel for participation in competitions are made.
- The students are helped to get exemption from the final exams from the university if the dates clash with competitions/trials. The exams for such students are held on a later date.
- Fee concession / financial aid/ scholarships are provided to outstanding students.
- Outstanding students are awarded Roll of Honour, College Colour and Merit Certificates. A tea party is arranged every year for students who perform well in Youth Festivals.
- Special tests are held for such students.
- Teachers provide extra guidance and coaching to such students.
- The college organizes Youth festivals and live concerts by renowned artists to motivate the students to participate in such activities.
- Duty leave is granted to students to attend coaching camps, trials and participation.

- ✓ Medical assistance to students: health center, health insurance etc.
 - All the students are covered under General Insurance Policy.
 - Medical aid is provided whenever needed.
 - Medical checkup during NSS camps is organized.
 - First aid training is given to NSS Volunteers.
 - Financial support for medical/first aid facilities is provided to sports persons during competitions.

✓ Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

- Coaching classes for Entry to Service were organized with the support of the UGC during the 11th Plan.
- Coaching classes for UGC/NET was organized during the session 37 students received coaching 15 appeared in the test and 5 of them cleared it.
- Coaching has been provided to the science students for entrance tests for admission to PG courses in leading universities of the region. One student got admission in M.Sc. Physics in Panjab University, Chandigarh during the session 2013-14 and one student has secured 35th rank in the entrance exam, held by Panjab University, for admission to M.Sc. Physics and 80th rank for admission to M.Sc. Chemistry.

✓ Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)

- Classes in Spoken English are arranged for the students.
- One Month Crash course in English is organized during summer vacations for students and non-students.
- The college offers a number of computer courses/subjects like BCA, PGDCA, M.Sc. (IT); Computer Science in B.A. and B.Sc., Computer Basics/IT in BBA and M.Com.; and Introduction to Computer Science in Modular form to all undergraduate students as an Additional Optional Subject. Besides, the college offers short term course in the use of Internet and e-mail, Computers Basics, Computer Hardware and Networking, TALLY etc. to its students and non-students during summer vacations.

✓ Support for "slow learners"

It has been identified that most of the students are not comfortable with the subject of English in B.A., Mathematics in BCA and Financial Accounting in B.Com. etc. The college provides extra lectures every week for the benefit of these students.

- Slow learners in other subjects are also identified and remedial classes arranged for them.
- Coaching classes are arranged, before the supplementary exams, for those students who promote with compartment.
- ✓ Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate/business house etc.
 - Students of M.Sc. (IT), M.Com., BBA visit industry for the training/summer projects etc.
 - Visits of the students are arranged to places like Science City, universities, old age homes, Parliament, Vidhan Sabha etc.
- ✓ Publication of student magazines
 - The college publishes its annual magazine 'UDAR' and a monthly wall magazine 'THE DAWN'.
- 5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

Entrepreneurship is an important component of the curriculum in B.Com., BBA and BCA. Moreover, the students visit industries and business enterprises for project work and training. This too develops entrepreneurial skills in the students.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

A very active tradition of multifarious co-curricular and extracurricular activities has been the forte of Guru Nanak National College, Doraha.

The institution believes that sports and cultural activities are important not only for competitive purpose but also for building the character and personality of the individuals. Participation in these activities is necessary for keeping good health, channelizing the energies of the youth and keeping the youth away from the menace of drug addiction. Cultural activities also help the students to hone their skills in performing arts like music, dances and theatrical items. For this we encourage mass participation of the students in such activities.

Our students participate in a big way in the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festivals of Panjab University Chandigarh and bag outstanding positions reaching out for more brilliant positions at Inter-Zonal levels, Inter-Varsity level, National level or even International level.

Trained sports persons are not readily available. So we encourage student participation in those games/sports in which students can be groomed in the college. Similarly we train the students and ensure participation in cultural activities.

In addition to competing in cultural programmes, the students are invited to present their talent at a number of prestigious functions by different organizations and institutions like Panjab University, Doordarshan etc.

The institution organizes competitions like talent search and cultural functions like *Teej*, Founders' Day and farewell functions etc. A good number of students participate in these activities.

Besides promoting sports for competitive purpose, the institution encourages mass participation in sports. It organizes annual athletic meet and interclass sports competitions for this purpose.

Different departments, subject societies, associations and clubs organize a number of co-curricular activities like group discussions, mock elections, surveys, tours, poster competitions, declamations, presentations, quiz contests, debates, seminars, paper reading contests, essay writing competitions, etc.

The institution also organizes youth festivals, competitions and live shows to motivate the students and promote their participation. Some of these events, organized during the last eight years, are given below:

- Punjab State Boxing Federation organized Junior Punjab State Boxing Competitions in the college auditorium on 19-21 September, 2013.

Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations:

The teachers give separate time for academic guidance and coaching to the students participating in extra-curricular activities.

These students are provided flexibility in house exams. Special exams are conducted for them. The university, on the recommendation of the college, has exempted Mr. Ajaypal Singh Gill a national level shooter from appearing in annual exams. He was given a special chance for this.

 - Coaching in reasoning was provided for banking exams. Twelve students undertook in it.
 - Coaching for entrance tests for admission to PG courses in leading universities is organized. For details refer 5.1.4.
 - The career guidance and counseling cell and the library provide information regarding jobs, vacancies and competitions.

- The students are provided application forms for competitions and vacancies.
- The students are helped to fill on-line applications.

During the last four years 5.96% of the passing out students qualified IELTS / competitive exams. It is worth mentioning that during the session 2013-14 three of the students of M.Com. cleared NET exam even as they had appeared for the 3rd semester exams of the PG programme.

The institution provides counseling services to its students in academic, personal, career and psycho-social matters.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

The college has a Placement and Career Guidance and Counselling Cell. The members of these cells as well as other teachers are readily available to guide the students. The placement cell, along with the college library, displays notices and advertisements regarding vacancies of different types. The students are also provided application forms for vacancies and are guided to fill up the same.

Coaching for entry to service was arranged with the support of UGC for minorities and SC/ST categories of students.

Coaching is also organized for UGC NET.

The placement cell is in constant touch with the industry and other employers for placement of its students. The students are sent for interviews when demanded. Some placements have been facilitated in this manner.

Educational institutions of the region also send their requirement of teachers. Old students are contacted and sent for interviews.

The placement cell also helps the students to go to the industry for training and projects. At times the students are offered jobs at the time of training itself.

For details regarding services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview refer 5.1.4 and 5.1.7. For percentage of students selected through campus placements refer 5.2.1.

The students of the institution have been placed in industries like T.I.T. Infotech, Sportking Synthetics, A to Z Company, Yerik International Ltd., HDFC Bank, LIC, G. S. Autos, Kashmir Apiaries, Saubhagya Ltd., Hero Cycles, Bhogal Cycles Ltd., Longowal Textiles and some schools of the area through placements facilitated by the college.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

The college has a grievance redressal cell. The students directly approach its members for redressal of their grievances or the grievances are forwarded to it. Suggestion boxes have also been placed in the campus. This cell addresses the grievances to the satisfaction of the aggrieved. Special committees are formed for specific purposes.

Many grievances/ complaints are received verbally and few in written form as well. Most of the grievances reported are regarding canteen service, drinking water, cleanliness etc. A few grievances are related to teachers. These are redressed promptly, to the satisfaction of the students.

The senior most lady teacher has been appointed as in-charge of the girls' wing. She, along with the other female staff, provides guidance and counseling to the female students and addresses their grievances, as well.

The college has constituted a Cell for prevention of sexual harassment of women at work place. It constitutes of senior members of the female staff with a representative of the non-teaching staff as well. It is meant to look into any complaint received from the employees or the students and act thereof.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

The college has an anti-ragging committee. No instance of ragging has been reported so far.

The institution provides a number of schemes for the welfare of students. Most of these are listed as follows:

- Liberal financial aid
- ii. Group Insurance Scheme for students
- iii. Refreshment/diet money during rehearsals of cultural activities, practice of sports events etc.
- iv. Sports kits and dresses to participate in sports and cultural activities
- v. Coaching facility for participation in sports and cultural activities
- vi. Guidance and Counselling
- vii. Book bank facility
- viii. Concessional bus passes, issued by the state transport department, to facilitate easy access for students
- ix. Transport facility for girls with private participation
- x. Canteen facility for staff and students. The rates of eatables and drinks are approved by the canteen committee and are generally less than the market rates.
- xi. Hostel facility for women students preparing for cultural and sports competitions.

The institution has an alumni association that has not been registered. It was established in the year 2003. Its meetings are held almost every year. The old students share their views and provide feedback

during these meetings. They have contributed Rs. 67,000/-. This amount is used as endowment to provide financial aid to needy students.

They are helpful in organizing extension activities.

They also contribute some funds annually, which are used to encourage meritorious students and sportspersons.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The institution facilitates student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment by:

- Providing skill based courses to enrich degrees and enhance employability

- Providing guidance and counselling
- Arranging extension lectures
- Giving opportunity to students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to develop employable skills like personality development, communicative skills and skills in performing arts.
- Provide industrial/ summer training
- Providing placement services
- Providing Post Graduate Courses
- Conducting coaching for entry to service, NET and entrance exams for admission to higher level courses
- Encouraging students to appear in entrance tests and competitions.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

Since the cut off percentage at the time of admissions is quite low, maintaining the failure and dropout rates at a low level is quite challenging. The institution makes consistent efforts and provides special support to the students who are at risk of failure and drop out.

The main causes of dropouts have been identified to a great extent and support has been planned accordingly.

It has been identified that most of the dropouts are boys and that too in the first year of study, especially in Arts. Many students leave the courses during the first two months after admissions, mostly to join other courses or institutions.

A few students migrate to institutions nearer to their houses during the 2nd and 3rd years as well.

In addition to these, some students, especially girls leave the institution due to immigration or marriage. This is mostly the case in PG classes.

A few students leave their studies due to financial, social and domestic reasons or due to lack of motivation in some cases.

Majority of the students are from rural background and disadvantaged sections. They have been deprived of proper schooling. Most of the failure/compartment cases are in English (a compulsory subject in all UG programmes), Mathematics (in B.C.A. and B.B.A.) and Financial Accounting (in B.Com.).

A few students take admission to maintain their continuity as regular students for immigration purposes. They are not otherwise interested in attending classes. Their names are struck off during the session or are detained for non-fulfillment of eligibility conditions regarding minimum attendance at lectures of marks in house exams.

The institution has made plans to minimize dropout/failure for each category of these students.

Extra classes and remedial classes are organized for the students for all the three years in B.A. programme, especially in the subject of English, throughout the session.

Special coaching classes are arranged for students who are placed under compartment in the annual exams so that they pass in the supplementary exams.

Similarly, extra classes and remedial classes are provided in the subject of Mathematics in B.C.A. and B.B.A. and Financial Accounting in B.Com.

Dropout due to financial reasons is prevented by providing liberal financial aid to needy students and allowing payment of fees in easy installments.

Guidance and counseling is provided by the staff or the head of the institution to the students with social or domestic problems or with low motivation levels. In most of these cases, they are convinced to continue their studies.

Another category of dropouts is that non-serious students. These students fail to fulfill eligibility conditions due to shortage in attendance or low score in qualifying exams. Such students are regularly monitored. Their parents are informed about their performance after every term. The institution strictly complies with the eligibility conditions as attendance at lectures and minimum marks in house exams to maintain academic standards.

The parent teacher meetings are also held especially in the case of B.C.A., B.B.A. classes and B.A. as well.

A few students leave the course without informing the institution. The teachers telephonically contact them and have been successful to convince a few of them to continue the course. It is difficult to ascertain the reason for such dropouts in most of the cases.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

The college has planned policies and strategies to encourage participation in sports, games, cultural and extracurricular activities as mentioned in 5.1.6.

A wide range of such activities are available for the students. They participate in intercollege competitions in Hockey, Football, Kabbadi, Cricket, Athletics, Shooting, Body Building, Power Lifting, Boxing, Netball, Kho-Kho, Hand Ball, Chess etc. The institution also organizes inter-class competitions and annual athletic meet to ensure mass participation of students. Facilities for badminton, table tennis, chess, carom board, gymnastics, handball, basketball, volleyball have also been made available.

The college provides opportunities to its students to exhibit and hone their skills in dramatics, dances, music, debates, literary writing competitions etc. The students participate in a big way in all the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festivals of Panjab University Chandigarh and bag outstanding positions, reaching out for more brilliant positions at Inter-Zonal levels, National level or even Inter-National level. The university organizes intercollege competitions in 46 items spread over theatre, music, dance, literary, fine arts and heritage items. The college ensures the participation of its students in almost all of these.

Students participate in competitions organized by other institutions/organizations as well.

Besides this, a number of debates, declamations, quiz competitions, writing competitions etc. are organized by various clubs and societies. Cultural programmes are often organized by the college in which a large number of students participate.

The institution follows the programme calendar provided by the affiliating university for intercollege sports competitions.

Camps for sports/games are arranged about 20 days before the competition.

Inter-School Diwali Hockey tournament is organized in the month of November and Annual Athletic meet in February every year.

Interclass sports competitions are organized in the months of November, January and February.

Cultural and other extra-curricular activities are meticulously planned and spread throughout the session.

A Cultural Programme in the memory of the Founder President Late Dr. Ishwar Singh is organized on 31st August every year. It helps us to hunt talent in the new entrants. Participation of maximum number of students is ensured in it.

Gurpuarv (Birthday of Guru Nanak Dev Ji) is celebrated in November every year.

The students remain busy in participation and preparation for youth festivals in the months of September and October.

Other activities like debates, declamations, quiz contests, seminars,

paper reading contests, essay writing competitions etc. are spread throughout the session.

Farewell parties are organized in the month of March in which the students participate enthusiastically.

Details of participation and achievements of students in inter-college, intervarsity, state, national and international level are given in 5.3.2 below.

GAMES AND SPORTS:

A number of sports persons of the college have won laurels at the national and international level in the past.

The college hockey team has won Punjab University championship for 17 years consecutively in B Division and has also won Silver and Bronze Medals in A Division.

The college is proud to own an outstanding sports person every now and then.

The year wise participation and achievements in sports and games for the previous four years is as follows:

Session 2010-11:

A total of ninety one sportsmen and forty sportswomen participated in various Inter-University and Inter College competitions. Sportsmen participated in Hockey, Football, Cricket, Kabbadi (National style), Handball, Best Physique, Weight Lifting, Chess, Athletics and sportswomen in Kho-Kho, Netball, Kabaddi (National Style) and Athletics competitions of Panjab University.

Mr. Hardeep Singh bagged 4th position in Panjab University Best Physique inter college competition.

The college team won Bronze medal in Panjab University Kabaddi (National Style) Competition in B Division. One of our players, Sandeep Singh of B.A. III represented Panjab University in All India Inter-University Kabaddi (National Style) Competition.

Ms. Manpreet Kaur of B.A. I represented Panjab University in All India Inter-University Netball Competition. The Panjab University team won Gold medal.

Session 2011-12:

A total of eighty eight of our sportsmen and forty sportswomen participated in competitions of different levels. Sportsmen

participated in Hockey, Football, Cricket, Kabbadi (National style), Handball, Chess, Athletics and sportswomen in Kho-Kho, Netball, Kabaddi (National Style) and Athletics competitions of Panjab University.

Ms. Manpreet Kaur of B.A. I represented Panjab University in All India Inter-University Netball Competition. The Panjab University team won Bronze medal.

Session 2012-13:

A total of seventy three of our sportsmen and thirty eight sportswomen participated in various competitions. Sportsmen participated in Hockey, Football, Cricket, Shooting, Best Physique, Athletics and sportswomen in Kho-Kho, Netball, Athletics and Kabaddi (National Style) competitions organized by Panjab University.

Mr. Ajaypal Singh Gill won Gold Medal in 10 Meter Rifle shooting in Panjab University intercollege competitions. He represented Panjab University in All India Interuniversity Competitions and secured 4th position. He shot to 1st position in All India Shooting Championship held as Panipat and was also declared as champion of champions. He was selected for trials for participation in world university championship.

Mr. Rakesh Kumar of B.Com. I bagged Bronze Medal in Punjab State Best Physique competitions.

Ms. Manpreet Kaur of B.A. III represented Panjab University in All India Inter-University Netball Competition.

Sandeep Kaur of B.A. III represented Panjab University in Kabaddi National style competitions at Inter-university level.

The college cricket team participated and won the DIMT cricket cup. Mr. Perminder Singh of M.A. I (Pol. Sci.) was declared man of the series.

Session 2013-14:

A total of seventy four college sportsmen and fifty sportswomen participated in various National, State, Inter University, and Inter College competitions held by Panjab University. Our sportsmen participated in Hockey, Football, Cricket, Athletics, Body Building, Power Lifting and Shooting competitions and sportswomen in Kho-Kho, Netball, and Kabaddi (National Style) competitions of Panjab University.

Mr. Ajaypal Singh Gill won Silver Medal in 10 Meter Rifle shooting in Panjab University intercollege competitions. He represented Panjab University in All India Inter-university Competitions and secured 4th position. He also secured 2st position in All India Mavlankar Shooting Competition, 2nd position in North-Zone

Shooting Competition, 4th position in 57th National Shooting Competition and 1st position in Punjab State in competition conducted by National Rifle Association.

Mr. Rakesh Kumar of B.Com. II bagged bronze medal in best physique in intercollege competitions organized by Panjab University. He was also placed at 5th position in North India.

Mr. Chamkaur Singh of B.A. II bagged bronze medal in best physique in intercollege competitions organized by Panjab University. He also won bronze medal in Punjab State best physique championship.

Mr. Shaukat Ali of B.A. I got 2nd position in Punjab State Sub-Junior competition in best Physique.

Mr. Satnam Singh got 2nd Position in Senior Punjab State championship in this event.

Mr. Amritpal Singh of B.A. I was the highest wicket taker in Katoch Shield in Punjab. He represented Punjab in C.K. Nayudu National Trophy. He was selected for the camp for Vijay Hazare National Trophy.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES:

Session 2010-11:

Our students participated in various International, National, State and University level functions and competitions and won laurels for the institution.

During this session, 138 students participated in 43 items and won as many 43 prizes in Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival of Panjab University Ludhiana Zone - A. Of these, 18 prizes were first, 17 second and 8 third.

A total of 59 students of the college represented Ludhiana Zone - A in Panjab University Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival held in the college in 14 of the 43 items. They won 4 first, 5 second and 5 third prizes.

National level Competitions:

Ishar Singh:

- i. He won 3rd position in North Zone Inter-University Youth Festival held at Jhansi in Non-Percussion
- ii. He got 1st position in Non-Percussion in 'Namdhari Sangeet Samelan'.
- iii. He got 3rd position in non-percussion in National level competition: 'Gurmat Sangeet Samelan' organized by Punjabi University, Patiala.

He was a member of a cultural troupe of the Indian Council for Cultural Relations, Ministry of External Affairs that toured Europe. He played *Algozza* in shows organized in Italy, France, Hungary and Turkey.

Session 2011-12:

A number of our students presented programmes in dances, antakshri, music and theatre items that were telecast by DD Jalandhar.

Many of our students and members of the faculty have performed in a Punjabi Movie "Sadi Vakhri Hai Shaan" which was also shot in the college campus.

Our students participated in various National, State and University level functions and competitions and won laurels for the institution.

During this session the students of the college participated in the Zonal Youth Festival and Heritage Festival of Panjab University Ludhiana Zone - A. A total of 146 students participated in 43 items and won as many as 39 prizes. Of these, 17 prizes were first, 16 second and 6 third.

A total of 62 students of the college represented Ludhiana Zone - A in Panjab University Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival in 14 of the 44 items. They won 1 first, 5 second and 3 third prizes.

National level Competitions:

Ishar Singh:

- i. He got 1st position in Non-Percussion playing *Taar-Shehnai* in a National Competition organized by "Sangeet Kala Manch" Jalandhar.
- ii. He got 2nd position in non-percussion (*Taar-Shehnai*) in *Gurmat Sangeet Samelan* organized by Punjabi University, Patiala.

Session 2012-13:

Our students participated in various National, State and University level functions and competitions and won laurels for the institution.

During this session the students of our college participated in a big way in the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival of Panjab University Ludhiana Zone - A. A total of 128 students participated in 41 items and won 34 prizes. Of these 19 prizes were first, 11 second and 4 third. The details of these achievements are as follows:

A total of 46 students of the college represented Ludhiana Zone- A in Panjab University Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival in 11 of the 44 items. They won 3 first, 4 second and 2 third prizes.

State/National level Competitions:

- 1. The college folk orchestra team won 1st position in Punjab State Inter-University Youth Festival, 3rd position in Inter-University Youth Festival held at New Delhi and 3rd position in Inter-University Youth Festival held at Mohali.
- 2. Idiomatic conversation won 2nd prize in Punjab State Inter-University Youth Festival.
- 3. Gaganpreet Kaur won 1st position in *pakhi designing* in Inter-University Youth Festival organized by Department of Youth Welfare, Punjab held at Mohali.
- 4. Charankamal Kaur won 1st position in *Crochet Work* in Inter-University Youth Festival organized by Department of Youth Welfare Punjab at Mohali.
- 5. Mr. Ishar Singh participated in Harvallabh Sangeet Samelan held at Jalandhar and secured 3rd position in Taar Shenai.
- 6. Mr. Santa Singh performed in Classical singing programme organized by Sahit Academy, Delhi.

Session 2013-14:

Panjab University introduced team trophy at Zonal and Inter-Zonal levels for the first time this year. Our college won the Zonal trophy and was placed 3rd in overall marks tally at the Inter-Zonal level.

Our students participated in various National, State and University level functions and competitions and won laurels for the institution.

During this session, the students of our college participated in the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival of Panjab University Ludhiana Zone - A. A total of 145 students participated in 45 items and won 34 prizes. Of these, 19 prizes were first, 11 second and 4 third.

A total of 66 students of the college represented Ludhiana Zone - A in Panjab University Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival in 16 of the 46 items. They won 3 first, 3 second and 7 third prizes.

Panjab University introduced team trophy at Zonal and Inter-Zonal levels for the first time this year. Our college won the Zonal trophy and was place 3rd in overall marks tally at the Inter-Zonal level from amongst about 190 institutions affiliated to the university.

In addition to this, our students participated in some other prestigious competitions and won laurels.

State level Competitions:

- 1. The folk dance team won 1st position in Punjab State Inter-University Youth Festival, held at Layalpur Khalsa College, Jalandhar.
- 2. The Kavishri team won 1st position in Punjab State Inter-University Youth Festival, held at Layalpur Khalsa College, Jalandhar.
- 5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

The institution gets a feedback proforma filled from the passing out graduates. The feedback from the employers is sought through interaction of the faculty with the industry at the time of training of students or during placement interviews.

The institution uses the data and feedback from its graduates and employers to start new courses, improve and upgrade infrastructure, update the curriculum through its faculty members who are members of various university bodies etc. It is also used for counselling of faculty wherever needed and at the time of reappointment of temporary staff. The data has also been used to improve the teaching-learning process, library, canteen, drinking water facility, toilets, cleanliness etc.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The institution brings out the college magazine 'Udar' every year. A senior teacher is the Chief Editor and other teachers are appointed as Editors of different sections like English Section, Punjabi Section, Hindi Section, News Section, Science Section, Planning Forum etc. The teacher editors appoint a student editor for each section. The students are encouraged by the teachers and student editors to contribute for the magazine.

The press club of the college also brings out a monthly wall magazine 'The Dawn'. The students contribute in good numbers for this magazine.

The press club and various literary societies of the college hold competitions in essay writing, story writing and poem writing. All these activities encourage the students to prepare and publish the material in the college magazine.

The Department of Youth Welfare, Panjab University has launched a magazine 'Jawan Tarang'. A prize winning short story of one of our students Mandeep Kaur has been published in it.

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

To encourage students' participation in the development of the institution and to address their grievances, the college has a Students Welfare Council. The students who are outstanding in different fields such as Academics, Sports, NCC, NSS, Youth Services, Cultural Activities, Press Club etc., are nominated as its members. Meetings of the council are held in which the students give feedback on curricular aspects, improvement of the infrastructure, facilities and other student related issues. Council members take active part in all the functions of the College and help to organize them under the guidance of the teachers.

5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

The students represent some of the academic and administrative bodies of the institution like Students Welfare Council, Library Committee, Amalgamated Fund Committee etc.

They are also nominated as sub-editors to various sections of the college magazine.

The students are made members of organizing committees of clubs and departmental societies.

One of our students, Mr. Tejveer Singh, as a representative of the students of all the affiliated colleges, was member of the fee revision committee of Panjab University. On getting feedback from the staff, the principal and his fellow students, he suggested the increase in Student Aid Fund from Rs. 100/- per head to Rs. 300/- per head. This increased the availability of funds for support to the needy students.

5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the Institution.

The institution has an Alumni Association. It occasionally organizes alumni meets. The old students keep visiting the college and interact with the head of the institution and the faculty. Some socially active alumni organize cultural functions, awareness campaigns and extension activities in collaboration with the institution. Some of our alumni give cash awards to outstanding sports persons and meritorious students. The college has instituted scholarships for meritorious students with the contribution of alumni, which amounts to about Rs. 67,000/-.

The former faculty is invited during college functions and retirement parties. Some of them are re-employed as guest faculty.

It strives for:

- spreading the light of knowledge;
- preparing the youth for the global job market by imparting the necessary skills and virtues;
- guiding them to be better human beings by imparting high moral and civic values through various activities;
- providing equal opportunities to all irrespective of caste, colour or creed;
- uplifting the downtrodden;
- empowering women;
- inculcating the spirit of nationalism and universal brotherhood;
- promoting and achieving excellence in education in terms of quality and inclusiveness.

The mission statement wholesomely reflects the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, its traditions and value orientation. The institutions missionary zeal and nationalist spirit to serve the society, through the doors of higher education, is very much evident in the mission statement.

The institute's mission statement aims at catering the needs of the society. It strives to impart quality education to the youth, belonging to all sections of the society of the small town of Doraha and the surrounding areas, especially rural and; for contributing to build up a knowledge society; for guiding the youth to be better human beings by imparting high moral and civic values through various activities; for inculcating the spirit of nationalism and universal brotherhood; for inculcating the spirit of excellence and global competencies among youth. It is evident that the institution strives for inclusive growth of the society.

The institution has set up certain traditions. It is known to provide quality affordable education. It provides liberal financial aid to the needy students. It not only functions to inculcate a value system among its students but also practices the same in its day to day functioning.

It has a transparent delivery system in all spheres- academic as well as administrative with participative decision making.

Organizing and promoting cultural activities and ensuring active and massive participation of the students in these has become the forte of the institution.

Besides having a student friendly atmosphere, strict discipline is maintained in the institution which leads to a congenial academic atmosphere.

Students are free to share their grievances with the teachers and the principal- both at the collective or individual level.

Catering to the local needs, an innovative separate girl's wing has been set up, which though being a part of the college, functions as an independent entity in itself, where the female students are at ease to receive education, especially in the arts stream.

To facilitate and promote education among women, the college has arranged transport facility with private participation. Girls of more than 150 villages and small towns commute daily by this means. All these steps are fully focused towards its primary objectives of empowering women, especially those from rural areas.

Above all, the institution has fully imbibed the philosophy of Guru Nanak endowed with values such as social justice for all, gender equality, uplifting the downtrodden, especially women, apart from spreading the message of universal brotherhood. It plans its extension activities and outreach programmes to supplement its academic activities in addressing the needs of the society and promote its traditions and value orientation.

To achieve excellence and equip the youth with global competencies, the institution keeps on introducing new courses. During the last five years, courses related to Social Sciences, Basic Sciences, Management & Commerce and ICT have been introduced. In addition to these, skill based career-oriented add-on-courses are regularly being introduced. A few short term courses in non-formal mode are also being offered.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The management functions through its executive which is an elected body. It has the principal as ex-officio member and three elected staff representatives as its members. All major policy decisions as introducing of new courses, sanction of posts, development of infrastructure, revision of pay scales, career advancement/step ups of teaching and non-teaching staff, passing of the budget etc. are taken by the executive. The Management, Principal and the Faculty often interact with each other formally as well as non-formally.

The principal ensures the implementation of the policy decisions of the management. He also puts before the management any new communication/decision of the government/university and matters related with the college for approval wherever needed. He provides and shares regular feedback about the institution with the office bearers of the management.

The principal designs and implements quality policy and plans regarding academic and day-to-day administrative affairs with the help of an advisory committee which comprises of senior teachers. He also interacts with the heads of the departments and the office staff to discuss policy and plans. Suggestions of the management or other stake holders are shared and taken care of while planning.

The principal often holds meetings with the teaching and office staff for sharing policy and plans and their implementations. He also gets feedback and suggestions from them.

Deans of Academics, Sports, Extension Activities, Co-Curricular Activities, Alumni Association, Students Welfare and Registrar of Examinations help to plan and implement the policy and plans. The Deans and the Registrar are members of the Advisory Committee mentioned above.

All the decisions are implemented through various administrative and academic committees, the departments and tutors. These are headed by senior teachers as conveners, heads and senior tutors.

A number of committees like Building Committee, Amalgamated Fund Committee, Discipline Committee, Library Committee, Research Committee, Placement Cell, Career Guidance and Counselling Cell, Special Cell for Prevention of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and Students, Committee for Prevention of Ragging, Purchase Committee, Examination Committee, Canteen Committee, Audio-Visual Aids Cell, College Computerization Committee, Sports Council, Campus Beautification Committee, Admission Committees, Time Table Committee, Organizing Committees for functions and events, Committees for preparation and participation of teams for youth festivals etc. have been constituted for the implementation of the policies and plans.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission
- formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan
- Interaction with stakeholders
- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders
- Reinforcing the culture of excellence
- Champion organizational change

As mentioned in 6.1.2, the Management under the leadership of the President and the Secretary take policy decisions as starting of new courses, sanction of posts, development of infrastructure, revision of pay scales, career advancement/step ups of teaching and non-teaching staff, budgeting etc. They keep a close watch on the developments in the institution and provide guidance through the head of the institution. They receive information from the principal and other stakeholders about the performance of the institution and the staff. They often interact with the principal, staff and the students.

The head of the institution ensures that policy statements and action plans are implemented with the help of the faculty.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

There is a well-defined and efficient mechanism to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time. As mentioned in 6.1.2, committees are constituted to carry out different jobs/tasks/activities. Even the students are represented on some of them. Meetings of the committees/ departments are regularly held to plan the implementation of various tasks/activities. The principal often holds meetings of the Advisory Committee and the Staff to monitor, evaluate and ensure the implementation of the policy and

plans. In addition to these, meetings of conveners of various committees are also held from time to time for specific purpose.

The deans and conveners co-ordinate and monitor the work of the committees falling under their jurisdiction. They hold meetings of the staff associated with them. Sometimes such meetings are held under the chairmanship of the principal. They report the progress of the activities to the principal.

The principal presents the annual report at the time of convocation and annual prize distribution function every year. The annual report is also published in the news section of the college magazine. The principal gave a presentation to the members of the management during its general body meeting on 17th August, 2012. Through this presentation, he provided complete information regarding the financial resources generated, donations/grants received, new courses started, expenditure on various developmental projects, infrastructure created and renovated, financial aid / scholarships provided to the students, grants received under various UGC schemes, equipment purchased, special programmes like remedial classes and coaching for entry to service, student strength, results of the college, sports activities and achievements, cultural activities organized and achievements etc. from the session 2006-07 to 2011-12. The members of the management gave their suggestions and appreciated the achievements of the college and congratulated the principal, staff and students for these achievements.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

In addition to the role of the top management as explained in 6.1.2, it also provides academic leadership to the faculty as follows:

- The representatives of the top management often, formally and non-formally, interact and hold meetings with the faculty.
- The top management readily sanctions long leave or Ex-India leave that is sought by the faculty for further studies or to attend seminars/conferences etc.
- It also motivates the faculty and sometimes honours them as well.
- The decisions like implementation of the revised pay scales or career advancement are taken without delay.
- It encourages the head of the institution to frame and implement policies and plans that improve academic atmosphere.
- Office bearers of the management are actively involved in discussing and planning the future requirements of the infrastructure, new courses to be started, the financial needs and possible sources to meet them, organization of extra-curricular

activities, dignitaries to be invited for college functions, the progression of the students, areas which need improvement etc. with the principal and the faculty.

In addition to the role of the principal as mentioned in 6.1.2 he provides academic leadership in the following ways as well:

- Budgeting and monitoring inflow and outflow of funds
- Planning the introduction of new courses
- Encouraging the introduction new teaching technologies
- Planning reports and projects for UGC funding
- Recruiting of faculty
- Planning the organization of various academic and co-curricular activities as seminars, extension lectures etc.
- Distributing work among various constituents of the institution
- Coordinating with various committees formed for the smooth conduct of academic, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities
- Planning infrastructure as per the requirement and changing needs
- Receiving feedback and taking corrective measures suggested there in
- Maintaining discipline and congenial academic atmosphere in the college
- Monitoring the academic and administrative activities
- Planning and organizing extra-curricular activities and outreach programmes

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The college strives to groom leadership among its staff as well as students. It promotes active participation of the faculty in all its academic and administrative planning and execution. The concept of participative decision making and decentralization is followed to the best of its practicability.

The teachers are given independent responsibilities as Heads, Deans and Conveners. They are involved in planning and execution of various tasks under the guidance of the head of the institution and cooperation of the teachers associated with them.

Senior most teachers in each subject work as the heads of their respective departments. They coordinate the day to day functioning,

distribution of workload, plan unitization of syllabus, student activities, allocation of projects, appointment of paper setters for house exams, recommend the appointment of internal examiners for practical exams, plan tours, arrange extension lectures, organize seminars/conferences, recommend admission of students to their respective departments and purchase of books, equipment, lab material etc.

The teachers constitute various academic and administrative committees which are headed by senior teachers as Deans/Conveners. Middle order teachers are associated with them as Co-Deans/Co-Conveners. Depending on the interest and capability, sometimes even junior members of the faculty are assigned independent tasks.

Members of the faculty are also encouraged to participate in decision making at the level of the affiliating university by seeking membership of its bodies like Boards of Study, Faculties, Academic Council and Senate.

Relying on the leadership qualities and organizing ability of the faculty, the institution readily accepts the challenge of organizing events like zonal and inter-zonal youth festivals of the university. The college has organized five such festivals during the last eight years.

The college promotes leadership skills in the students in the manner given below:

- The college has a student welfare council in which the students who have excelled in the field on academics, cultural, cocurricular activities, sports, extension activities as NSS, Youth Club, NCC, Press Club etc. are given adequate representation. These chosen ones represent the students of the college and confidently bring forth the problems and rectifications where ever needed.
- The students participate as volunteers in the organization and conduct of various academic, co-curricular and extra activities organized by the college from time to time.
- The students act as sub editors for the various sections as English, Hindi, Punjabi, Planning Forum, Science and News Section of the annual college magazine 'UDAR'.
- Students attend camps organized by NCC, Youth Welfare Department and Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle.
- Lectures on personality development are organized

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The functioning of the institution is democratic and decentralized. All major decisions regarding the internal day-to-day administration are taken by the Statutory Advisory Committee. Meetings of the general body of the staff are held as per requirement. The conveners of various committees, deans and heads plan and implement the decisions of the advisory committee, along with the other members. Once the responsibilities are fixed, it is upto each committee to plan and complete the assigned jobs. The committees and deans are encouraged to come forward with new plans and ways to implement them.

The teaching departments decide about the distribution of work and purchase of books/equipment required for their respective subjects. The heads of the departments coordinate the activities of the departments to organize seminars, extension lectures, co-curricular activities, tours, trips, field work etc. They make their own teaching plans and unitization of syllabus. They are responsible for the internal assessment, organizing remedial classes, extra classes etc.

The office superintendent allocates work to the non-teaching staff with information to the head of the institution. He also monitors and supervises the working of the non-teaching class four employees.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The college promotes a culture of participative management at different levels. For details refer 5.3.6, and 6.1.2.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

The institution frames a quality policy on session to session basis focused towards achieving excellence in all spheres.

The quality parameters are discussed in the Advisory Committee. The performance of the previous session is evaluated and corrective measures are chalked out wherever needed. A staff meeting at the beginning and end of each session is held for this purpose. Sometimes the representatives of the management also participate in it. The faculty is made aware of the policy, shortcomings of the previous session are pointed out and corrective measures for the new session are taken.

The policy is deployed through the various departments/committees.

The implementation of the policy is reviewed from time to time and corrective measures are worked out even during the course of the session.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.

The institution has a perspective plan for development. Both short term and long term objectives have been taken into consideration while preparing it.

It has been prepared keeping in view the introduction of new courses; expected increase in enrollment; further expansion of existing infrastructure like laboratories, class rooms, seminar rooms etc.; development of modern sports infrastructure; improving learning resources like developing a new modern library to cater to future needs and enhancing the use of technology in teaching learning process etc.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

All major policy decisions are taken by the executive of the Managing Board.

The head of the institution coordinates the activities of the institution with the governing body, local administration, government, and the University.

All major decisions regarding the internal day-to-day administration are taken under the leadership of the principal by the Statutory Advisory Committee.

The institution plans and co-ordinates its activities with the help of conveners of various committees, deans, coordinators, senior tutors and heads of departments.

Different tasks/jobs/activities are entrusted to different committees (Refer 6.1.2). The committees meet regularly to carry out various tasks. The deans/ coordinators/ senior tutors co-ordinate and monitor the work of the committees falling under their jurisdiction.

Conveners/ deans/ coordinators regularly report the progress of the activities to the principal. Meetings of the conveners/deans are held whenever required under the chairmanship of the principal.

The committees and deans implement the decisions along with the other members of the committees. Once the responsibilities are conveyed, it is upto each committee to plan and complete the assigned jobs. The committees and deans are encouraged to come forward with new plans and ways to implement them.

A senior teacher has been appointed as Bursar of the college. He scrutinizes and authenticates all the bills, vouchers, cash memos and cash books. All payments are released only after his authentication.

The teaching departments have partial autonomy. The heads of the departments coordinate the departmental activities. The departments decide on their own about the distribution of work among themselves. They purchase books and equipment after financial sanction from the head of the institution. The departments also plan and organize seminars, workshops, extension lectures, co-curricular activities, tours, trips, field work etc. They make their own teaching plans and unitization of syllabus. They allocate projects, organize remedial classes, arrange extra classes, adjust teaching schedules, adjust lectures within their departments, monitor progress of their students, review coverage of course content etc.

6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

- Teaching & Learning
- Research & Development
- Community engagement
- Human resource management
- Industry interaction

The quality improvement strategies of the institution are as follows:

Teaching & Learning:

- New courses are introduced from time to time.
- Emphasis is laid on faculty improvement by organizing seminars, conferences, workshops, extension lectures and encouraging teachers to attend such programmes.
- Teachers are encouraged to improve their qualifications.
- New teaching technologies are being introduced and their use is being encouraged.
- Consistent efforts are being made to make teaching learning student centric by involving them in surveys, projects, seminars, debates, writing competitions, industrial training, presentations, mock elections, visits etc.
- Library and learning resources are being updated. The college plans to construct a new spacious modern library.
- More smart class room facilities are being created.
- A software based computerized system has been evolved to monitor the progress of the students.

- The progress of the students is closely monitored and corrective/remedial and/or motivational measures are taken.
- Remedial classes and other measures like providing simplified notes and study material in vernacular language for slow learners as well as where sufficient material is not available, is a regular feature.
- Advanced learners are given challenging tasks and assignments. They are also provided extra study material.
- Extra lectures are provided in some subjects like English, Mathematics, and Financial Accounting.
- Syllabus is unitized.
- Meritorious students are given awards, prizes, scholarships and financial aid.
- The performance of teachers is regularly monitored and corrective measures taken wherever necessary.

Research & Development:

- Teachers are encouraged to attend seminars/ conferences/ workshops.
- They are encouraged to submit proposals for research projects.
- Budgetary provision is made to promote research. As most of this amount remained unspent, a strategy has been worked out to optimise its use.
- To inculcate research aptitude the students are involved in surveys, industrial training, mock elections, election surveys, presentations, seminars etc.
- Seminars/conferences/workshops are organized by the college for the benefit of students and faculty.
- Library and learning resources are regularly updated.
- Computer facility with internet has been provided.
- Leave of different kinds is sanctioned to the teachers to carry out research.
- Eminent scholars/researchers are invited to deliver extension lectures for the benefit of students and teachers.

Community Engagement:

For community engagement the institution works on many strategies like:

- Organizing outreach programmes like awareness campaigns, medical check-up camps, cleanliness drives, tree plantation etc.

- in rural areas, slums and the town through the activities of NSS, Youth Clubs and departmental clubs/societies.
- Collaborating with NGO's, Clubs, other institutions, hospitals, social workers, government departments, panchayats etc.
- Inviting people of the area during youth festivals, cultural programmes, live concerts and shows etc.
- Organizing competitions in hockey, declamations, poster making etc. for school children
- Organizing vocational training/skill development programmes in collaboration with other organizations like Guru Nanak Polytechnic college, Ludhiana and Department of Life Long Learning, Panjab University, Chandigarh
- Arranging extension lectures by inviting experts from Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana in the field of dairy farming, horticulture, modern agriculture, beekeeping, agro-forestry, floriculture etc.
- Making campus facility available to the people for walks, games, yoga and gym for exercise etc. The *Yog Sansthan*, Doraha organized a 3 day *shivir* in the college. Army units stationed at Doraha often use the play grounds. They also helped us in leveling of the ground by providing heavy machinery for the same.
- Regularly organizing Blood Donation Camps during which NGO's provide refreshment to the blood donors.
- Collaborating with Hospitals/ Clubs/ social organizations for organizing medical check camps and eye camps for the students, staff and the people of the area, where even free medicines are disbursed.
- Arranging doctors and experts from renowned hospitals of the area to deliver extension lectures for the benefit of the staff, students and the people of the area.
- Providing the campus and infrastructure like Hall, Seminar Room and computers to be used by the local departments of the government for training programmes, census related activities, public welfare activities and conduct of elections.
- Organizing seminars on social issues where representatives of stakeholders are also involved.
- Providing counselling to school pass outs in the town and surrounding villages.

For further details refer 1.3.4, 3.6.6 and 3.6.8.

Human Resource Management:

- Regular appointments are made strictly according to the laid down norms and procedures. External experts are also sometimes invited to select contractual/adhoc teachers.
- Good teachers working on contractual/adhoc basis are reappointed session after session.
- Duties and responsibilities are distributed among teaching staff. Various committees for specific jobs are constituted. The functioning of the committees/departments is regularly monitored by the conveners and also by the head of the institution.
- Office staff has been assigned specific duties/work. Their performance is monitored by the Office Superintendents and the Principal.
- Arrival and departure times are marked by the staff in the attendance register.
- Biometric attendance has been introduced for adhoc/contractual staff.
- Self-appraisal, API proformas and ACR's are used for increments, career advancement (CAS), promotions and stepups.
- The class four employees have been given specific duties for performing daily chores in the library, gardens, labs, class rooms, offices and other places. Their work is monitored by the office superintendent, senior teachers and the Principal.
- Office staff has been trained in the use of computers.

Industry Interaction:

- The institution interacts with industry for training and placement of students.
- People from industry occasionally visit the institution to provide career guidance and counseling to the students.
- 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The head of the institution provides adequate information gathered from feedback and personal contacts to the top management during personal meetings with the office bearers and meetings of the executive committee and general body.

He conveys it to the faculty through staff meetings.

This information is shared with the students through the faculty and by the head of the institution during his address to the students at the time of functions and assemblies.

These are shared with the parents during their occasional visits to the college and during parent teacher meetings held in some classes.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The management encourages and supports the involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes in following ways:

Timely increments / Career Advancement /Step Ups are given to all the employees.

The management recognizes the services rendered and contribution made by the staff towards the development of the college. It honours the members of the staff from time to time, especially, during college functions held immediately before retirement of the employees for their contribution to the college.

Farewell parties are arranged on the day of the superannuation of the members of the staff.

The class four employees are provided uniforms every year.

Retiral benefits like EPF, CPF, Leave Encashment and Gratuity are paid as per norms.

Medical Allowance / ESI facility is extended to the staff as per norms.

If the work is satisfactory the contractual/adhoc staff is reappointed session after session.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

- 6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

So far, no institution affiliated with Panjab University has been allowed autonomous status by the university.

The institution has opted for accreditation. We feel that during the process of preparation of the report and its aftermath, we will be in a better position to analyze and apply for autonomy.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institution has mechanisms to analyze and redress grievance of different sections of its stakeholders.

There is a grievance redressal cell for students. The students freely approach their teachers and the head of the institution to convey their grievances. Sometimes collective representations are also received. The members of the grievance redressal cell analyze and promptly act to redress the grievance. The head of the institution handles the issue himself or refers it to the concerned

teachers depending upon the nature of grievance. The Incharge Girls Wing receives and redresses the grievances of the girl students.

- Suggestion boxes have been placed at a few places in the college for the students to drop any of their suggestions/grievances into them.
- The college has a cell headed by a senior woman teacher to deal with the evil of sexual harassment of women at the work place.
- The issues of academic nature are dealt by the principal or the senior teachers. Such issues are also discussed in the meetings of the advisory committee, specific committees and staff.
- The executive of the management has three elected staff representatives as its members. They ensure that the staff related issues are taken care of.
- The employees are free to make representations to the management through the principal regarding the issues concerned with service matters.
- There is a provision, for the employees, for appeal to higher authorities such as the DPI/Panjab University etc. The state government has also constituted a tribunal for this purpose.
- Parents convey their grievances to Principal, In-charge Girls' Wing or the teachers.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

During the last four years, four court cases have been filed by the institution and two against it.

Cases filed by the institution are mainly against the state government for release of pending grants under the 95% grant in aid scheme, reimbursement of fee of the SC category students by the government and reimbursement of the governments share of retiral benefits like gratuity, leave encashment and Contributory Provident Fund on gross salary that have already been paid by the management in the case of members of the staff who were working on posts covered under 95% deficit grant in aid scheme. All of these cases have been decided in the favour of the institution.

The cases filed against the institution were mainly regarding payment of Provident Fund on gross salary, payment of leave encashment against privilege leave and payment of arrears of revised pay scales etc. The decisions of the Honourable Punjab and Haryana High Court are pending.

Some superannuated employees have also filed cases against the

government to implement pension gratuity scheme.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The institution has a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance. The students of the outgoing batches give their feedback through feedback proformas. These are analyzed by the senior teachers and the head of the institution. Such feedback is also received through day to day interaction of the students with the staff and the principal. Feedback is also received through suggestion boxes. The students readily approach the principal and convey their grievances.

Appropriate action is taken in teacher related issues. The teachers are counseled by the principal or through the senior faculty of the department. Contractual/Adhoc teachers have even been relieved in the middle of the session depending upon the feedback. On the basis of feedback some such teachers are not reappointed during the following session.

Prompt action is taken in cases regarding infrastructure, cleanliness, water facilities, canteen, discipline etc.

The feedback regarding introduction of new courses is conveyed to the management.

The feedback regarding curriculum is conveyed to the different boards of study of the university through the faculty.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The academic, intellectual and professional growth of the teaching and non-teaching staff is high on our agenda. The institution believes that it is, by far, the most critical factor affecting the health of an institution.

The college encourages the teachers to avail every opportunity that leads to their academic growth and professional advancement.

Following steps are taken to enhance the professional development of the teaching staff:

- i. Central computer facility with broadband/ leased line internet has been provided for the use of faculty.
- ii. Training sessions are organized for faculty improvement in the use of ICT. We have been organizing such programmes every session for the last seven years, especially in the preparation of computer aided presentations and their use. Training sessions to

- use teaching gadgets and equipment available in the college have also been conducted.
- iii. Lectures have been arranged to demonstrate the use of different technologies used in the preparation of presentations and teaching-learning packages.
- iv. Faculty is encouraged to participate in seminars, workshops, faculty improvement programmes, conferences organized by other institutions. They are granted duty leave to do so. Financial support to attend such programmes is also provided sometimes. Many of our teachers have presented papers as well.
- v. The institution also organizes seminars/conferences and extension lectures for the benefit of faculty and students.
- vi. Grant under Faculty Improvement Programme is availed for the faculty. The institution grants leave for such pursuit.
- vii. Faculty members are granted permission and leave of various kinds for improvement of qualifications and to carry out research activities.
- viii. Books are purchased on recommendation of faculty for their studies and research.
- ix. Faculty is encouraged to publish books and articles in addition to research papers.
- x. Faculty is encouraged to apply for research projects.
- xi. The faculty has also attended camps related to youth welfare and NCC.

For the non-teaching staff the institution conducts training programmes in the use of computers. All of the members of the office and library staff are capable of handling computers.

The staff has also undergone training conducted by the affiliating university in the use of computerization of students data related to registration, examination and internal assessment submitted to it.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institution has adopted strategies for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees.

Staff meetings are held to motivate the faculty and make them aware of the recent developments in teaching technologies, UGC regulations regarding requirements for career advancement, monitoring students' progression, need to attend slow learners and advanced learners, etiquettes and qualities of a good teacher etc. They

are also motivated to carry out research work, adopt new teaching technologies and make use of library and e-resources.

Training sessions in the use of ICT; preparation of computer aided teaching material; use of teaching aids like projectors, interactive boards visualizers etc. are organized year after year.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

A system of self-appraisal is in force. The teachers fill up the proforma every year at the end of the session and the head of the institution validates it and uses it to write the ACR's.

Other means to evaluate the performance of the teachers is through the results of their students in the university examinations, feedback from the passing out students, parents, heads of the departments and conveners of committees.

The UGC recommended Regulations regarding Academic Performance Indicator (API) based Performance Based Appraisal System for appointments, promotions and Career Advancement of teachers. The state government and the affiliating university have adopted the same. These regulations are being followed by the institution.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

The teachers are appraised by the head of the institution about the feedback received through different sources wherever needed and necessary counselling is provided. It is also conveyed through the senior faculty at times.

The performance appraisal reports are reviewed by the principal and the cases for career advancement/step ups are recommended by him to the management. The management takes decisions accordingly as per rules.

The Principal also writes the ACR's on the basis of the performance appraisal reports and his personal observations and feedback received from different quarters.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Various welfare schemes are as follows:

 Retiral benefits like leave encashment, gratuity and Contributory Provident Fund are provided to the staff as per rules.

- Loan facility for, different purposes, from PF accounts is provided.
- Decent farewell parties are organized for the staff at the time of superannuation.
- Medical aid is provided when needed during working hours.
- Medical Allowance / ESI facility is available to eligible employees.
- Dresses are given to all the Class-IV employees every year.
- Residential facility has been provided to the Head of the Institution, some teaching staff, especially women and some Class-IV employees.
- Subsidized electricity facility is provided to Class-IV employees working on contract basis.
- Fee concession/financial aid is provided to wards of Class-IV employees, studying in the college.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

Excellent working conditions and academic atmosphere are the strength of the institution. Job satisfaction is utmost important to retain quality staff. The institution provides enough freedom to the staff to grow and excel. The staff is paid salaries well in time. The institution is one of the first few colleges that have implemented the revised pay scales both as per pay revision in 1996 as well as in 2006. Retiral benefits are being paid regularly. The academic and administrative atmosphere is such that people enjoy working here. The management and the staff have a very cordial relationship. The faculty of the institution is satisfied with the management and functioning of the institution to the extent that two of our teachers were selected as lecturers for government service. They did not opt to join the same. One of them came back even after working in a government college for six months. Most of the contractual staff prefers to continue year after year.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The institution has evolved a mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available resources. The governing body passes the budget every year. The accounts are regularly monitored. Monthly balances in various bank accounts are accessed and adjustments and corrections in the expenditure are monitored on monthly basis by the

accounts branch and the head of the institution. The head of the institution keeps a close watch on the inflow and outflow of funds and also monitors the requirement and availability of funds for various developmental projects and activities of the institution and keeps the management well informed about it. He plans the expenditure with the help of the staff and in consultancy with the management.

The principal gave a presentation to the general body of the managing board regarding the income generated from different sources, expenditure incurred on various head like salaries, buildings, maintenance, computer hardware and software, teaching aids/gadgets, maintenance etc. from the year 2006-07 to 2011-12. Annual budget is also passed by the management. Approval of expenditure is also sought from the management from time to time.

The accounts of the college are audited by a qualified Chartered Accountant. A senior teacher of the college has been appointed as the bursar. He authenticates all the financial transactions.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The accounts of the institution are regularly audited. The bursar scrutinizes and authenticates all the bills, vouchers, cash memos and cash books. He ensures that the proper purchase procedures are followed before every payment.

The college has employed a qualified Charted Accountant. The accounts of the institution are regularly audited by him. He scrutinizes and prepares annual income/expenditure statements and balance sheets.

The income tax department has also scrutinized the accounts of the college. The college has been granted exemption from payment of Income Tax. Exemption has been allowed under Section 80-G on donations made to the institution and exemption under section 197 (2) from TDS on interest earned on bank deposits.

In addition to this, the pre-audit cell of the Punjab Government admits the claims for grants receivable under the grant in aid scheme every year. The Government also gets the post-audit done by its department as well as the Auditor General, Punjab.

The last audit by the Audit Department, Punjab Government was done upto the year 2009-10 the translated copy of the same is reproduced as Annexure - XII.

Audit by Auditor General has been done upto the year 2010-11. A copy of the report of the same is attached as Annexure - XIII.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

The fee/funds collected from the students form a major source of revenue and income.

The deficit is partly met by the grant received from the Punjab Government under the 95% deficit grant in aid scheme.

The institution is also recognized under 2f and 12b by the UGC and gets grants for various schemes of the UGC.

The college makes efforts to generate additional financial resources through donations, grants, miscellaneous income etc. as explained in 6.4.4.

For audited income and expenditure statements of the previous four years refer Annexure – XIV (A, B, C, D).

The reserve fund/corpus available with the institution as on 31st March, 2014 is Rs. 1,70,80,243/- as bank balances, FDR's, Endowments etc. In addition to this, Rs. 74,21,051/- is receivable from the Punjab Government as pending grant under 95% grant in aid scheme and Rs. 26,95,951/- as reimbursement of fee of the S.C. students.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

To begin with, most of the infrastructure of the institution was built with the help of donations collected by the managing board. It has been receiving donations every now and then for general purpose as well as for specific projects. A significant amount was donated, during the years 2003-2005, by the family of the founder president Late. Dr. Ishwar Singh, for the construction of a Multipurpose Hall in his memory. An amount of Rs. 25,55,000/- was received for this purpose.

Resources have also been mobilized from political leadership, government agencies, religious organizations etc.

Revenue/income is also generated through rent of the college canteen, the building rented to a nationalized bank and from miscellaneous sources.

Some amount is also generated from the people who use the college grounds and gym for walk and exercise. This amount is used for the upkeep and maintenance of the grounds. Table showing amount and sources of income generated during the last four years:

 - a. Though the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in the year 2009, most of policy decisions are taken by the executive of the management and the advisory committee as explained in 6.1.2.

- b. All academic decisions are taken and implemented by the principal and the staff. The management is informed about the activities carried out and policies being planned and implemented in the college. The approval of the management is sought wherever needed.
- c. The IQAC does not have external members on its committee. It has a retired principal of the college as one of its member and two representatives of the management, in addition to the principal and senior teachers.
- d. Students are represented on some committees of the college. They also provide feedback which is useful for improving the functioning and the facilities provided by the institution. The students are actively involved in organizing functions and extension activities.
 - The alumni provides feedback and are helpful in organizing extension activities. It has also contributed some funds which are used to encourage meritorious students and sportspersons.
- e. The staff from different constituents of the institution are communicated and engaged through meetings and notices/communiqués by the principal.
- 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

The advisory committee and other committees coordinate the functioning of academic and administrative activities of the college.

For further integration, the institution has a software. This software is helpful in admissions and collection of fee; maintaining a complete record of student profile and student attendance; monitoring students progression on the basis of house and annual examinations; calculation of internal assessment etc. A module for online tests has been incorporated into it which will be used during the ensuing session. Admission forms are received on-line.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

The staff is provided training for effective implementation of Quality Assurance Procedures. For details refer 6.3.1 and 6.3.2.

As a result of this training, almost the entire office staff is capable of operating computers and software.

Most of the teachers can use computers and many of them can handle gadgets/equipment for presentations. Teachers have started preparing computer aided presentations.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Though no formal Academic Audit has been done, the institution reviews its performance, activities and procedures from time to time.

Significant inputs regarding external reviews is available from the observations of the inspection teams of the university that visit the college almost every year for extension of affiliation.

The process of preparation of the SSR for NAAC is in itself a very good source of self-appraisal.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities like the affiliating university, UGC and Punjab Government are being adequately met. For this, following steps are taken:

- Proper procedures are adopted for appointment of teachers.
- Staff is encouraged to attend faculty development programmes.
- Organizing seminars/conferences/extension lectures is a regular feature.
- Library and learning resources are regularly updated.
- Infrastructure is regularly added, updated and repaired/renovated.
- The staff has been trained to handle the software provided by the affiliating university for submission of student returns, internal assessment, practical awards and examination forms.
- Laboratory equipment is added and maintained.
- Computers, hardware and software are regularly added and upgraded.
- Leased line and broadband internet connectivity has been provided.
- Reservation Policy of the State Government and Admission Guidelines and Academic Calendar provided by the affiliating university are strictly followed.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The teaching learning process is reviewed through following mechanisms:

- Regularity and attendance of the students in classes.
- Participation and performance of students in co-curricular activities.
- Performance of the students in the class and house exams.
- Performance of the students in the annual exams.
- Feedback from students and parents.
- Feedback from employers.

External stakeholders are kept informed through the college website; press releases and advertisements published in the leading dailies from time to time; visit of students and faculty of other institutions during functions like youth festivals; guests and dignitaries visiting during functions; members of the inspection teams from the affiliating university; visits of our faculty to the schools of the area; visits of students and faculty to the people of surrounding areas during outreach and extension activities etc.

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities? No formal Green Audit has been done.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation

For energy conservation the institution has replaced almost all the lights with CFL bulbs.

The office and some of the class rooms have been restructured so that enough natural light is available.

* Use of renewable energy

The institution is installing a Solar Power Plant of 3 KW capacity. Its power supply will be used in the office during day time and for security cameras and lights at night.

* Water harvesting

Water harvesting is not practicable in the institution. However, rain water is used to recharge underground water.

Check dam construction

* Efforts for Carbon neutrality

For Carbon Neutrality the institution has taken the following initiatives:

- The institution has installed generator sets of 125 kva, 82 kva and 32 kva. The generators are used as per load requirement to conserve fossil fuel.
- The generators are properly tuned and serviced.
- Vermi-compositing unit has been set up to avoid burning of organic waste.

* Plantation

The institution has a lush green campus. About 900 trees and shrubs have been planted on the campus during the last eight years.

The institution organizes extension lectures for the benefit of society to promote tree plantation.

NSS unit of the college caries out plantation derives.

* Hazardous waste management

No hazardous waste is generated. Chemical waste generated in the Chemistry lab is drained with lots of water as per lab manuals.

* e-waste management

E-waste is disposed of by selling it to vendors for reuse.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The institution always introspects and introduces innovations to achieve the aims and objectives of the college and achieve and promote excellence. In this pursuit, the college has introduced innovations in the fields like faculty development, teaching learning, evaluation, extension, governance and management, student support and progression and inclusiveness etc. during the last four years.

Some of these are as follows:

i. Faculty Improvement Programmes:

To keep pace with the changing times, the need to keep the faculty updated is the utmost priority of the institution. The faculty is encouraged to attend seminars/conferences/ workshops/training programmes and other faculty development programmes organized by the universities and institutions of the region. During the last four years, 38 teachers have attended international and national conferences/seminars, workshops, training programmes etc. Together they have attended 306 such programmes during this time. The institution too organizes expert/extension lectures to enrich the faculty. During the last four years 33 such lectures were organized.

Inspite of this, it was felt that the faculty needed special training in the use of ICT to update their knowledge and adopt technology to improve the teaching learning process. This basic training could not be received through research or subject related seminars/ conferences/ workshops.

It was decided to provide such training by the institution itself. This was accorded during the days when the house examinations were being conducted so that the teachers could spare 2-3 hours daily after their duties. This training was provided in the use of computers, e-mail and internet in the first stage. In the second stage, the teachers were trained in the preparation of computer aided presentations followed by training in the use of projectors and interactive gadgets. As this practice is being continued since 2006 most of the teachers can operate computers and prepare presentations, and some of them can handle gadgets as well.

Similarly a workshop was also organized in the use of SPSS software to acquaint the faculty in use of technology in Research in Social Sciences.

ii. Monitoring the teaching learning process and student performance:

Majority of the students of the college belong to rural areas and other disadvantaged sections of the society. Many of them are first generation learners. They have a low motivational level and lack the urge to excel. It is quite challenging to bring them to the class rooms and make them deliver. Extra efforts have to be put in to reduce drop out or failure rate in exams. Some of them, especially girls, are however, quite serious about their studies. Both the categories of students need extra attention and regular monitoring.

The institution regularly monitors the teaching learning process as well as the performance of the students. With such a large number of students and variety of subjects/courses being taught, proper monitoring and analysis was not easy. To ensure proper monitoring and analysis of the teaching learning process and student's performance, a software has been procured that is designed according to the needs of the institution. It has been put to use during the session 2013-14. The staff is being trained to make its use more meaningful and vigorous.

This software is helpful in admissions and collection of fee; maintaining a complete record of student profile and marks obtained in qualifying exam; monitoring students progression on the basis of house and annual examinations; calculation of internal assessment etc. A module for online tests has been incorporated into it which will be used during the ensuing session. Admission forms are received on-line. Through this software complete record of the attendance at lectures is also maintained and monitored. The marks obtained and lectures attended in each subject are reproduced in the form of a letter to keep the parents informed about the progress of their wards.

iii. The Post Graduate Department of Political Science organizes Election Surveys and conducts Mock Elections. During election surveys the students are involved in collecting response of the students who are taken as a sample of the voters. The results are analyzed and concluded by the students themselves under the guidance of the teachers. The students also conduct mock elections of the Presidents of India and USA. This helps the students to understand the procedures in a better way.

The post graduate students of Sociology are given assignments to conduct surveys in rural areas to collect data so as to train them in research methodology.

The practice is aimed at inculcating skills, creating awareness, sensitizing youth, developing personality, promoting art and culture and providing entertainment and lively campus experience by organizing youth festivals and live shows; and ensuring mass participation of students in cultural and extra-curricular activities.

3. The Context

The students of the institution are predominantly rural. They had few opportunities to participate in cultural and other extra-curricular activities and thus polish their personalities during their school life. They are not aware of the rich cultural heritage and diversity of the country. Some of them possess natural talent which is not exhibited due of lack of exposure and opportunities. Moreover such activities, if planned and executed well, are a very good means to create awareness about social, ethical and global issues and play an important role in building character and overall personality of the pupil. The institution believes that participation in these activities is a necessity for maintaining good health, channelizing the energies of the youth and keeping them away from the menace of drug addiction. Cultural activities also help the students to hone their skills in performing arts like music, dances and theatrical items.

4. The Practice

The institution encourages mass participation of the students in cultural and other co-curricular activities. It also organizes festivals, competitions, live shows by renowned artist and cultural programmes regularly.

The college provides ample opportunities to its students to participate in competitions related to dramatics, dances, music, debates, literary writing, fine arts, and heritage items.

A cultural programme in the memory of the founder president Dr. Ishwar Singh is organized on 31st August every year to give opportunity to as many students as possible. This helps in talent hunt especially amongst the new entrants.

The students of the college participate in a big way, in all the Zonal Youth and Heritage Festivals of Panjab University Chandigarh and bag outstanding positions reaching out for more brilliant positions at Inter-Zonal levels, National level or even Inter-national level. The university organizes intercollege competitions in 46 items spread over theatre, music, dance, literary, fine arts and heritage items. The college ensures the participation of its students in almost all of these. Besides this, a number of debates, declamations, quiz competitions, writing competitions etc. are also organized by various clubs and societies. Cultural programmes are often organized by the college in which a large number of our students participate.

The institution has organized two Inter-Zonal and three Zonal Youth Festivals during the last eight sessions. The faculty is talented, dedicated and hardworking. This encourages us to organize events like youth festivals and ensure participation.

Renowned artists like Sh. Satinder Sartaj, Ms. Jyoti Nooran and Ms. Sultana Nooran (renowned Singers), Pandit Tejendra Narayan Majumdar, (renowned Sarod player) accompanied by Ustad Akaram Khan (tabla player), Ustad Sahid Parvez (Sitar Wadak) and Mr. Karan Pangli (Dancer) have been invited to perform in the college.

Outstanding students, in these activities, are given fee concessions, financial aid and academic guidance. Outstanding performers are given scholarships/financial aid, awards and honours.

The college specifically has an open air stage and a multipurpose auditorium with a seating capacity of about 1800 persons for the realization of this practice.

5. Evidence of Success

Students enthusiastically participate in cultural events. The institution participates in maximum number of events and the contingent of the college is one of the largest in zonal and inter zonal youth festivals.

The students have won prizes at intervarsity and even national level.

Organization of such events has helped the institution to improve organizing skills and team spirit, both among the students and the staff.

Many renowned personalities and artists have visited the institution as guests and judges during youth festivals.

The participating students, accompanists and faculty from about 190 institutions affiliated to Panjab University visit the institution during Inter-Zonal Youth Festivals and interact with the faculty and students. They often give us necessary feedback.

Youth festivals are the most remembered events of campus life by our old students.

Some students, good at music, theatre and dances, are attracted to the institution due to its glorious achievements in these fields. They also train their colleagues in their field of expertise.

Some students, who had no exposure to any such activity in their earlier life, have performed remarkably well e.g.:

- i. Ms. Sukhandeep Kaur joined the institution in B.A. programme. She was from a rural background. During the very first year of her participation, she won the best actress award in both the play and skit categories in the Inter-Zonal Youth and Heritage Festival of Panjab University. She opted for Music (Vocal) as an elective subject, participated and won prizes in music items and went on to pursue Masters in Music (Vocal).
- ii. Ms. Prabhjot Kaur, another girl from a humble background, won a number of prizes in the youth festivals during her stay in the college. Competing with the youth from about 190 institutions affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh, she won five prizes in different categories of competitions like folk and heritage items and mimicry at the Inter-Zonal level in 2013.

Many of our students have adopted music and theatre as their profession. Some of them have set up training centers, even abroad.

In addition to competing in cultural programmes, our students are invited to present their talent at a number of prestigious functions by different organizations and institutions like Panjab University, Doordarshan, Clubs and other organizations.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Voicing the Concern of Vulnerable Sections of Society: Women, Farmers and Migratory Labour

2. Goal

Describe the aim of the practice followed by the institution. Brief the underlying principles or concepts in about 100 words.

The institution aims at highlighting the plight of vulnerable sections of society especially, women, farmers and migratory labour and creating awareness among the youth and the society.

It also intends to empower the youth belonging to these sections by rendering all out help and support so that they can pursue higher studies. It also aims to provide guidance and advice to the farmers to adopt modern practices in agricultural and allied fields to enhance their means of livelihood.

3. The Context

Describe any particular contextual feature or challenging issues that have had to be addressed in designing and implementing the Practice in about 150 words.

The social evils like domestic and sexual violence against women and children, menace of dowry, female foeticide, eve teasing and drug addiction have cropped up at alarming proportions in the society, more so in Punjab.

The land holdings of farmers in Punjab have shrunk and are no more viable. This has led to indebtedness of farmers. Some of them are pushed to commit suicides, leaving their families helpless.

Punjab, especially Ludhiana, has a huge population of migratory labour from UP, Bihar, Uttar Khand, Rajasthan etc. Most of these people are working in the industry and are economically weak or belong to the lower middle class. Moreover they have to maintain their families back home.

The institution has a large proportion of students from rural areas. Most of the students are women and/or wards of farmers or migratory labour. The need to make them aware about their own problems and empower them is of utmost importance.

Recognizing the Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) the college plans and focuses its extension activities and outreach programmes towards the above mentioned issues.

4. The Practice

Describe the Practice and its implementation. Include anything about this practice that may be unique in the Indian higher education. Please also identify constraints or limitations, if any, in about 400 words.

The institution organizes a series of activities year after year to sensitize the society and create awareness among youth, general public and academic fraternity through extension and outreach programmes and seminars. The activities organized for this purpose are as follows:

- i. Rallies and awareness campaigns are organized in the town and surrounding villages to highlight the issues like female foeticide, dowry, gender discrimination, women empowerment, domestic violence against women, sexual harassment, drug addiction etc. along with other issues.
- ii. It organized a seminar on "Creating Awareness among Students Regarding Domestic and Sexual Violence against Women and Children" sponsored by College Development Council, Panjab University, Chandigarh on 5th March, 2014.
- iii. The college organized a UGC sponsored National Seminar on "Violation of Human Rights in Punjab A Case of Peasant Suicides" on 22-23 January, 2011.
- iv. It organized a Seminar in collaboration with ICSSR North Western Region on "Violation of Human Rights of Migratory Labour in Punjab" on 12-13 March, 2011.
- v. It arranges extension lectures by inviting veterinary doctors and experts from Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana in the field of dairy farming, horticulture, agriculture practices, beekeeping, agro-forestry, floriculture for the benefit of students from agricultural background. Such lectures are often organized

in the villages or the farmers are invited to the institution for this purpose.

In addition to voicing the concerns, the institution attempts to empower these sections by facilitating higher education to women and the wards of farmers and migratory labour. Some of the efforts made by the institution in this pursuit are as follows:

- i. Keeping in mind the social inhibition of women education in coeducational institutions, a separate wing for girls with class rooms, labs, canteen, common room, girls hostel, women staff room, library facility, sports facilities etc. has been established within the campus. Some classes, exclusively for girls, are held in this wing. The girls from the co-education sections also move to the girl's wing during their free periods. Majority of our faculty members are also ladies.
- ii. Transport facility with private participation, has been arranged for girls.
- iii. Teams of staff members visit schools and families of girls, especially rural, or contact their parents telephonically to provide guidance and counselling before the admissions of the new session.
- iv. Guidance and counselling is provided by the faculty to the students belonging to these sections even at the time of admissions. Such students are suggested to choose programmes and elective options keeping in mind their educational background and performance in qualifying exams.
- v. Remedial and bridge courses are organized for them to enable them to make up for their deficiencies.
- vi. College timings are adjusted so that the students commuting from villages reach the college in time for their classes.
- vii. Liberal financial support is provided/ arranged to the students of all sections to the extent that not even a single student is turned back for economic reasons.
- viii. The fee is also charged in easy installments. Keeping their convenience in mind, the date for deposition of fee is often extended.

5. Evidence of Success

The steps taken to sensitize the society through awareness campaigns, is a continuous process. Such activities are organized year after year, to focus on these and such like issues of social, regional, national, global and environmental concerns. Results though not noticeable,

definitely bring about a positive and constructive change in the perception of the society.

The seminars are organized to highlight the issues in the academic forums and sensitize the academia and NGO's to carry out studies with various parameters. These are also intended to create awareness among the students of the institution. The success of these activities can be gauged from the participation of stakeholders like renowned academicians, researchers, NGO's and representatives of the government and the targeted sections of the society as given below:

a. In addition to renowned economists and social scientists, representatives of human rights organizations, farmer unions and farmers were invited to contribute to the seminar on "Violation of Human Rights in Punjab - A Case of Peasant Suicides".

The students and teachers of the institution and about eighty delegates from different institutes of the region participated in it. Sixty two of them presented papers.

b. Representatives of NGO's, Human Rights Organizations, Labour Unions, migratory labour and government officials dealing with the migratory labour etc. were invited along with renowned researchers and experts from various universities and research institutes to share their views on "Violation of Human Rights of Migratory Labour in Punjab".

The students and teachers of the institution and fifty two delegates from different institutes of the region participated in it. Twenty nine delegates presented papers.

c. Along with women activists, social scientists, literary personalities, legal experts deliberated on "Creating Awareness among Students Regarding Domestic and Sexual Violence against Women and Children"

The students and faculty from the college and forty five delegates from different institutions of the region participated in this seminar. Thirty seven of them presented papers.

As a result of the efforts made by the institution the proportion of female students in the institution has gradually risen. At present it is higher than that of the male students. During the session 2013-14 the number of female students was 999 (57.81%).

Similarly, the number of students from rural areas was 1232 (71.46%). Majority of them belong to the farming community or other disadvantaged sections.

There are a number of instances where the students, who had received guidance and support from the college, are successfully settled now.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

It is sometimes difficult to convince the parents, who due to social inhibitions are reluctant to send their daughters for higher education.


